Centralized Government Hit By Ellsworth

Congressman Harris Ellsworth, speaking on "Our Country," gave his outlook for the future of the legislature in the country at a Yoncalla BPW sponsored meeting at the Methodist Church last Friday.

He warned the audience of the centralization in our government, with the power concentrated in Washington, D. C., instead of being in the individual states "as it should be."

Illustrating his talk with references to CVA, federalized medicine, FEPC, federal aid to schools, the tide land oil case and the large ownership of public domain, Ellsworth said that the government of the people was "us" and we in turn are responsible for conditions in general because of the people "we" have elected.

A round table discussion followed his speech.

Cerebral Palsy In Babies Calls For Middle View

CHICAGO — A Chicago specialist on cerebral palsy in infants Tuesday called on doctors to adopt a "realistic" middle course between "over-pessimism and over-optimism" regarding the ailment.

"Incorrectly, although undoubtedly innocently—through improper understanding of the condition—many physicians inform parents that nothing can be done about it, while many others say 'the child will outgrow it,'" declared Dr.

M. A. Perlestein of the American Academy of Cerebral Palsy, adding:

"The real facts are that on the one hand, advances have been made in helping cerebral palsied patients to live a reasonably normal life and that changes for the better often occur as such patients grow older.

"But, on the other hand, there is actually no such thing as 'outgrowing' it—and any such statement invariably leads to disappointment and frustration on the part of the parents and the patients themselves."

In an interview at the 21st annual meeting of the American Academy of Pediatrics, Dr. Perlestein said "There was a time when most doctors leaned towards over-pessimism, but now the pendulum appears to be swinging towards over-optimism."

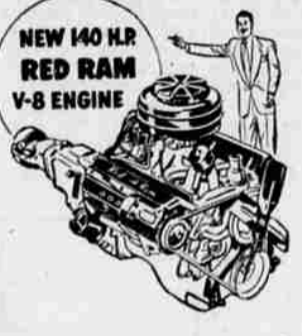

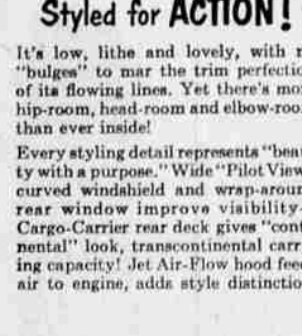
