Dr. Kirkland West Speaker At Meeting

At the October meeting of the Presbyterian Woman's Society, Dr. Kirkland West, former missionary to China and present pastor of the Medford First Presbyterian Church, challenged his audience to understand and to help eradicate the present threat of communism.

To understand the power of communism, Dr. West suggested persons realize the corruption of the Christian Church. Its failure to combat social evils stimulated Carl Marx to write his own religion using the high ideals of Christianity as propaganda, but replaced the teachings of the Bible with the theory that the end justifies any means. This obliterated morality so that the Communists could promise the Chinese adequate living standards then give them almost 100 per cent taxation and cancellation of their freedoms. Thusly, a lie, a murder, or a torturing could be explained by the Communists as a just means for their cause.

The eradication of Communism is harder than the understanding of it. Dr. West stated that while he was in prison, the communist jailer told him Moscow would control China in two years and the United States in twenty-five. China fell in half the time although one hundred thousand Communists were killed by the Nationalist army in one year. It stands that "Counterfeit Christianity" must be conquered by the practicing of true Christianity. In addition to a strong military defense, the Christian world must prove that its way of life is better than a life under Godless men. If people would illuminate complacency toward social evils and personal selfishness, they would be able to answer
