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**Missionary Will Tell Of Russian Conditions**

A missionary from the Soviet Union will speak at the Foursquare Gospel Church in Winston at 7:45 p.m. Thursday.

Rev. Peter Varonoff, missionary from Odessa, Russia, has spent most of his life in that country. His parents are missionaries imprisoned there now.

"The Communist doctrine has no place for Christianity. Lenin is the god of the godless," the Rev. Mr. Varonoff says. He points out that Moscow — a city of six million — has only 27 churches, of which seven are Protestant. On Sundays as many as three separate services are held to accommodate worshippers, he reveals.

"Communism," the missionary states, "is power based upon force and limited by nothing." He says Communism has three elements: denial of God and the suppression of religion, abolition of private ownership of property and hatred of the rich.

The speaker will exhibit views of Moscow and other Russian scenes along with his talk.

"But I do say that it seems to me high time that the leaders of the Republican party—or at least one wing of it—start realizing that their opposition to the programs of social justice in America is opposition to the building of our strongest defenses against communism," he said.

He said such opposition has been expressed in votes against the Marshall Plan and foreign aid program, against the Point Four program and other measures.

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**"Milk Dictator?"**

Opposition to milk reform comes from the Middleman Milk Barons whose profits are now protected under the law.

They are trying to confuse and alarm the voters with lies about "dictatorship" under the proposed milk reform bill.

The Milk Dictatorship that Oregon has had for 18 years is exactly what we are trying to get rid of. The Milk Controller now rules without restraint by issuing official orders under vague general provisions in the law.

An Oregon Journal editorial says: "Oregon is the only state that vests virtually unlimited power over a major food industry in a single administrative agency."

Our present Milk Administrator has all of these powers: He sets milk prices all the way from the farm to the consumer. No one may lawfully sell milk BELOW these prices.

He determines which producers are allowed to supply all of our milk and how much each farmer can sell for Grade A prices. He decides who may enter the milk business and where. Under this device over 70% of our licensed milk distributors have been squeezed out in the past 10 years.

He sets up regulations that prohibit any distributor from exceeding a maximum richness for standard milk.

He is appointed by the State Board of Agriculture, which in turn is appointed by the Governor. He is completely beyond public control, and serves a partisan board.

**Don't you think it's time for milk reform?**

The milk reform bill that will be on your ballot November 4 will do away with dictatorship.

The new Administrator will have only limited authority, and his powers will be specifically stated in the law. He will be appointed directly by the Governor.

He will set milk prices at the farm level only. Middlemen will be subject to competition, like any other business.

He will NOT have power to say who shall enter the milk business, nor which farmers shall be favored.

Under milk reform, administrative orders will for the first time be subject to full review by the courts.

He will have no power to tamper with the richness of your milk, but he will have authority to enforce true labeling to show butterfat content.

Milk reform will get rid of the cost of a seven man board.

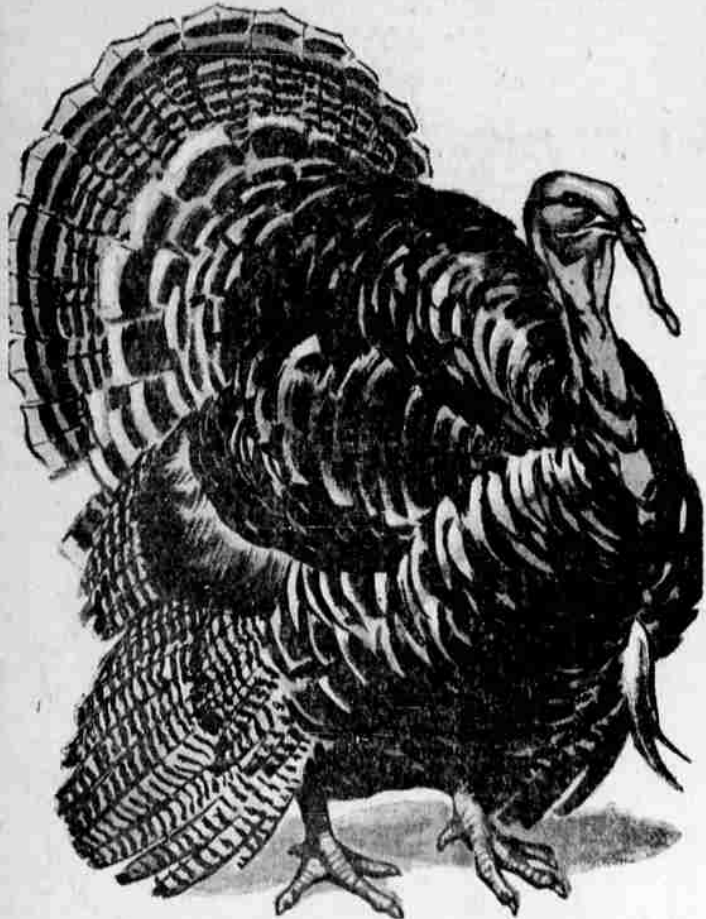
