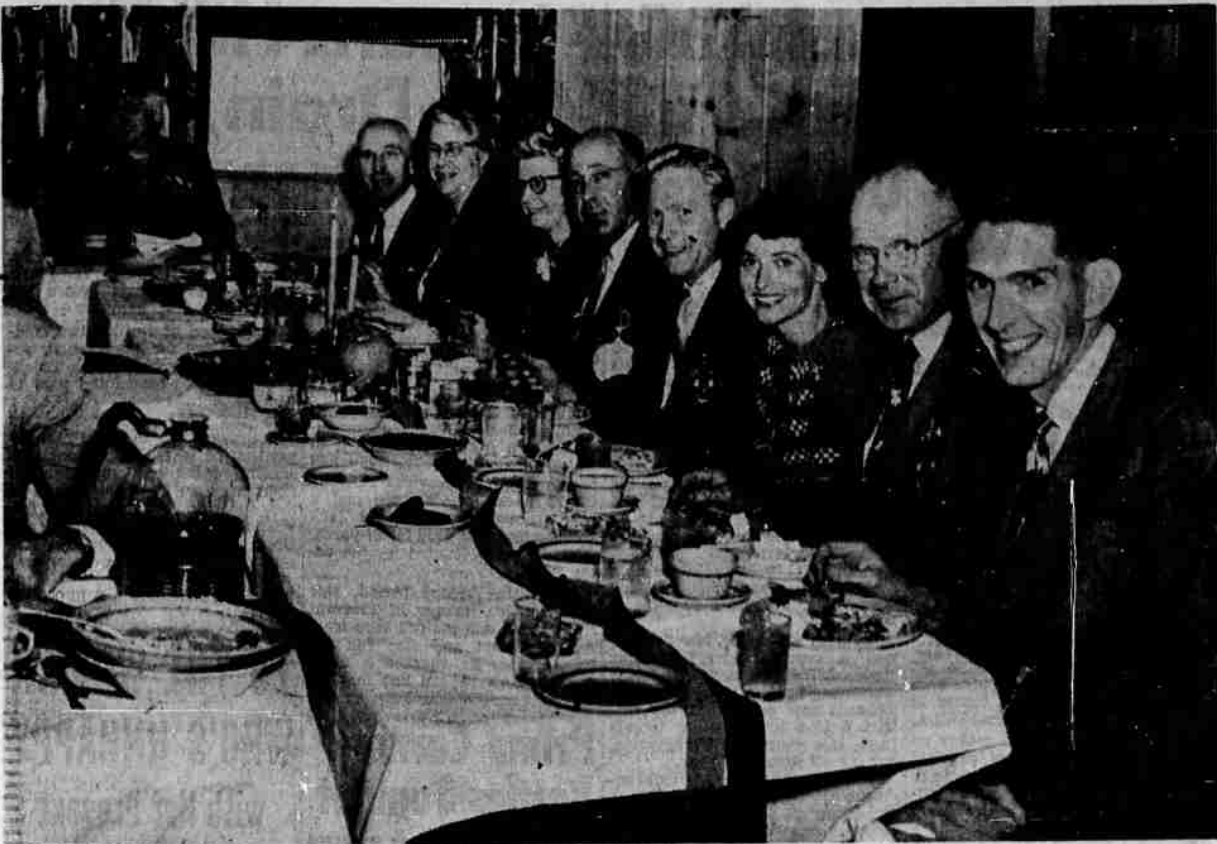

"The dynamite from the South," this was the description given the Umpqua Ski Patrol and Edelweiss Ski Club by officials of the Pacific Northwest Ski Association (PNSA) at the annual convention of PNSA held this past weekend at the Desert Caravan Inn in Spokane, Washington.

Organized last spring, the Edelweiss Ski Club was the newest and most distant club represented in the 300 member PNSA, a regional division of the National Ski Association.

The delegation from Roseburg, Fred Weber, Bob Matthews, and Nancy Brubaker, had thought they were going to the convention to find out what the PNSA was and how PNSA could help in building a winter sports program for the Roseburg area. After hearing such men

as Hjalmar Havan, manager of the U. S. Ski Jumping Team, describe the 1952 Olympics, and others, such as Bob Johnson and Buster Campbell, members of the 1950 U. S. Ski Team, discuss methods of improving Northwest skiing, the Edelweiss delegation thought that the ideas and methods they had learned had helped for the trip and would help build a better winter sports program for Roseburg.

Came the first surprise. PNSA thought it would work both ways. Surprised at the calibre and amount of work done by the Edelweiss Club and the Umpqua Ski Patrol in such a short time, the convention elected Weber as alternate delegate to the National Ski Association Convention in New York. Due to the number of dele-

gates elected, this means that Weber is practically assured of a seat as regular delegate.

Surprise number two. Weber was asked to teach a course in snow formation, snow dynamics, avalanche prevention, avalanche rescue, and preventive avalanche construction to a group of ski instructors meeting at Timberline Lodge in November.

In addition, the delegates receiving several invitations from other areas to visit and discuss methods of improvement and mutual benefit.

The impression gained at the convention was that the eyes of PNSA will be on Roseburg during the coming season to see if Roseburg can continue the fast pace it has started.
