ponents, the Illinois governor declared:

"There are some desperately important issues, although you would never guess it from listening to the Republican candidates. They don't like to talk about issues very much. They prefer slogans, emotion and confetti."

"Eisenhower's advance men have furnished confetti for the crowds which turn out to greet him."

"It's easy to understand why when you look at the voting record of the Republicans in Congress for the last 20 years, you can see right away why they decided that the less said about the issues the better."

Stevenson said that in cattle country language "Old Guard reactionaries" now "own the Republican party, noofs, hide and tailow."

"They control the Republicans in Congress," he said. "The Republican candidate for the presidency does their bidding by conviction, persuasion or intimidation, I know not which."

"They have grabbed control of the Republican campaign — and they are quite frank about their plans to dominate the White House and the Congress if they ever get a chance."

### Glide District Votes Friday On Withdrawal

A special election will be held at the Glide High School on Oct. 17, at 7:30 p. m., to vote on the question of withdrawing from the Douglas County Rural School District.

Glide School District 12 has been re-classified, effective June 15, 1952, as a first class school district, since the school census completed Aug. 25 of this year, revealed the number of school age children to be in excess of 1000. However, it is up to the legal voters of the district to make the decision whether to remain a part of the rural district.

Only registered voters who have been residents of Glide school district for the past six months are eligible to vote.

There has been a rumor to the effect that if Glide schools withdraw from the Rural School District, the school desks will be removed from the class rooms and Glide schools must purchase new desks. Such statement from anyone either within or outside Glide district is definitely untrue. All desks are the property of the Glide schools, the school officials have stated.

Another untrue rumor circulating is to the effect that if Glide schools withdraw from the Rural School District, there will be no more free text books. Free text books will continue to be furnished the elementary grades. The high school students have always been required to purchase their own text books in accordance with Oregon state law.

### Oregon Convict May Have Gone Into California

MEDFORD — Gerald Macomber, 29, the elusive escaped convict, was believed Monday to have slipped over the Oregon border into California.

State Police Captain Paul Parson said a stolen truck was the clue that placed Macomber in Siskiyou County of Northern California. Parson said a pickup truck was stolen from Boyd Hamilton in the Applegate area Saturday night. The Siskiyou County sheriff found it abandoned in Northern California Sunday. It apparently had been driven over back roads across the state line.

Macomber, who escaped from the state prison at Salem Sept. 15, had been hunted in the Applegate area since Sept. 16. He once got into Northern California, then fled back to Southern Oregon. He had several brushes with police, but managed to slip away from them each time.

His partner in the escape from prison, Charles Crozier, was captured last month in one of the brushes with police.

### U.S. Wins Three-Year Fight To Fire Printer

WASHINGTON — The Supreme Court has finally ended the government's three-year, \$500,000 fight to fire a \$4,900-a-year printer in the government's favor.

The high court Monday refused to consider an appeal by Orton T. Campbell, who sought reinstatement in his job at the government printing office.

The Justice Department said he was discharged June 3, 1949 for misconduct, including defiance of orders and "false accusations" against his superiors.

Campbell, now a first lieutenant assigned to the 580th Reproduction Squadron at Gowen Field, Boise, Idaho, said his long court fight was aimed at clarifying the status of war veterans in government jobs.

ality and subversion in high places. And he added: "Why have we had these things? Because we have had leadership that was weak-kneed and soft-headed."

**Boos For Stevenson**  
The mention of Stevenson's name brought some boos from the throng.

Eisenhower said: "How can you be expected to have faith in this discredited regime? Are we ready here in America for a political halter and a one-party system?"

There was a swelling chorus of "Nos!"

Then Eisenhower turned to the tidelands question in which the Supreme Court has held that the federal government has "paramount rights" over the off-shore oil lands.

He said: "The attack on the tidelands is only a part of the effort of the administration to amass more power and money. . . I favor the recognition of clear legal title to these lands in each of the 48 states."

This brought an outburst of cheering. Stevenson has backed the position taken by President Truman who has supported federal control of the lands—and vetoed two bills by Congress to vest title in the states.
