Roseburg Loses Whopping 19-0 Lead In Second Half

The Roseburg Indians walked off the Cottage Grove field at half-time Friday night sporting a whopping 19-0 lead and proceeded to blow it in the second half as the Lions roared back to score a thrilling 20-19 victory.

Cottage Grove quarterback Lowell Radway sparked his team by heaving three touchdown passes, two to end Bill Sloan and the other to halfback Dwight Treat. Radway completed six passes in 18 attempts for a total gain of 143 yards, and ran for 35 of his team's total of 53 yards rushing to almost put on a one-man show for the packed stands.

The Indians capitalized on the "breaks" of the game to run up two of their three touchdowns in the first half. On the opening kick-off, Gene Lane booted one to the Cottage Grove 15 yard line, where the ball caromed off the leg of a Cottage Grove back, and a Roseburg lineman flopped on it on the defenders' five.

Danchook Goes Over
From there it took only two plays for the Indians' first touchdown, as Lane bucked to the two, and Steve Danchook bulled over for the score. Roger Oilar booted the conversion, and Roseburg led, 7-0 with less than two minutes gone in the opening period.

Cottage Grove threatened immediately as, on the second scrimmage play, Radway uncorked a pass to Sloan good for 40 yards and the Lions found themselves on the Roseburg 30 yard line. The threat fizzled out, however, and the Groves lost the ball on downs on the Roseburg 24.

After an exchange of the ball, the Indians capitalized on a pass interception by Lane for their second score. Lane captured the Radway toss on the Cottage Grove 30, and bulled us way back to the 19 yard marker, where, on the next play, Bob Thompson took off around left end on a beautiful run for 19 yards and the second Roseburg tally. This time Oilar's boot was blocked, and the Indians led 14-0.

Passing Nets Score
The passing of Harold Backen and Steve Danchook netted the Indians their final score. The first time Roseburg laid its hands on the ball, they started a march down the field from their own 25 and eventually ended up in pay-dirt.

Buzz Desliens started the drive with an eight yard sprint over through the line for a first down, and Backen threw a pass to Bob Brandt, good for 24 yards and another first down, this time on the Lion 37.

Two incomplete Backen passes bogged the drive down temporarily, but the Indian defense forced the Lions to punt, and Roseburg started out again from the Cottage Grove 20 after a 15 yard punt runback by defensive halfback Jim Kern. Halfback Thompson then corked off nine yards over center to the 11.

An offside penalty pushed the Indians back to the 16, but Backen hit Brandt in the end zone on the next play for Roseburg's final score.

Radway Starts Spark
The diminutive Radway, who accounted for most of his team's meager first-half yardage on quarterback sneaks, started the spark for the Lions by heaving a 28-

yard touchdown pass to Sloan after Cottage Grove had recovered Backen's fumble.

The Groves' defense then pushed the Indians over the field, and rushed Oilar so fast on his punt attempt, that the ball went straight up in the air, and Radway and crew took over on their own 40. An unnecessary roughness penalty against the Indians put the oval on the Roseburg 45, where Radway threw a 25 yard pass to Treat on the 20. On the next play, he hit Sloan in the end zone, and after the conversion was made good, the score stood 19-13.

A roughness penalty against Roseburg helped the Groves score their final touchdown, in the fourth quarter, as the 15-yard gain put the ball on the Indians' 35. Radway immediately unleashed a 25 yard beauty to Treat to tie the score at 19-all. The Lions then proceeded to push over the conversion, which proved to be the winning tally.

Roseburg started three long drives in the last part of the third and the fourth quarters, but they fizzled out. With a minute left to go in the third canto, the Indians made three straight first downs in four plays mostly on the running of Desliens and Thompson, and moved the ball from their own half-yard line to the 45 when the gun went off.

Interception Stops Drive
On the first play of the final period, however, a Backen pass was intercepted and that drive was stopped. Later in the period, the Indians drove for 61 yards from their own 15 to the Cottage Grove 25, again mostly by the efforts of Desliens and Thompson, with the short but effective charges of Danchook coupled in between, but Backen was thrown for a 20 yard loss while trying to pass, and that drive fizzled out.

With a minute left to play in the game, Roseburg fans came to life when the Indians recovered a Lion fumble on their own 40. Backen completed three passes, the first to Brandt for a 25 yard gain, next to Desliens for 10, and then to end Ron Hicks for another 10, but the game-ending run went off as Roseburg reached the Cottage Grove 18.

On the statistical end, the Indians were far out ahead, with 186 yards rushing to Cottage Grove's 53, and 98 yards passing to the Lions' 143, for total yardage of 284 ho the grovers' 196. Backen completed seven out of 15 passes attempted, but none of them scored, as did three of Radway's six completions. The Indians also led the Groves in first downs, 12 to seven, and in intercepted passes, two to one. However, the score remains, Cottage Grove 20, Roseburg 19.

UO's Brethauer Tops PCC Pass Nabbing List, Still Unnoticed

SEATTLE (AP)—Speed and weight are generally considered basic requirements for football players, but when you add up all the equipment, the kid with heart and desire is the one who makes your first team.

Which brings us around to Monte Brethauer.

Oregon's senior left end is a football replica of Joe Cloyd, the skinny, bespectacled wingman who gave Washington three years of honest effort and got hardly a

nickel's worth of recognition outside the squad.

Brethauer is 6 feet 1 inch tall but carries hardly enough meat to cover his bones, weighing in at 168. During the UCLA game in 112-degree weather he shrank to 155 pounds. Like Cloyd, he plays both offense and defense and turned in 56 minutes of action against UCLA.

Light and not fast he makes up for his apparent lack of physical ability by using his head and being letter perfect in his assignments," says Coach Len Casanova. An assistant coach slouched off the practice field one evening grumbled: "We had a lousy workout—Monte made two mistakes."

Seems like the guys of Monte's make up are doomed to go unnoticed no matter how well they work. Last week Brethauer was leading the Coast Conference in pass receptions with 18 and hardly got a mention. An Oregon wingman of a few seasons back, Dick Wilkins, was big, fast and flashy and got a lot of well-deserved publicity. Monte has beaten his Oregon record.

Monte—Cloyd before him—appears merely to be out there working; just punching the football time clock. Yet Brethauer has a good chance to break Bill McColl's conference and national record of 106 receptions in three years of varsity play. Within reach, too, is Ed Barker's coast mark of 47 in a single season.

Prior to the Saturday game against Washington Monte has caught 78 in his college career and needed to boost his average only a shade to overtake McColl. His 18 for this season left him 29 back of Barker.

Brethauer showed up at Oregon with no advance notice and couldn't work his way into the frosh lineup until the final game. Since then he's been a general handyman around the Webfoot grid camp, catching passes, kicking off, sharing in the punting and playing either end or halfback on defense.

And in the locker room he's a volunteer assistant trainer, taping other players and ministering to their bumps and bruises.

Roseburg boxers will host the Eugene club at the Armory Nov. 7 at 8 p.m. Coach Dick Gilman accompanied the local boys to Cottage Grove.

State Hatcheries Produce Record

Oregon's 14 game fish hatcheries produced for release in the 1952 trout season ending Oct. 12 a record breaking 535,000 pounds of fish.

Game fish production last year reached 489,000 pounds, the highest yet recorded previously.

State Game Director P. W. Schneider explains that the game commission is placing emphasis on pondage and not numbers of fish as the increased weight represents larger fish and a better return to the state's 275,000 resident and 25,000 non-resident anglers.

Fish reared in the hatcheries were rainbow, 429,000 pounds; coastal cutthroat trout, 48,000 pounds; eastern brook trout, 16,000 pounds; steelhead, 6,000 pounds; silver salmon, 16,000 pounds; and Chinook salmon, 13,000 pounds.

A smaller pondage of Atlantic salmon, Mackinac trout, brown trout, and landlocked blueback salmon were reared for particular waters in the state.

The state game director foresees no increase in game fish production until the new Leaburg hatchery on the McKenzie river is brought into production in 1954.

Hatchery supervisors and their crews worked at capacity to attain this year's record.

The Leaburg hatchery is being built by the army engineers, and will have an annual capacity for 500,000 yearling trout. Under stipulations made by the federal government all Leaburg hatchery fish must be stocked in the Willamette River basin to offset trout population losses brought about by Willamette Valley projects.

Klamath Falls Posts 7-0 Win Over Medford

The Dalles downed previously unbeaten, untied Baker, 12-0, in a major upset of Oregon high school football play Friday night.

The victory put The Dalles ahead of Baker, ranked No. 8 in this week's Associated Press poll, in the race for the District 7 championship in Class 1.

Another of the top 10 teams in the poll to fall was Franklin of Portland, ranked No. 6. The Quakers were crushed by Jefferson, the No. 10 team, 42-0. Jefferson, thus becomes a favorite to win one of the Portland league's two places in the state high school play-offs.

Grant, ranked No. 4 in the poll, continues to lead the Portland league after a 26-0 win over Cleveland.

Klamath Falls, the No. 3 team, won a crucial game defeating Medford, 7-0, on a third period touchdown by Jim Dougherty. The Pelicans now can clinch the District 6 title by defeating Grants Pass, last year's state champion, but far off form this year.

Hillsboro, rated No. 5, took undisputed lead in District 4 with a convincing 35-12 win over Oregon City, its closest rival.

St. Elmo closed a tie for the District 8 title by edging Lebanon, 26-25.

Albany, which had been tied with Bend, lost a non-district game to Eugene, ranked No. 8 in the poll, 27-19. Corvallis won a non-district game from Springfield, 18-7.

Marshfield, rated No. 1 in the state since the start of the poll, romped to a 39-0 victory over Reedsport, a Class 2 team. The Pirates' high-scoring halfback, Tom Crabtree, recorded three more touchdowns. A teammate, Stan Lewis, raced 79 yards for the longest touchdown run.

Marshfield's only threat in District 5 appears to be Eugene. Central Catholic of Portland, the No. 2 team and favorite for the Reedsport title, overwhelmed Parkrose, 42-7. Its chief rival, Gresham, was played to a 12-12 tie by Salem in a non-district game.

Prineville, ranked No. 7, continued unbeaten and untied by crushing Lakeview, 45-0, in a Class 2, District 8 game.

Also in Class 2, University of Eugene clinched a sub-district championship in district 5 by routing Willamette of Eugene, 40-0.

Pleasant Hill Ties With Drain, 13-13

Pleasant Hill scored an upset over the county's only undefeated football squad when they tied Drain, 13-13, Friday night.

The see-saw battle ended with the Warriors down on Pleasant Hill's four-yard stripe when time ran out.

The contest saw heavily-favored Drain take a slight edge in statistics with 16 first downs to Pleasant Hill's 201.

Drain hit pay dirt first toward the end of the first quarter when Fullback John Lovelace plummaged through from six yards out to make a touchdown. The play had been set up on previous runs by Quarterback Jim Whipple and a pass from Whipple to End Jack Weaver that was good for 27 yards. Dick Joslyn accounted for the extra point.

But in the second period, star Fullback Joe DePran of Pleasant Hill dashed into the end zone from six yards out and also ran the extra point. He sparked a drive from Drain's 44-yard line that set

up the TD. DePran—a team in himself—carried the ball 21 out of 23 plays in the first half. He made the second Pleasant Hill tally on a 28-yard run after intercepting a Drain pass and scampering 21 yards with it, just seconds before the end of the first half.

The second of Drain's two completed passes for the evening accounted for the final Drain Touchdown. Whipple tossed the pass to Weaver.

In the final quarter Pleasant Hill drove down to the Drain 19-yard stripe where Drain took possession of the ball and marched right back up the field with it to the opposition's four-yard stripe. That's when the game ended and Drain, for the first time this season, didn't chalk up a victory.

Primo Carnera Battles Tonight

A heavy turnout was expected at the Armory tonight as former world's heavyweight boxing champion Primo Carnera appears in a big seven-man battle royal.

The 6-foot, eight-inch "ambulating Alp" as he's called, will be featured inside the ropes with George Dusette, Jack Kiser, Judo Jack Terry, Cal Roberts and Art Kapitan.

Also in the battle will be Hardy Kruschamp a 240-pounder, Carnera's bodyguard and companion. Matchmaker Elton Owen says Carnera would consent to the battle royal only if Kruschamp were allowed to enter also.

Carnera won the boxing championship following a career of wrestling and appearing in Italy as a circus strongman. He KO'd Jack Sharkey in six rounds in 1932 for the championship, and lost it two years later when he was knocked out by Max Baer.

A \$350 purse will go to the winner and three matches will come out of the battle according to the order of elimination.
