Morse Raps Ike On Oil Land Issue

WASHINGTON (AP) — Gen. Eisenhower practiced political expediency in supporting "the oil lobby" in the tidelands oil issue, Sen. Morse (R-Ore.) said Monday.

"It is a sad thing," Morse said in a statement, "that Eisenhower in apparent ignorance of United States Supreme Court decisions has been taken in by the selfish interests of America who seek to steal tidelands oil belonging to all the people of the United States."

"Political expediency may win him votes of certain coastal oil states on this issue but national security calls for the conservation of this federal asset."

Eisenhower knows that in the event of World War III the United States will need all of its oil reserves and it is inexcusable from the standpoint of national defense to support the oil lobby on this issue and open up the federal oil reserves beneath the sea to commercial exploitation."
