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Ex-Governor Charles Sprague

The School District Reorganization Act will finally do what Governor Charles A. Sprague recommended to the Legislature in his 1939 inaugural message. He said: "We cling to an archaic multiple district system at a time when we have abolished small road districts and when transportation facilities bring central schools within easy access. I am genuinely friendly to the idea of keeping the rural school fixed in the rural environment. But it is a mistake to stick blindly to the system of small school units. Experience has amply demonstrated the value of larger units."

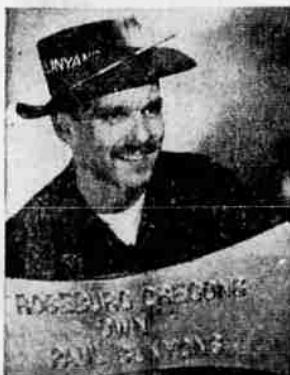
