Extension College Course Needs Students

The general extension college course in tests and measurements (Ed 418 or 424) which met at the Junior High school for the first time Wednesday night, will be discontinued unless more persons register, it was reported today.

Only 13 attended the first meeting and at least 18 are needed. Next class meeting will be at 7 p.m. Wednesday in the Junior High. Instructor is Dr. John Schultz of Southern Oregon College, Ashland. The course may be taken for either graduate or undergraduate credit.

Gen. MacArthur Stays On Ballot In Washington

OLYMPIA — The state supreme court Tuesday denied an application for an order that would have deleted the name of Gen. Douglas MacArthur from the Washington state election ballot.

MacArthur was nominated as a candidate for president of the United States by the Christian Nationalist party. His running mate for vice president is Jack B. Tenney.

Republicans headed by Lou Kessler of Seattle brought the court action to have MacArthur's name removed from the ballot.

They argued that MacArthur and Tenney were both Republicans and to have their names on the ballot, along with that of the Republican D. Eisenhower, would confuse the voters of the state.

Soon after hearing oral arguments on Kessler's request for a writ of mandamus Chief Justice E. W. Schwelmbach wrote the word "denied" in the court's record book.

Woman Worker Of U.N. Admits Ex-Tie With Reds

NEW YORK — An American woman employee of the United Nations told the Senate Internal Security subcommittee Wednesday she had been a Communist—the first of 13 witnesses to concede affiliation with the party.

The committee is conducting hearings here into possible subversion among United States employees of U.N.

Ruth Elizabeth Crawford, of Manhattan, a publications officer of the U. N. children's fund, said she joined the Communist party in 1935, was a member for more than a year, and was "not apologetic" about it.

The previous 12 witnesses, all United States citizens employed by U. N., declined to say whether they were or had been Communists.

All 12 cited the fifth amendment to the constitution on grounds of possible self-incrimination.

Miss Crawford, who said she earns \$9,000 a year, was questioned by Sen. Herbert O'Connor (D-Md.), presiding at the hearing. She declined to say who invited her to join the party and would not say whether she belonged to any particular unit of the party.

She also declined, citing the fifth amendment, to say whether party meetings had been held in her home.

O'Connor asked whether she had disclosed her past Communist affiliation when she applied for a U. N. position.

"No," she said, "I did not disclose that because no one asked me."

U.S. Levies Huge Sum To Collect On Tax Frauds

WASHINGTON — Tax fraud investigators reported Wednesday they had laid a total of \$1,645,830 in assessments against 414 persons for money received from payoffs or graft—but not reported as income.

The report covered the fiscal year which ended last June 30. James Guthrie, chief of the special tax fraud division of the Internal Revenue Bureau, said virtually all the cases concerned public officials of one kind or another.

Of the 414 cases, the report said, 25 criminal prosecutions were recommended.

Guthrie said he could not disclose the names of the public officials concerned because some of them are now up for criminal tax fraud prosecution, and others will not be prosecuted.

He said cases in which there will be no criminal prosecution are those in which the bureau was unable to get sufficient evidence to make successful prosecution a probability.

In most of these cases there will be civil prosecution for recovery of taxes allegedly not paid, Guthrie said.

Riotous Red Editors Arrested In France

BORDEAUX, France — Two directors of the Communist newspaper Les Nouvelles de Bordeaux have been arrested and charged with provoking pillage. The charge was an outgrowth of a Communist sacking of the U. S. Information Service office here last May.

The Reds smashed into USIS headquarters during anti-Ridgway riots, tore up large numbers of American publications and caused heavy damage.

The newspaper published a story calling the raid "a victory for France." The two directors are Henri Bordage and Raoul Martin.

Sgt. Boyer Returned; Now Awaits Discharge

Sgt. 1-c Glenn L. Boyer, who has been serving the armed forces with the 40th Division in Japan and was in combat in Korea for the past 19 months, returned to San Francisco on the Gen. John Pope Oct. 12.

Sgt. Boyer is now at Camp Stoneman at the separation center, being processed for discharge. He is the son of Mrs. Blanche Boyer and is a native of Roseburg.

Failing To Help One In Danger Jails Farmer

LURS, France — Police Thursday jailed Gustave Dominici, 32-year-old farmer, in connection with the triple slaying last summer of British diet expert, Sir Jack Drummond, his wife and daughter.

Dominici was arrested and charged with failing to aid a person in danger, which is an offense punishable by a jail term of from six months to three years, and a fine.

The Drummonds were slain Aug. 5 as they camped by the roadside here in Southern France. Sir Jack and his wife were killed by bullets. Their daughter, Elizabeth 11, was beaten to death.

Dominici, who lives in a farmhouse not far from the scene of the slaying, first told police he heard shots during the night, did not investigate, but the next morning discovered the bodies.

He changed his story Wednesday and told police that the Drummond's daughter, Elizabeth, was still alive when he visited the slaying scene at 5:30 in the morning.

Mrs. Edwin Howard Jones, who served in the Connecticut legislature from 1946 to 1948 and as Waterbury commissioner of public welfare until her resignation May 2, was elected most worthy grand matron at the triennial convention of the general grand chapter.

She will be installed Thursday night along with other new officers, including Lloyd McCrae, Helix, Ore., right worthy associate grand patron.

Peeping Toms Warned By Town Meet Action

ANDOVER, Mass. — A legal curtain came down today on peeping Toms.

The attorney general's office yesterday approved an Andover by-law, passed by the last town meeting, reading:

"No person except an officer of the law in the performance of his duties shall enter upon the premises of another with the intention of peeping into the windows of a house or spying upon in any manner any person or persons therein."

Bread, Butter, Peace At Stake, Truman Argues

EN ROUTE WITH TRUMAN THROUGH CONNECTICUT — President Truman told New England voters today that their "bread and butter" and their chance for world peace are tied up in the 1952 election.

Truman derided the Republican slogan — "It's time for a change" — and declared, "No party is entitled to power because it lost too many elections in the past."

"I know many a baseball fan who was rooting for the Brooklyn Dodgers in the World Series just because the Yankees had won too many times," the President said. "It was time for a change."

"But you're not rooting at a ball game when you go to the polls Nov. 4. This isn't a ball game. And it isn't a beauty contest. This is your bread and butter. This is your chance of world peace."

Asserting the Republicans have lost elections "for good reason," Truman declared:

"The Republicans lost because they've put in 20 years of blind, thoughtless opposition to almost everything the Democratic party has done to help the ordinary citizen."

"They lost because they've been dominated by special privilege, by the lobbies because they've always voted with the special interests and against the people."

"They lost because they've been against world co-operation, against a healthy foreign trade, against aid to other peoples."

"They lost because they've been against minorities of all kinds, against the immigration into this country of Jews and Catholics, against equality of opportunity."

He declared Eisenhower has compromised so much that he "doesn't have much left to compromise."

WASHINGTON — Announced U. S. battle casualties in Korea reached 121,154 Wednesday, an increase of 885 since last week. The new totals are:

Killed in action, 19,051.
Wounded, 89,320.
Missing, 12,783.
Battle deaths, 21,233.
Current missing, 9,438.

Tennessee Rules Out Gen. MacArthur Ticket

NASHVILLE, Tenn. — The state attorney general's office has ruled that the Christian Nationalist Party's presidential ticket, headed by Gen. Douglas MacArthur, is not properly qualified in Tennessee.

An opinion written by Asst. Atty.-Gen. Knox Bingham says it will be necessary for the party's petition "to be revisited for electors have been put in nomination by a caucus, convention, mass meeting or other assembly... in this state at least 19 days previous to the day of the election."



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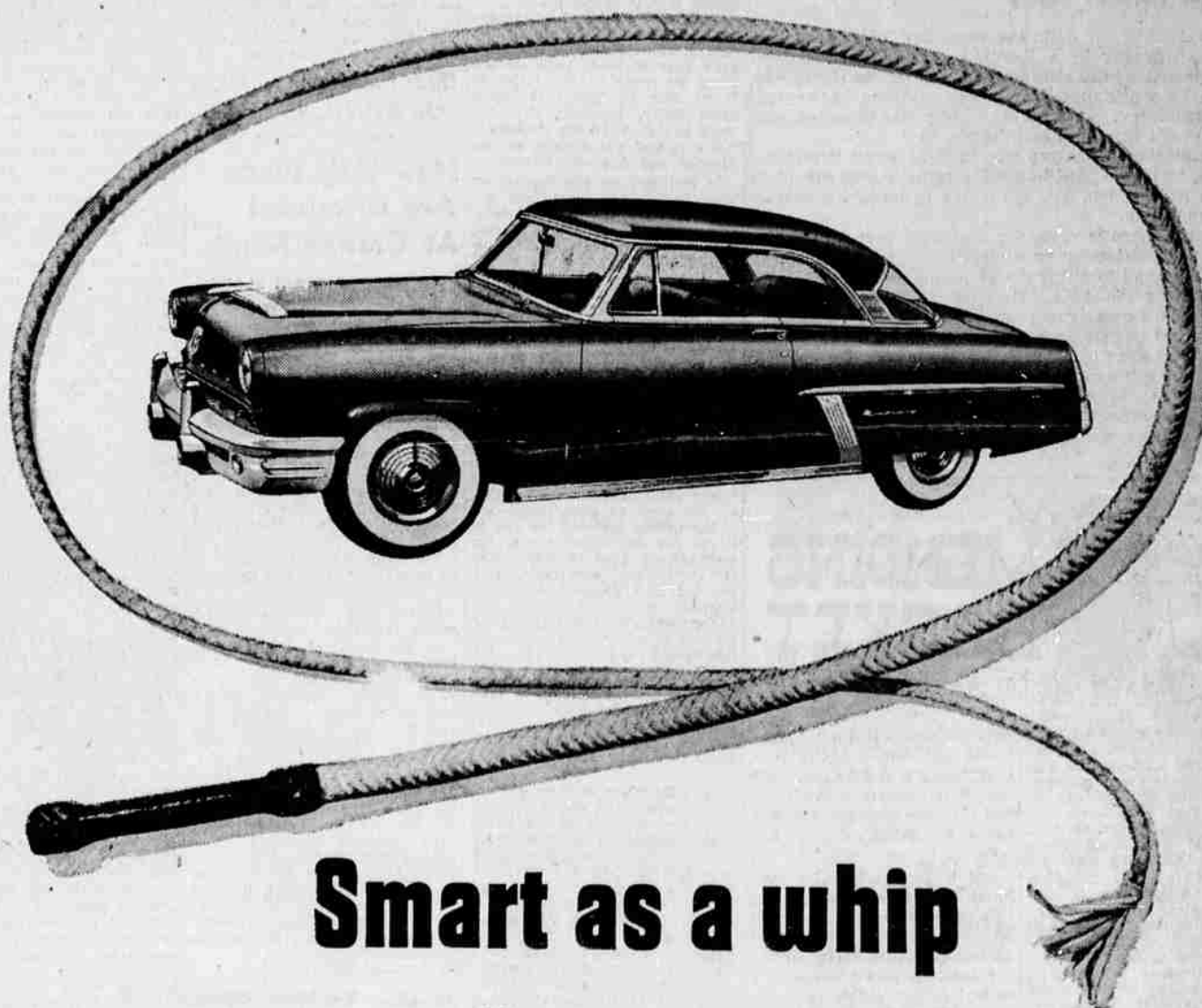
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
