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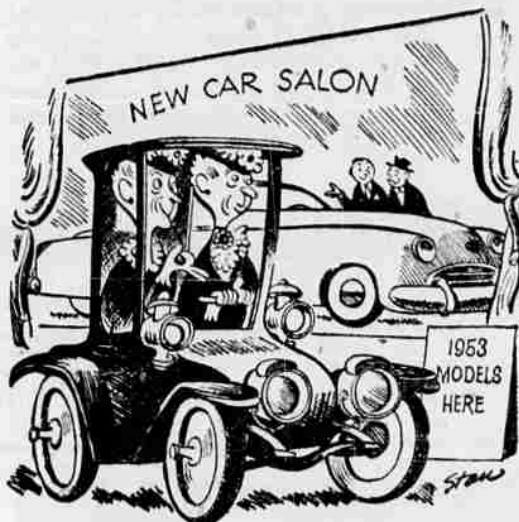
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Lookingglass

Erection of a Youth Center in Canyonville should begin within six months according to a measure decided by the legal voters of school district 8.

In adopting a motion to lease to the City of Canyonville lots three and four of block 19 in that city, the voters authorized the City of Canyonville to erect and maintain a youth center building which must be completed within two years.

The lease will further stipulate that if the youth center is inoperative for a two year period, the property will revert to the school district. The building may, according to the agreement, be used for other purposes at the discretion of the city council.

Young Oriental Without Country Imprisoned

PORTLAND, Ore.—Joe Oniru, a young Oriental, who hasn't revealed his correct age or what country he is from, was sentenced Friday to a federal reformatory.

U. S. District Judge Gus J. Solomon ordered him held there for five years or until he is 21, whichever term is shorter. Oniru had pleaded guilty to attempting to steal a mail bag at Eugene.

He first appeared in Portland in May, 1951. Since then he has been in trouble a number of times. Immigration authorities hold a warrant for his deportation but so far haven't executed it because they don't know what country he came from.

Three Prisoners Abduct Turnkey in Jail Break

BAY CITY, Mich. (AP)—Three prisoners who abducted a city jail turnkey with the promise "We won't kill you if you behave yourself" were objects of a police man-hunt in Eastern Michigan today.

Marvin Besteman, 25-year-old substitute turnkey at the Flint, Mich., city jail, about 45 miles south of here, escaped from his captors late Sunday when they forced their stolen panel truck to steal a car.

Spreading the alarm, the Flint city patrolman reported two of the fugitives made off in the stolen car and the other drove on in the truck.
