Trophy Given Ascani For Air Speed Record

WASHINGTON — The Air Force's MacKay trophy for 1951 was awarded to Col. Fred J. Ascani for setting a world speed record of 635.6 miles an hour.

Gen. Hoyt S. Vandenberg, Air Force chief of staff, made the presentation, at a Pentagon ceremony in which he cited Ascani for his skill and precision in regaining the record for the U. S.

Ascani is now vice commander of the Air Research and Development Command Flight Test Center at Edwards Field, Calif.

4th N. Carolina Paper Endorses Eisenhower

CHARLOTTE, N. C. — The Charlotte News, traditionally independent Democratic, threw its editorial support behind Gen. Dwight D. Eisenhower Thursday. The News, which supported the Republican bid of Gov. Thomas E. Dewey in 1948, was the fourth North Carolina newspaper to endorse the Republican candidate.

Federal Controls Of Projects Hit By Eisenhower

ABOARD THE EISENHOWER SPECIAL — Dwight D. Eisenhower declared Thursday the administration is manned by "power hungry men" who want to dictate a way of life to the people.

Speaking to a cheering crowd in the warm sunshine at Fresno, Calif., the general hit out at federal controls over projects which he argues should be largely controlled by local and state authorities.

Eisenhower said the federal government should help in the development of reclamation, water projects, multiple purpose dams — "but they shouldn't come in to boss those projects."

About 2,500 people massed on the steps and in the park in front of the county courthouse in Fresno.

Echoing previous speeches on the relationship between federal and local control over public water and power projects, Eisenhower said it was right that there should be some federal participation in the Central Valley project.

"But with this proviso," he added, "that they shouldn't come here and boss it."

He told this audience, as he has told others in the West, that government should keep "its long nose out of your business."

"I am a bitter and lasting opponent of any similar thing that tries to bring the federal government into your area as a boss," Eisenhower renewed his pledge to root corruption out of government and emphasized his intention, if elected, to restore more local control of local projects.

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Demos Helped To Expose Mess, Kefauver Says

SAN FRANCISCO — Sen. Estes Kefauver declared Thursday night "crime and corruption is not a partisan issue" and named Democrats who have "exposed wrongdoing in government."

Hitting back at Republican presidential candidate Dwight D. Eisenhower's charges of corruption in government, the Tennessee Democrat said in a radio broadcast.

"Our Senate Crime Committee, which I headed, made many exposures of corruption. Sen. William Fulbright (Arkansas) exposed corruption in the RFC and he is a Democrat. Sen. Paul Douglas (Illinois) another Democrat, led the committee on morals and ethics in government."

"Sen. Clyde Hoey (North Carolina), another Democrat, was chairman of the committee that exposed the mink coat deals," Kefauver said, adding "what would the Republicans talk about if they couldn't talk about mink coats? But it was a Democrat who told them about the coats."

Missing Boat Found, Fate Of Three Mystery

SEATTLE — A 14-foot motorboat which disappeared with three persons aboard off Tillamook Bay, Oregon, last Saturday was found Wednesday but what happened to the occupants remains a mystery, the 13th Coast Guard district said.

Aboard the boat were Thomas King, 21, and his wife, 19, of Oregon City, and Robert A. Lind, 20, of Cape Meares, Ore.

Search by sea and air had failed to locate the craft. But a telephone call from a lookout tower near Kincheloe Point to the Tillamook Bay lifeboat station Thursday gave a clue and two patrol boats found the missing craft on the beach a mile away.

It had apparently drifted in on the tide. There were holes in it but they may have been made as it drifted over a gravel bar, the Coast Guard said. The outboard motor was still attached, with the tank full of gasoline, and the cushions, a life jacket, two oars and a paddle and an anchor in the boat.

Chaplin Praises British's Govt. Medicine Plan

LONDON — Charlie Chaplin praised Britain's socialized medicine plan Thursday as a "grand thing" that will mean healthy future generations for this country.

Speaking as guest of honor at a luncheon given by the Variety Club of Great Britain, Chaplin recalled his early days in London and said:

"I remember looking at the pale faces of the Cockney kids with their rotten teeth and everything else, and one felt so impotent about it all."

"Today you have social medicine. I see rosy cheeks, bright, vigorous active children who are the future of England. Social medicine is a grand thing for that reason because it is taking care of our future generations."

Chaplin arrived here three weeks ago on his first trip back to Great Britain in 21 years. He is a British subject.

Chaplin made no mention of a threat by the U. S. attorney general to bar him from re-entering the United States.

The little comedian described the United States as a "wonderful country" and England as "grand."
