

The City of Reedsport has filed suit for accounting in the case of Reedsport vs. Russell J. Hubbard over the foreclosure of the Umpqua Timber Mill property.

Circuit Judge Carl Wimberly recently awarded the property to Reedsport following a ten-year litigation. Foreclosure action was based on the city's contention that Hubbard had defaulted on the contract of sale, which required the construction and operation of a

lumber mill on the property.

The present action, hearing for which had not been slated recently, is to enforce an accounting of revenue derived from the mill property during Hubbard's occupation of it. The revenue is said to consist mainly of rentals of a spur rail line on the property.

Reedsport Master Street Plan Urged By Long Bell Expert

Alec Hay, western land commissioner of the Longbell Lumber Company, urged the Reedsport city council and planning board to draft a master plan for future expansion and development.

The emphatic suggestion came in the course of a controversial discussion over street location and development in the several new residential tracts in the southwestern part of the city.

The Highlands, a three-tract, 63-home area sponsored mainly by the Longbell Lumber Company, operators of the Gardiner Lumber Company and Gardiner Plywood plants, and the Renbrook addition, privately sponsored housing development, are the two areas currently involved.

Separately plotted and developed, under the direction of the Reedsport Planning Commission, the housing developments were found to lack co-ordination of streets, Arthur Drive and Gardens Avenue, major thoroughfares, were prevented from joining and formed dead-end streets by an intervening lot.

Council members emphasized that the right-of-way should continue for reasons of fire protection, as well as traffic and pedestrian convenience.

Louis Arthur, sponsor of the Renbrook addition, told the council that a solution to the right-of-way problem would be worked out this week.

Both Arthur and Hay presented requests to the council for formal assurance to the FHA of acceptance and maintenance of streets in currently planned housing developments. FHA stipulations require warrants on the part of contractors of the improvement of streets in projects sanctioned by the Federal Home Loan Agency, and assurance of their acceptance by the city.

The Longbell Company is chief sponsor of a third homes development tract, Arthur and Renno and Hallbrook, contractors, are committed to build 20 of Reedsport's allotted 50 critical defense housing units. Negotiations over street improvement requirements have delayed the building program.

The council rejected a proposal that the city purchase two Reedsport Packing Company lots at a cost of \$10,000, as possible future sewage treatment plant site area.

The Reedsport Packing Company, former fish cannery, is now defunct and not operating. The council's rejection was on the basis of excessive price.

Mayor Tom Lillebo presided over the meeting, attended by city manager Byron Serfling, councilmen Tom Richmond, James McCulloch, Dr. C. F. Howitt, L. E. Carey, Willis Ekblad, and Lester Thompson.

An emergency ordinance amendment changing the set-back of Winchester Avenue from ten feet to two feet was enacted. The set-back change had previously been approved by the state highway department.

John C. Diehl, chairman of the Reedsport Planning Commission, represented that body in conferring with the council. Mayor Lillebo introduced, informally, William Jayne, former Reedsport resident now returning to the city to practice general law. Jayne, a 1942 Reedsport High School graduate, and graduate of the University of Oregon and Northwestern College of Law, will have offices in the Burdick building.

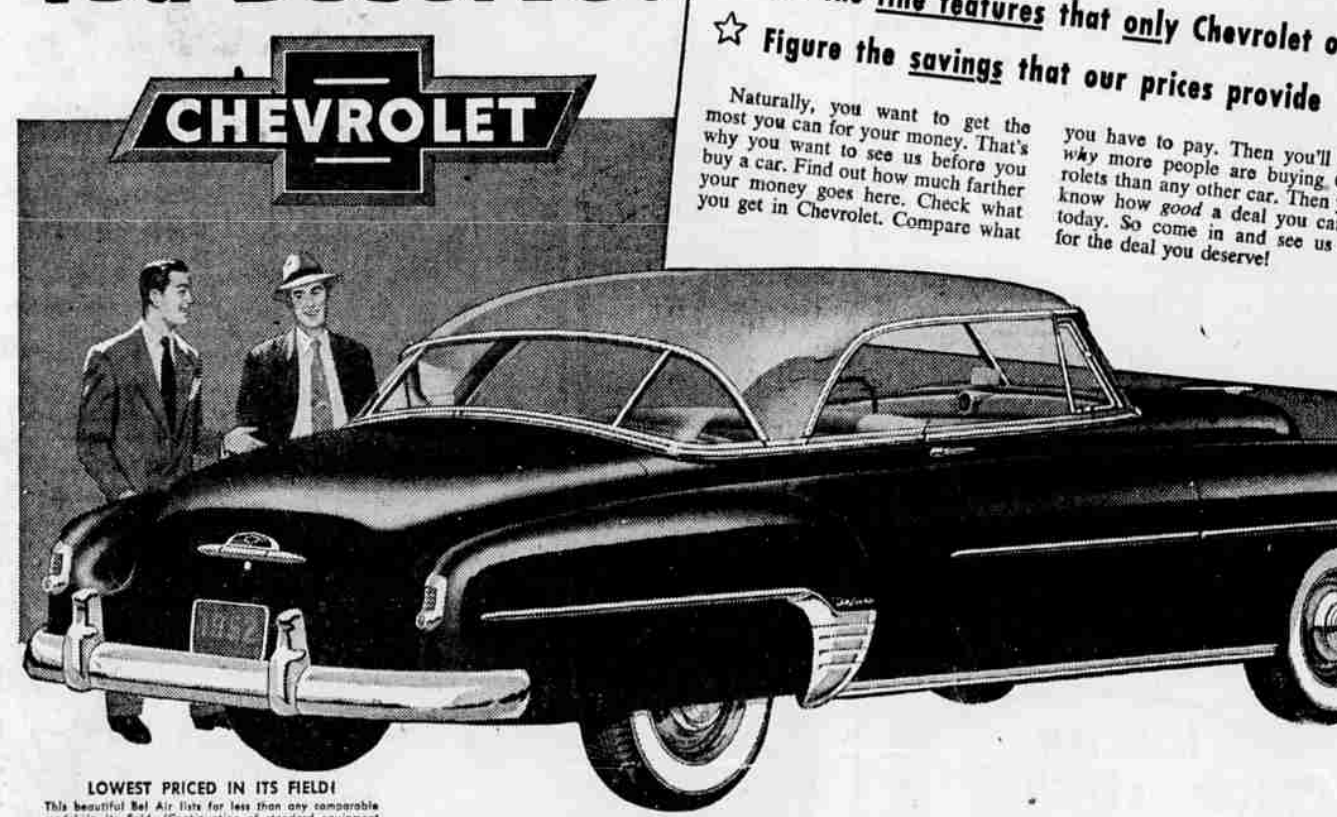
