Eisenhower said it was impossible to pile deficit upon deficit and still have "the kind of economy we have now."
He declared Americans were being squeezed between taxes and prices and "as it all of this were not enough, why do we have to have any vestige of subversion or dishonesty in our government—in high places and in low?"
U.S. Strength Superior
He said Soviet satellite armies now number more than one million men—"perhaps the most thoroughly internationalized army in history."
But he declared "the strength of the enemy... cannot match our own at its best."
The general said that, above all, "we have a matchless spiritual strength—beyond our enemy's reach or understanding. It is a strength that fortifies a civilization beginning in man as made in the image of God."

Aircraft Plant Strike Settlement Announced

WASHINGTON — The Federal Mediation Service Friday announced settlement — subject to union ratification — of a two-month wage dispute between the AFL unionists and the Douglas aircraft plant at El Segundo, Calif.
Assistant Mediation Chief Clyde Mills said the settlement provides an average wage boost of five cents an hour for 13,000 Douglas production workers.
Mills said the settlement also provides several fringe benefits but could not estimate their value.
The settlement is retroactive to Aug. 25, expiration date of the previous contract. Douglas pay rates now range from \$2.07 to \$2.28 for the top labor grade.

Bullet Kills Another Oregon Deer Hunter

PRINEVILLE — A rifle shot killed another deer hunter in Central Oregon Thursday, the fifth person fatally wounded in Oregon this season.
William Henry Kalk, Portland, was struck by the bullet in the Ochoco Mountains east of Prineville.
State Policeman Vernon Boyer said Kalk was one of six Portlanders hunting the area. Boyer said Kalk apparently stepped into the line of fire of another member of the party.
Boyer did not disclose who fired the shot, saying that he and the county coroner still were investigating.

Glendale Fliers Lease New Strip For Air Field

Glendale fliers have organized as an airport corporation, and, according to E. L. Nace, have leased ground from him at Fortune Branch for construction of a landing strip and other facilities.
Plans are being pushed to ready the strip before bad weather sets in. It is expected that eight planes will be based there. Planes are being temporarily parked on ground owned by Ora Conroy on Highway 99 near the Quings Creek store.
Glendale lost its CAA emergency landing field Oct. 1, when, at the expiration of its lease, Wilton Garrett, one of the owners of the ground, indicated he wished to terminate the contract.
The last official use of the airfield near Glendale was made Oct. 4, when a "mercy plane" from Dillard was landed at the already partially dismantled strip in a vain effort to save the life of Geoffrey Fox, who was to have been taken to the Doernbecher Hospital in Portland by plane, but did not survive the ambulance trip from Canyonville to Glendale.
Fliers of the community, feeling this incident indicated the need for a field available for emergencies, went into "high gear" and drew up a five-year lease with Nace.

Gifted Student Type Topic At Workshop

Teachers, especially in small schools, were warned by Bernard not to give too much time to or become too closely associated with gifted students, thereby making them "teachers' pets."
Bernard also pointed out to teachers that thinking consists of three processes: (1) preparation, (2) incubation and (3) illumination. Sufficient time must be given for incubation and students shouldn't be pushed, he said.
Speaking along similar lines, Dr. Walter Snyder pointed out the need for better use of the special education facilities for gifted children. He listed many facilities available in the state, but suggested development into new applications of known techniques.
The greatest problem in education of gifted children is to offer equal challenge in the pursuit of knowledge as is offered in the pursuit of sporting competition, Snyder told the institute.
Following his speech, the audience broke up into small groups for sectional meetings. At 2:30 there was a panel discussion and summary conducted by Dr. Henry Stevens from the General Extension Division and five members of a panel. They evaluate the meeting with the teachers participating.

Two Indicted On Charge Of Falsehood To RFC

WASHINGTON — Jacob Freidus and Larry Knobl, figures in the Congressional investigation of former Asst. Atty-Gen. T. Lamar Caudle, were indicted Friday on charges of making false statements to the Reconstruction Finance Corporation.
The indictment returned by a federal grand jury accused Freidus and Knobl of giving false information in several letters and financial statements submitted to the RFC during attempts to buy the assets of the Aircon Manufacturing Co., Kansas City, Kans., about two years ago.

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
