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Four Out Of Eight World Boxing Champs From U.S.

WASHINGTON (AP) — The National Boxing Association Friday observed that only four of the eight world champions are from the United States.

And it pointed out that the way things are going it isn't likely that the U. S. will improve its position. The observation came in a news release accompanying the NBA's quarterly rating of the world's leading boxers.

Among the big boys, this country is doing okay.

Heavyweight champ: Rocky Marciano. His No. 1 challenger: Jersey Joe Walcott, followed by Rex Layne and Ezzard Charles. The top eight heavyweights listed by the NBA are from the U. S. Not until you reach the name of Johnny Williams, who gets an "honorable mention" from the NBA, do you find a foreigner. He's from England.

The same situation prevails among the light heavies. Joe Maxim is the champ, with Archie Moore and Harry Matthews the logical contenders.

Again, the eight top men are from the U. S. This time it's Volande Pompee, from Trinidad, who finally breaks the monopoly.

But starting with the middleweights, and working down the weight scale, the situation changes rapidly.

Ray Robinson is the middleweight champion, but right below him is the man who once beat him and briefly held his title, Randy Turpin of England. Kid Gavilan of Cuba is the welterweight king. Lauro Salas of Mexico rules the lightweights, Vic Toweel of South Africa is champion of the bantamweights, and

Lewis & Clark Meets Linfield

The Northwest's small colleges will crowd their football action into Saturday this week and get down to cases in conference competition.

Central Washington, the only school that hasn't been tagged for a defeat or a tie, also is the only one not playing a league game. Central will play host to Fort Lewis in a bid for its third straight victory.

Two teams in the Evergreen Conference have experienced everything possible in the games — victory, defeat and tie. They are Western Washington, which will entertain British Columbia and Puget Sound, which tangles with Eastern Washington at Cheney.

Whitworth, unbeaten but tied, will be at home to Pacific Lutheran, which has allowed its three opponents just seven points each and still has lost two and tied one.

In the Northwest Conference the Linfield club which has won three and tied one in four starts will be at home to Lewis and Clark, which broke even in two starts. College of Idaho will go after its first victory against Willamette at Salem and Pacific will tangle at Walla Walla with a Whitman team all seeking its first triumph.

Scores have been low and close in most cases so far this season and there have been an exciting number of deadlocks. Four games have ended in ties and there was scoring in very case.

Wisconsin vs. Ohio State Country's Top Grid Tilt

NEW YORK (AP) — Wisconsin comes upon another big obstacle on the rocky road to the Big 10 championship and the Rose Bowl tomorrow when the No. 1 team in the country takes on Ohio State.

This is the top battle of a full schedule of important league and intersectional affairs.

Wisconsin vaulted to the top spot in the land in The Associated Press poll last week on the basis of its stunning triumph over Illinois, the defending league champion. This Ohio State team doesn't approach some of the former powerhouses from Columbus, but it should give Ivy Williams' lads a run for their money.

Rare are the days when an Ivy League game rates the attention the Princeton-Penn affair is attracting. But these two powerhouses probably could put up a good fight against anyone. In addition, Princeton has a 24-game winning streak going, the longest in college football.

This is a tossup with Penn being given a one-point edge, probably on the basis of its 7-7 standoff against Notre Dame, while the boys from Tigertown have been warming up at the expense of lesser lights.

Rocky Jones Ends Title Hopes Of Lastarza

AKRON, O. (AP) — Rocky Jones, a little known heavyweight who once starred in high school football at nearby Canton, kicked around the heavyweight title ambitions of Roland Lastarza here Thursday night.

Lastarza, highly-favored New York City belter who's rated third ranking contender for Rocky Marciano's crown, lost a unanimous 10-round decision to Jones before a slim crowd of 1,400 at the armory.

The loss is certain to soften talk that Lastarza should have a crack at Marciano's newly won title. Rocky won a split decision over Lastarza at Madison Square Garden March 24, 1950 — ending a string of 37 straight victories for Lastarza.

At 190, Lastarza had 11 pounds on Jones, who was stepping out of the light-heavyweight ranks.
