WASHINGTON (AP) — The Navy's second 60,000-ton super aircraft carrier will be named the "Saratoga" — sixth American naval vessel of that name.

Construction will begin in December.

The Navy announced choice of the name Thursday and said the keel of the ship will be laid in December at the New York naval shipyard.

The first of the Navy's big post-war carriers, the Forrestal, is under construction at Newport News, Va.

The first "Saratoga" served in the Revolutionary war. The last fought in World War II and later was deliberately sunk in the 1946 Bikini atom bomb tests.

School Officials Will "Air" District School Consolidation

William Bromley, principal of the Dillard School and Kenneth Barneburg, County School superintendent, will speak over KRXL at 12:15 p.m. Tuesday.

They will discuss the proposed consolidation of Dillard, Tenmile and Lookingglass districts. The consolidation vote will be held next Wednesday, Oct. 22 at 8:00 p.m.

New Teacher
The sixth grade of the Dillard School now has a regular teacher, after getting along the first few weeks with substitute teachers. She is Mrs. Wilma Smith of Myrtle Creek and has taught in the county at Days Creek for several years.

At Days Creek she was an upper grade teacher and had charge of the high school girls' athletic program. Mrs. Smith will work with Mrs. Doering on the girl's PE classes in addition to her sixth grade class.

The magazine sales contest which finished last Monday was won by Mr. Smith's eighth grade class. Although they were the largest class, they brought in the most subscriptions per pupil. They are looking forward to the ice cream feed that has been promised as the prize.

Last Thursday evening the Dillard School Board met with representatives from the State Department of Education and the Douglas County School office. The purpose of the meeting was to work together with the county and state offices on a course of study and building plans for the new high school.

James Turnbull, building consultant and Dick Sorick, secondary supervisor, were here from the State Department. Matt Campbell was present from the county office.

Sorick emphasized the need for special consideration for the seventh and eighth graders in a high school set-up. He pointed out that many times the pupils in those grades are all but forgotten in a six-year plan. He also suggested that the seventh graders spend at least one-half of each day under the same teacher; and the eighth graders at least two periods under the same teacher. This will help bridge the gap between the elementary graders and the departmentalized set-up of a high school, he said.

Sorick also pointed out the need for finding what the community expects of the school in the various "elective" courses in the high school program. This would include such things as shop and commercial subjects. Consideration must be given for those pupils planning to go to college as well as for those who do not plan to go on to college.

After checking our enrollment figures and the financial capacity of the districts, Turnbull was of the opinion that if the districts consolidate that it would be possible to build an adequate high school. With the available funds from a bond issue involving the three school districts, Turnbull stated that we should be able to build and equip a library, science rooms, gymnasium, shop, home economics rooms, music room, commercial room offices, toilets, a cafeteria with the stage, storerooms and general classrooms.

These representatives commended the local school board for the manner in which they are going about selecting an architect, visiting other schools as well as talking to the various firms.
