Volunteers for Stevenson or the Citizens for Eisenhower, from trying to raise three million too.

State and county organizations also raise money on their own.

Labor Also Raising Funds

Organized labor also has been busy raising money.

The CIO would like to raise around a million dollars, with half of the money staying at the local level. Philip Murray, CIO president says:

"The CIO is doing the same as it has in other campaigns, collecting voluntary dollars from our people in the plants to help our candidates. The response, thus far, has been reasonably good."

The AFL estimated it will raise between \$400,000 and \$600,000 for its League of Political Education.

Labor's Committee for Stevenson and Sparkman, composed of representatives of about 100 AFL and railway unions, is receiving contributions from individuals but says it has no estimate of how much has been collected. The committee has a get-out-the-vote campaign, with \$2,000 in prizes to be awarded to winning locals.

Railway labor's Political League, composed of 19 rail unions, also collects from individuals. It, too, insists it has no figures on how much it has taken in.

Local Sailor Serves On Third Korean Tour

Bradley K. Burghardt, son of Mr. and Mrs. Esper D. Burghardt of 1407 Umpqua Ave., Roseburg, is serving aboard the USS Carmick, a high speed minesweeper on its second tour of duty in Korean waters.

Burghardt, who serves in the Engineering Department, reported aboard the Carmick in June, 1951. Before enlisting in the Navy Oct. 1, 1951, he attended Roseburg High School.

During her second tour off the Korean Coast, the Carmick has been active in minesweeping operations and has bombarded enemy shore installations at Chongjin, Tanchon, Songjin and Chahon. The ship was awarded the Navy Unit Commendation for her participation in the minesweeping at Chinnampo in Nov. 1950.

son for his deposition in the first trial of Alger Hiss."

In New York, James Hagerty, Eisenhower's press secretary commented:

"To paraphrase Shakespeare methinks the gentleman's friends protest too much."

The statement of the eight noted that John Foster Dulles, described as Eisenhower's principal foreign affairs adviser, was serving as chairman of the board when it rejected Hiss' resignation and voted him leave with pay to defend himself.

Observing that Eisenhower hadn't objected to the board's action, the statement continued:

"Surely the refusal to accept Hiss' resignation constituted a far greater and more personal endorsement of Alger Hiss than did Gov. Stevenson's report."

Cite Adlai's Restraint

The Stevenson supporters said that so far as they knew, no one in the Illinois governor's camp had "ever used these facts to discredit Gen. Eisenhower," adding:

"Moreover, we do not believe that they should, because an attack on him and his advisers on these grounds would be as unfair as the current Republican attacks on Gov. Stevenson."

"Criticism in neither case is fair or warranted. But if there is to be criticism, Gen. Eisenhower is more vulnerable than Gov. Stevenson."

bring basic minimum daily wages to \$17.85.

In announcing the WSB ruling, Board Chairman Archibald Cox, 40-year-old Harvard law professor, appealed to the "sound common sense of the coal miners and wisdom of their leaders" to abide by the decision.

Federal Right Disputed

A UMW official in Western Pennsylvania, who declined use of his name, said:

"No government agency should have the authority to disturb an agreement made in good faith. This agreement was made in good faith by union and industry. The industry has said it was able and willing to pay the increase. What right does a government agency have to upset an agreement made within the rules of our collective bargaining system?"

The government froze all shipments of soft coal from the mines, apparently in anticipation of a strike. Under the freeze, fuel can be channeled to consumers most urgently needing it if there is a long strike.

Enough coal already is above ground to keep most big industrial consumers supplied for 10 weeks.

The WSB ruling did not affect the hard coal miners, who are negotiating a separate contract.
