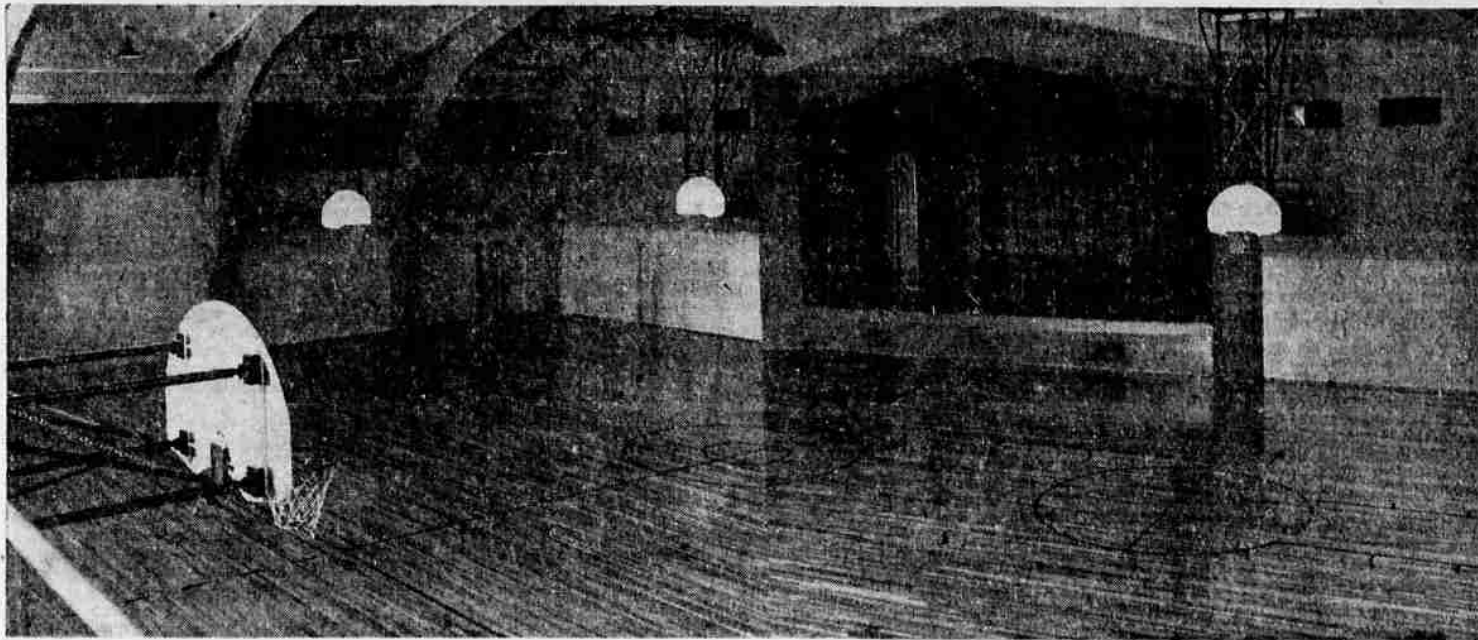




General Public Invited To Attend Open House At Glide's New School

The general public will have an opportunity to observe Glide's new \$400,000 high school, which is conceded to be one of the most modern, up-to-date buildings in the state.

Open house is scheduled for Friday, Oct. 18, between the hours of 7 and 10 p.m. There will be a brief program, but most of the evening will be given over to visiting the new building, according to Supt. Byron Evans.

The school consists of a gymnasium, science laboratory, home-making laboratory, library, conference room, five general classrooms and offices.

The structure, designed by Architects Freeman, Hayslip and Tufts, is brick veneer, with considerable raked cedar on the outside.

Finest Materials
Plywood and acoustical tile are the principal finish materials, including makogany plywood in the offices. The floor is cement, covered with asphalt and rubber tile. The ceilings are also of acoustical tile.

The structure, including the large gymnasium, uses laminated wood arches for roof supports, and these are worked into the interior design.

The gymnasium is designed to serve, as well, as an auditorium. It contains a balcony at the west end, and a stage at the east end. Folding bleachers will eventually accommodate up to 1200 for basketball games, and 1500 when the gym is used as an auditorium.

However, all the bleachers have not been installed.

The laminated beam structure eliminates posts any place in the gymnasium or balcony. The stage has a cyclorama curtain of fire proof fibre glass.

Shop Well-Equipped
The well-equipped shop building is a separate structure, at the north end. The greater part of one

wall is of directional glass blocks. The school has complete inter-communication system. The school covers 30,000 square feet of floor area. Its basic facilities are designed to provide for expansion to 50,000 square feet. The present enrollment is 136, but the structure can handle up to 250, and eventual expansion can accommodate up to 450 students. There are now 19 teachers. The high school serves the entire consolidated Glide area, which takes in Deer Creek and Toketee. Three grad schools are maintained, with 140 students at Toketee, 130 at Deer Creek, and more than 200 at Glide Grade School. There are 33 teachers in the overall system.

U.N. Eyes Case Of Shunted Man On Ferry Aboard

HONG KONG — The United Nations took a hand Wednesday in the case of M. P. O'Brien, the man without a passport who is trapped on the Hong Kong-Macau ferry.

Thomas Jamieson, U. N. Commissioner for refugees in Hong Kong, said his office has been trying to determine O'Brien's nationality.

O'Brien has been riding the ferry since Sept. 16. Neither Macau nor immigration officials here will admit him.

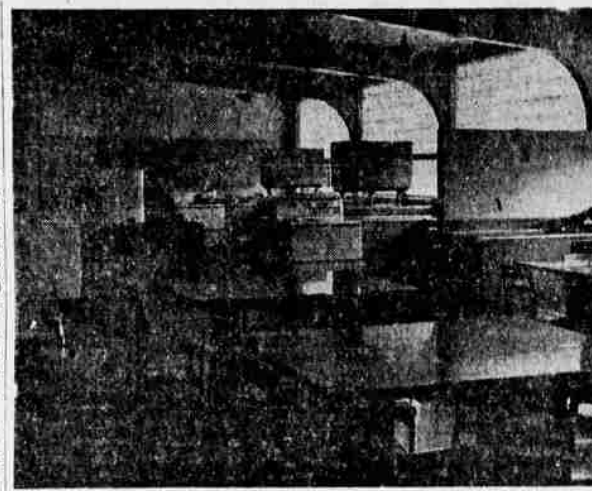
Jamieson said O'Brien told him he was born of Irish immigrant parents in Tacoma, Wash., 57 years ago; went to Shanghai in the early 1920s, and has a wife and child still in Shanghai.

The U. S. State Department reported O'Brien is a Hungarian national with no claim to U. S. citizenship.

O'Brien left Shanghai in June traveling on an International Red Cross document. Macau, a Portuguese possession off the China coast, permitted him to enter on the promise he would leave within a week.

He boarded the ferry for Hong Kong and was trapped there when Hong Kong refused him admission.

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Grand Champion Of Stock Show Brings \$7,000

PORTLAND — A new record price of \$7,000 for a beef animal was paid at the Pacific International Livestock Exposition here Wednesday.

The show's grand champion Aberdeen Angus brought that price at an Angus breeding sale. H. W. Ray, Hillsboro, Ore., bought the cow, Eline Reia E., from Charles and Catherine Ryan, Anderson, Calif.

Ray paid about \$30,000 for 12 head of stock at the sale.

Top bull price was paid by Leo Hahn, Central Oregon ranch owner for Burgess B. 5th, owned by Edward E. Parsons and Son, Payette, Ida. The show's grand champion bull was sold by Lenhard Brothers, Deer Park, Wash., to Ray for \$2,500.

Some 25 Angus females sold for \$29,175, while 20 bulls brought \$20,655.

The grand champion Hereford steer, owned by Irvine and Timm, Dysart, Ia., brought \$2 a pound at auction. A group of 19 Western Hereford breeders bought the steer and donated it to the Shrine Hospital here. Counting prizes, the steer brought \$3,100.

Auction buyers paid a total of \$87,900 for 222 steers and 159 lambs shown by 4-H club and FFA members. Steers averaged 37 1/2 cents, compared with a market price of 33, and lambs averaged 32 cents a pound, eight cents above the market. Prices were down from last year.

AD SUMS REVEALED

NEW YORK — Stocks of 40 of the 50 companies with the biggest 1951 newspaper advertising appropriations were listed on the New York Stock Exchange.

Together they spent \$170,030,464. Four spent more than 10 million dollars each with newspapers. They were General Motors, \$23,794,000; Procter & Gamble, \$14,179,000; Chrysler, \$13,519,000, and Colgate-Palmolive-Peet, \$10,842,000.

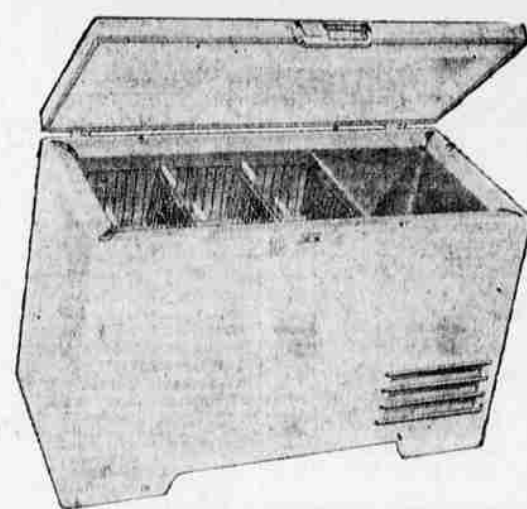
