Wheat, Potato, Corn Crops Not To Meet Goals

WASHINGTON (AP)—The Agriculture Department, in a harvest-time report, Friday estimated this year's corn crop at 3,256,550,000 bushels and the wheat crop 1,298,921,000 bushels.

The corn estimate is 71,313,000 bushels more than last month's forecast of 3,185,237,000 bushels, and the wheat figure is 626,000 bushels more than 1,298,295,000 previously predicted.

By comparison, the corn crop compared with 2,941,423,000 bushels produced last year and 3,011,652,000 for the ten-year (1941-50) average.

It is below the government's goal of 3,375,000,000 bushels—a goal which was designed to add some grain to reserves for possible future emergencies.

Likewise, the wheat estimate compares with last year's small crop of 987,474,000 bushels and the ten-year average of 1,084,664,000. The government goal was 1,165,000,000 bushels.

Potatoes Also Under Goal

The potato crop was estimated at 345,561,000 bushels compared with 337,658,000 indicated a month ago, 325,708,000 produced last year and 414,325,000 for the ten-year average.

The government has said that a crop of at least 35,000,000 bushels was needed to assure consumers there would be no shortage next spring similar to that of the past spring.

The indicated production of other crops compared with last month's forecast, last year's production and the ten-year average, respectively, includes: oats, 1-265,660,000 bushels, 1,253,886,000 last month, 1,316,596,000 last year and 1,310,736,000 for the ten-year average.

U.S. Planes Fail To Halt Foe's Supply Lines

WASHINGTON (AP)—The Marine Corps commandant says the Air Force's program to disrupt enemy supply lines in Korea is a "fizzle."

He said Communists have brought up more guns than ever before.

But, Gen. Lemuel C. Shepherd said Monday, he thinks the continuing Air Force and Navy bombings of big power plants and key industrial centers in North Korea must have hurt the enemy, judging from the "awful screech and cry that has come from Moscow and Peking."

The Leatherneck chief was sharply critical of the Air Force interdiction program launched shortly after the Korean truce talks got underway and designed to operate around-the-clock in efforts to knock out enemy road and rail supply lines.

Not only has the program failed in Korea, Gen. Shepherd told a news conference called on his return from an inspection tour in Korea and the Pacific, but he said he questioned whether deep interdiction efforts to knock out such supply lines far from the front—ever could succeed completely.

CHARTER ACTION DEFERRED

The Myrtle Creek City Council met briefly Tuesday night to discuss a proposed new city charter. However, with only four of the seven council members present, action was deferred. Another meeting on the charter will probably be held next week, according to City Recorder G. D. Myltenbeck.

Jury Refuses To Indict Rivera On Rape Charge

CHICAGO (AP)—A grand jury has refused to indict Jim Rivera, Chicago White Sox outfielder accused of raping the young wife of an Army private, it was reported here Tuesday.

Rivera was accused by Mrs. Janet Gatter, 21, who said he offered to carry her packages to her apartment, then refused to leave and attacked her. Rivera was arrested Sept. 28 as he was leaving Comiskey Park here.

Rivera denied the charges. He said he was intimate with Mrs. Gatter but with her consent. He is at liberty under \$5,000 bond.

Rivera played with the Seattle Rainiers in the Pacific Coast League in 1951.

New Program Announced By Columbia Affiliate

The popular radio show "Visiting Time" will be broadcast through the facilities of the Columbia Broadcasting System by station KRNR beginning this Thursday at 7 p.m., station manager Leroy Hiatt said today.

After Nov. 4 the time schedule will change, as many programs do in the autumn, Hiatt said. 7:30 p.m. each Thursday evening.

The show, aimed primarily at rural and small town listeners, is designed to appeal to urban listeners also. Host and master of ceremonies of the half-hour variety show will be Cal Douglas.

The program will include a dramatic weekly narration by Douglas, based on "The American Way of Life," in which the show pays tribute to some of the "basic philosophies that have made America great," Hiatt said.
