CHICAGO — A committee arranging a \$50-a-plate Republican dinner in Chicago Oct. 27 said today that more than 3,000 persons have contributed funds to help pay for a nation-wide radio-TV broadcast by Sen. Joseph McCarthy.

McCarthy, Wisconsin Republican is to be the principal speaker at the dinner in the Palmer House.

He has announced his talk will be a report on the background of Gov. Adlai Stevenson of Illinois, the Democratic presidential candidate.

The McCarthy broadcast dinner committee is composed of 35 Chicago area civic and business leaders headed by Gen. Robert E. Wood, chairman of the board of Sears, Roebuck & Co.

Malheur County Polio Situation Becomes Grave

PORTLAND — An extremely grave polio situation was reported in Malheur County by Dr. Harold M. Erickson, state health officer, Tuesday night. He declared the county a polio emergency area.

He appealed, at the same time, for more nurses for the Malheur Memorial Hospital at Nyssa. There, he said, four nurses have been giving 24-hour care to 21 polio patients.

He said he had been advised by Dr. L. A. Maulding, Malheur County health officer, that the four nurses are near exhaustion.

Malheur County reported three more polio cases Tuesday. If the rate in that sparsely settled region were applied to the whole state, Oregon would have 2,430 cases instead of the actual 353, Dr. Samuel Osgood said. He is state epidemiologist.

On the basis of one case for every 5,000 persons, an area is considered to be having an epidemic. At that rate there is a polio epidemic in Malheur, Harney, Josephine, Jackson and Klamath Counties.

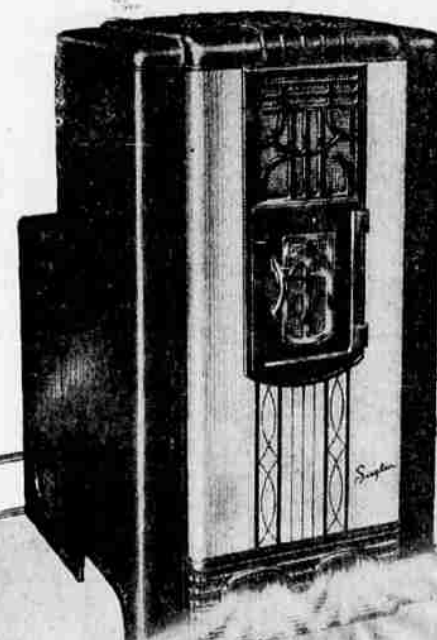
