Instructions For Bus Drivers Completed

The last of four schools of instruction for school bus drivers and inspections of busses in Douglas County was conducted Thursday at Myrtle Creek for drivers and busses in the southern part of the county.

Roseburg area busses and drivers gathered with their busses here on Wednesday, while Yoncalla hosted the northern and Reedsport the coastal area drivers on Tuesday and Friday, respectively.

Drivers brought their busses in to be inspected. Then, while the busses were tested, they attended a conference on "Safe and Economic Transportation for School Children" conducted by Paul Warren, state superintendent of driver education and training.

Warren discussed the driver-pupil relationship, administrative regulations governing school busses and passenger safety, among other topics. W. M. Campbell, assistant County superintendent, said, "Films and slides were shown to the drivers also."

Federal Attorney Quits Pending Income Probe

WASHINGTON (AP) — Howard L. Doyle today laid aside his duties as U. S. attorney for the Southern District of Illinois, pending investigations into his income from outside law practice over the last seven years.

Last week, Doyle told a House judiciary subcommittee he had received about \$86,517 from private law practice between 1945 and 1950, and that he had overlooked reporting about \$5,000 of this for income tax purposes until the committee subpoenaed his records.

The Justice Department placed him in a status of "suspended, by own request."

Retirement Irks So He's Back In School At 77

MIAMI, Fla. (AP) — Retirement, says 77-year-old Orra O. Bishop, is a waste of time.

So Bishop who was graduated from Michigan State Teachers College 52 years ago, has returned to school. He's studying for a master's degree at the University of Miami.

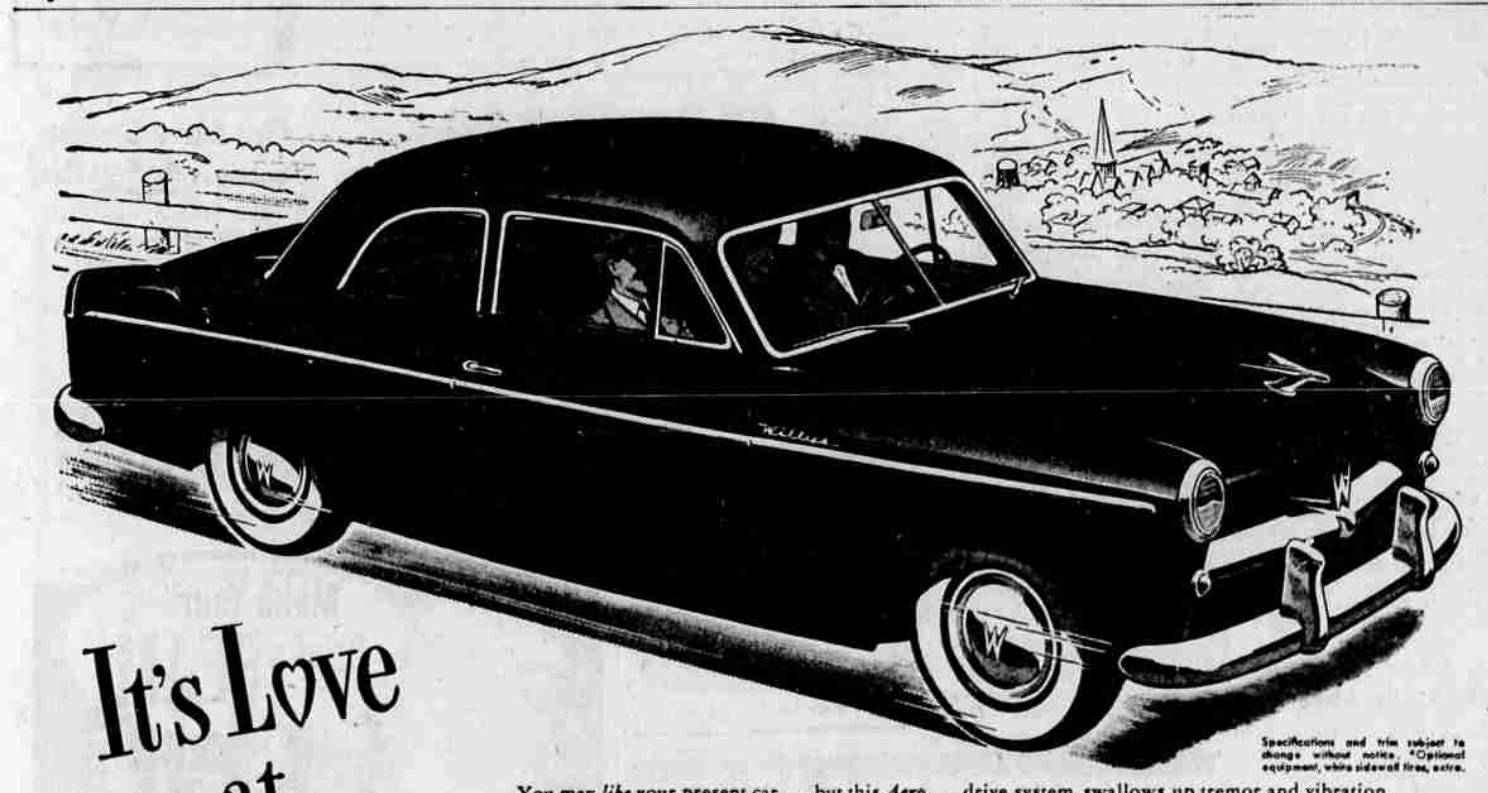
