British Rejects Iran's Demand In Oil Dispute

LONDON (AP) — Britain has decided to reject Iran's demand for an immediate down payment of 2 million pounds (\$6 million dollars) as a first step toward an oil settlement, an official source said here Monday.

The British expect to have American backing in turning down Premier Mohammed Mossadegh's terms. Mossadegh told Britain six days ago she can send a negotiating team to Tehran to work out a deal if she pays up by Tuesday.

Train Incidents Not 'Politics,' Ike Assured

CLEVELAND (AP) — The head of the Brotherhood of Locomotive Engineers says politics has nothing to do with "repeated train handling incidents" involving Gen. Dwight D. Eisenhower's campaign train. "Any interpretation of these incidents as implying opposition to your candidacy is based wholly on misinformation and slander," James P. Shields, grand chief engineer, said Sunday in a wire to Eisenhower.

Shields said he had made a complete investigation of the "repeated" mishaps and found his men blameless. He said his organization has made no political endorsement and plans none.

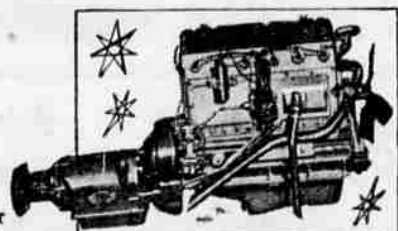
