Moe said they were Ron Knight and Ron Swisher, both of Grants Pass, Ore.; Louis Anderson of Kallispell, Mont.; and Dick McMillen and Bob Tedcum, both of Green Bay, Wis.

Knight was halfback on the Oregon High School Championship team last year. Anderson was all-state high school quarterback at Kallispell.

Colorado Backs, Lineman Named For All-America

DENVER (AP) — Two backs and a lineman who have starred in the early season success of Colorado University and Colorado A&M football teams have been nominated as candidates for the Associated Press All America team.

The nominations of quarterback Don Burroughs of Colorado A&M, fullback Ralph (Cactus) Curtis and offensive tackle Bill Allen of Colorado University were made by the Rocky Mountain Regional Selection Board.

Members of the board are John Mooney of the Salt Lake City Tribune, Chet Nelson of the Rocky Mountain News, and Herb Hunter of radio station KMOM of Great Falls, Mont. Nominations by the regional group will be considered in the final selection of the AP All America at the end of the season.

Gottschalk, a junior in business administration at the University of Oregon, is a reserve center on the Ducks football team.

Barbara Romack, Marilyn Smith Golf Favorites

FT. SMITH, Ark. (AP) — The opening round of the eighth annual Hardscrabble Country Club's invitational golf tournament for women began Tuesday with Barbara Romack of Sacramento, Calif., and Marilyn Smith of Wichita, Kans., sharing the role of favorite.

Miss Romack and Miss Smith each shot a one-over-par 76 over the slow, dry course Monday to share medalist honors. Defending champion Mary Lena Faulk of Thomasville, Ga., fired a 79. Betty Jameson of San Antonio, Tex., was a stroke behind the leaders with 77.

Fifty-one women are entered in the tournament, which ends Friday.

Waterfowl Hunt Starts Oct. 24

Oregon's migratory waterfowl hunting starts at noon Oct. 24 and will run for a straight 70-day period, closing New Year's Day, 1953.

Federal regulations covering Oregon's section of the Pacific flyway were concurred in by the Oregon Game Commission at a meeting of the Pacific flyway council in Klamath Falls last August where Oregon and California game commissioners agreed on a uniform opening date for both states.

Idaho's season opened Oct. 11 and Washington's opens Oct. 17.

To the daily bag and possession limit of 6 ducks, hunters will be allowed to add 2 widgeons (baldpates) or 2 pintails, or 1 of each, making a total of 8 birds.

Daily bag and possession limit on geese remains 6 including in such limit not more than 2 birds of the dark species — common Canada goose and subspecies and the white-fronted goose. There is a separate limit of 3 for brant (black sea brant only), formerly included in the goose limit.

Another revision in this year's regulations permits the shooting of waterfowl from a boat having a motor attached if the boat is fastened within or tied immediately alongside a stationary hunting blind.

The 1952 Pacific flyway seasons and bag limits are the most liberal in the four national flyways, and waterfowl breeding ground reports offer every indication that Oregon hunters will enjoy a successful season.

NCAA Awaits Bowl Tilt Word

CHICAGO (AP) — The policy directing NCAA Council awaited a report Tuesday on whether football bowl games spur pressures that lead to flagrant recruiting practices.

The report was prepared by a special extra events committee. Whether it will be made public immediately had not been determined but it probably will not.

Walter Byers, NCAA executive director, said chances are no official announcement of the report's content will be made until January at the organization's convention in Washington, D. C.

The NCAA's executive committee and the council are in the midst of a four-day meeting during which various programs are being shaped for convention action.

On tap are two controversial items, consideration of complaints against at least three member schools accused of rules violations, and future television policies.
