

Hard Top Racing Proves Popular

Large Crowd Turns Out For Events

Whitey Dage Winner Of Trophy Dash; Wife Also Places Near Top

Track Manager Joe Wade was bug-eyed at the whopping attendance Sunday that greeted what he had earlier termed "just a workout" for Roseburg's new auto racetrack.

Since no admissions were taken to be counted, no official figures on attendance could be made. But a count of cars which overflowed the parking lot and ribboned down the long entry road showed approximately 700 vehicles. At an average of three persons per car, this would mean over 2,000 spectators.

It certainly marked a thumping vote of approval for hardtop racing in the area, in spite of the rough spectator facilities available.

Even without the facilities for full spectator comfort, the large crowd that turned out had little to desire for efficiency and thrills.

Full Racing Slate
With the aid of the Grants Pass Racing Association, the full slate of races was run off without hitches or time lapses. As for action, the unfamiliar quarter-mile oval had many cars hopping into the hedges on the far straightaway or spinning out on the turns. There were no serious collisions, however.

Roseburg's Whitey Dage highlighted the afternoon with victories in the trophy dash and 15-lap main event. Dage was clocked in the five-lap trophy race in 1:54.2, and he completed the hectic main event in 5:43.75. He carried off most of the hardware in the 15-lap field. His diminutive wife, Jesse, made it a family affair by scoring a second in the post-race Power Puff Derby. Bobbie Grimmer of Grants Pass won the five-lap affair in 2:38.70 minutes.

The first far turn on the track erased several speedsters from the races during the afternoon. It was apparently rough at the crucial cramp of the wheel, because all but two races saw at least one car spin out or careen off the tracks at this exact point.

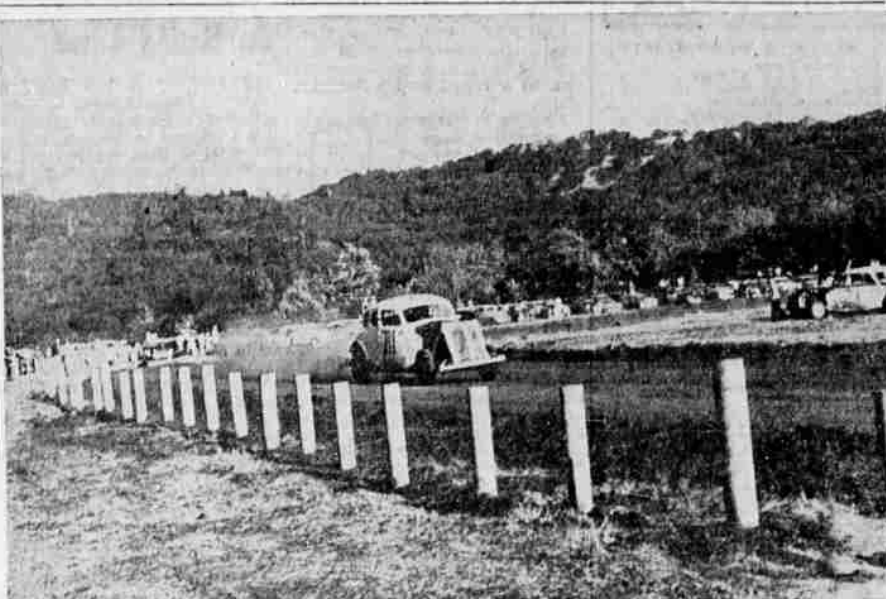
Leader Spins On
As an example, the main event saw Johnnie Jones of Myrtle Creek take an early lead for four laps before losing control for seconds on that turn. It was just long enough for three other cars in the race to pass him. Several laps later, Louis Donelan, another Roseburg pacer, spun out on that turn to give the lead to the eventual winner, Whitey Dage. In that same race, Lyle Westcott bounded clear over the bank on that turn.

The closest thing to a crack-up came in the semi-final, won by Don Benson. The ill-fated event ended with only three cars after three others tangled on that same far turn to stop the race momentarily. Although no serious damage was suffered, all three were removed from the track.

The three 10-lap heat races were won by Benson, Gene Godfrey and Dage. Dage had the fastest time of the three with a mark of 3:34.35. Benson's time was 4:23.1 and Godfrey was clocked at 4:19.21.

SADDLE BRONC WINNER

Stanford Looks Good In Beating OSC 41 To 28

PALO ALTO, Calif. (AP) — The Stanford Indians might have been running plays with a rocklike defense Saturday to overpower Oregon State's Heavies 41-28 in their Pacific Coast Conference football encounter here.

The Heavies, who almost upset mighty Michigan State the previous week, were outplayed for three quarters against the Indians but turned Stanford fumbles into three quick touchdowns in the final period when Coach Chuck Taylor sent in his reserves.

Stanford scored three touchdowns in the first period and added three more in the third.

Oregon State's first tally came in the third when left halfback Wally Jackson scampered 39 yards to paydirt.

In the final period, fumbles deep in Indian territory by Stanford's rookie quarterback Jack Robert set up OSC touchdowns. Each time, OSC moved the ball to the one-yard line and quarterback Jim Withrow passed to Jack Gotta in the end zone for a touchdown.

Three Stanford touchdowns were on long runs by Indian regulars. In the first period, right half Bill Rogers raced 96 yards from scrimmage to the OSC goal line. In the third period, fullback Bob Mathias, Olympic decathlon champion, scored from 61 yards out and safety man Joe St. Geme ran 60 yards after intercepting an OSC pass.

Michigan State Spartans Lead Nation's Football Greats Afters Big Victory

NEW YORK (AP) — With the unceremonious demise of Princeton, the mighty Spartans from Michigan State today owned the longest winning streak in college football—18 games—and they show no signs of letting up there.

Maryland and Georgia Tech each have gone through 18 games without a defeat, but they've been tied.

Michigan State still has six games to play so it's rather early to be predicting another undefeated season for them, but if they perform in the manner they did Saturday in hanging a 48-6 pasting on Texas A and M, their future opponents are not going to look to the Spartan games with any enthusiasm.

State still has to meet, in order, Syracuse, Penn State, Purdue, Indiana, Notre Dame and Marquette.

Notre Dame No Threat
Until it took a 22-19 beating from Pitt, Notre Dame probably would have been regarded as a threat to Biggie Munn's lads, who next year start operations in the Big Ten. But the Irish looked bad against the Panthers.

Maryland and Georgia Tech continue to roll along, and neither should be pressed to any great extent this week against, respectively, Navy and Auburn. The Terps polished off Georgia, 37-0, and Tech topped Tulane, 14-0, Saturday.

California, which has piled up a staggering 152 points in four games, seems assured of winning the Pacific Coast Conference title, although it still must get past Wisconsin California and UCLA.

Wisconsin, the class of the Big Ten, and No. 1 team in the country in last week's AP poll, was the victim of the biggest upset of the season Saturday. Ohio State soundly panned the Badgers, 23-14.

Badgers Still Have Chance
That made it a brand new race in the Big Ten, although there still is nothing to prevent Wisconsin from winning it. On paper, the Badgers still can field the most potent squad in the loop. However, as of today, Purdue, which trounced Iowa, 41-14, in its last outing, stands at the head of the class with a 2-0 league record.

Princeton's 1-7 defeat at the hands of Penn, strangely, was not a surprise. The Quakers were known to be powerful while Princeton, without the services of the graduated Dick Kazmaier, was an unknown quantity. Penn now should have no trouble sweeping to the league crown, held the last two years by the Tigers.

The Kansas-Oklahoma-Nebraska battle for the big Seven probably ended Saturday when Nebraska's hard luck kid, Bobby Reynolds, was hurt during the Cornhuskers' 27-14 triumph over Kansas State. This should narrow the race down to Oklahoma and Kansas, who had six enemy passes in the game. His defensive efforts repeatedly stifled the Christians in the first half.

Jack McGrath Winner Of Stock Car Races
POMONA, Calif. (AP) — Jack McGrath of South Pasadena, Calif., Sunday won the 100-mile AAA stock car race at Los Angeles County Fairgrounds and set a new track record.

McGrath's Hudson Hornet took the lead on the 22nd lap and never gave it up. His time was one hour, 59 minutes, 59.11 seconds. The old record of 2 hours, 1 minute, 33.10 seconds, was set by the late Jim Rigby on Feb. 24, 1952.

Second was Bob Christie of Grants Pass, Ore., and third was Sam Hanks of Glendale, Calif.

Dusette Defeats 'Jungle Boy' In Armory Bout

George Dusette chased the "Jungle Boy" all over the Roseburg Armory Saturday night before clamping on his lethal full Nelson for a match-winning third fall in the main wrestling event.

The "Jungle Boy" went nine minutes before finally dropping the popular Frenchman with a hangman's hold, but it took Dusette less than six minutes to snatch victory from the mouth of defeat.

The stocky little strongman bounced off the ropes two minutes after losing the first fall to take the second. The "Jungle Boy" flung Dusette against the ring ropes to break a headlock only to see him boomerang back for another headlock. The force of the return threw the "Boy" to the mat for a body press.

In the last fall, Dusette followed his hairy headed foe into the ringside section in an attempt to clamp on his full Nelson. The "Jungle Boy" kept squirming into the ropes before Dusette could get the full force of the hold. But he finally succeeded after 3 minutes 45 seconds.

"Judo Jack" Terry made his initial bow into Roseburg wrestling a success by stowing Cowboy Ace Abbott away with a sleeper hold in the semi-final. Using effectively a right hand caulked from his judo chops, Terry dropped the Texas badman in 15 minutes. Time elapsed before another fall.

The clean, scientific special event was a no-fall draw between Dale Kiser and Joe Gold, a classy looking newcomer.

Huskies Warned To Watch Ducks

SEATTLE (AP) — The bruised and battered Washington Huskies, licking their wounds after Saturday's 48-14 humbling by Illinois, came home from Champaign Sunday, and were told by a scout:

Oregon (Washington's Pacific Coast Conference opponent next Saturday) is a dangerous team.

End Coach Red Badgro, who scouted Oregon in its 41-7 loss to California, warned Coach Howie Odell the Washington pass defense which bogged down against Illinois "will have to improve tremendously on Saturday or George Shaw will spray passes all over the place."

Badgro pointed out Shaw completed 23 passes against California to break the conference record set by Washington's Don Heinrich the previous week.

"There's no reason to believe Shaw won't be throwing against us on Saturday," Badgro said. Illinois' aerial attack and the Midwesterner's brilliant defense against Heinrich had the Huskies hopelessly outclassed at Champaign. Tommy O'Connell threw five touchdown passes in the first 30 minutes. Heinrich connected on only 14 of 39 passes. Washington scored its two touchdowns in the final periods when Illinois reserves were on the field.

Giants, 49-ers Win Contests For Top Spots

NEW YORK (AP) — The New York Giants and the San Francisco 49-ers, boasting the only unblemished records in the National Football League, ranked as the sole leaders of their respective divisions Monday.

The Giants moved into undisputed possession of first place in the American Conference by defeating the Cleveland Browns, 17-9, Sunday, while the 49-ers were thwarting their most formidable challengers, the Detroit Lions, 28-0. The victors now own identical 3-0 slates.

The Giants' stubborn defense, bulwarked by the stellar line play of Arnie Weinmeister, former Washington ace, and Bill Albright completely stifled the Cleveland ground game. The Browns only could gain 21 yards rushing, although they picked up 236 yards passing.

San Francisco's almost impregnable defense held the Lions to a net gain of 65 yards. Elusive Hugh McElhenny, the rookie from Washington, and rugged veteran Joe Perry compiled most of the ground-gaining yardage for the bruising 49-ers.

The Bruins therefore are bowl-bound until side-tracked. So are California and Southern California, the other main contenders.

Stanford looked great for three quarters while crowning Oregon State, 41-28 last week. Second and third stringers couldn't maintain the pace in the last period. Three fumbles by them meant three touchdowns for OSC.

The UCLA-Stanford set-to is a toss-up.

Other conference games bring together Oregon and Washington at Seattle and Southern California and Oregon State at Portland.

Ducks, Huskies Losers
Washington suffered stunning losses in its last two outings, 32-7 by UCLA and 48-14 by Illinois, but it may have the manpower to outlast Oregon. Oregon's thin forces fell apart before California's crushing attack after holding the Bruins to a 7-7 tie at halftime. The final count was 41-7.

Southern California, another undefeated giant beat a star-packed San Diego Navy team 20-6 last week and figures to take the measure of Oregon State.

California, also boasting an all-win record, should have no difficulty in increasing the string at the expense of Santa Clara in their non-conference contest at Berkeley.

Idaho entertains North Dakota State in a non-league game at Moscow. Washington State, highly placed in pre-season forecasts, appears doomed for its fourth successive defeat in its game with Ohio State at Columbus.

NCAA Considers TV Fund Split

CHICAGO (AP) — With a recent Notre Dame blast at collegiate television policies still resounding, two committees of the NCAA met today to work over TV and other plans for the future.

A four-day general policy going-over was in prospect. Besides the television problem, the committees planned to take up such things as post-season competition and alleged nonobservance of NCAA rules by at least three of its members.

Names of the schools involved in the reported infractions have not been made public.

The committees on hand are the NCAA Executive Committee and the NCAA Council. The overall purpose of the meetings is to shape various reports for final action by the NCAA Convention in January.

Notre Dame spokesmen say they have learned a "share the wealth" TV program is being prepared by NCAA bodies. They say the plan would split money received in the association's controlled video program among all members.

Roseburg Frosh Lose To Marshfield, 31-6
Only the field was different Saturday afternoon as the Roseburg freshmen gridlers lost their second straight to a Marshfield freshman-sophomore team. The score was 31-6, this time at Marshfield. This Friday, the Roseburg frosh invade Grants Pass for a game with the Caveman freshmen.
