liminary state registration figures show that the Democrats have gained more voters than the Republicans in several counties since last May, when the primary election was held.

Democratic leaders contend that fact is significant, but the Republicans argue that Oregon voters are more independent than the voters of most states, and that they have considerable Democratic support anyway.

The registration total will be the largest in history.

In Crook County, the state's bell weather county which has followed the national trend ever since William McKinley was first elected, Eisenhower is given a safe margin. The survey taken six weeks ago showed Stevenson well ahead.

That Central Oregon county, with its voters about equally divided between laborers and farmers, has considerably more Democrats than Republicans.

**AFL Union Split**  
The survey there where so many polls are being taken that the voters show signs of rebelling, indicates the farmers and business men in the county's capital, Prineville, are strong for Eisenhower.

The CIO workers in the lumber industry there generally are Stevenson supporters. But AFL union men in the lumber industry are split between the two.

The poll was taken during Stevenson's final Western tour. He made a brief appearance at Pendleton, his only stop in Oregon. He got a good reception in that Eastern Oregon ranching community, but the effect of his stop there on Crook County—and the rest of the state—did not appear to be important, the editors reported.

In 1948, Oregon went Republican by a narrow margin, being the only Western state the GOP carried.

**Sales Of Defense Bonds In Oregon Jumps 45 Perct.**  
Oregon residents went on a "saying spree" last month.

Purchases of series E defense bonds during September jumped 45 per cent over the same period a year ago, and reflected the highest monthly sales volume this year.

State-wide series E sales amounted to \$2,572,354, while Douglas County purchases totaled \$63,618. An additional scattering of \$713,570 in series U and K bonds were purchased throughout the state.

George Luoma, county defense bond chairman, said the "remarkable increase of defense bond purchases since May of this year reflects a widespread satisfaction toward the new government bonds. It indicates, too, an increase in the growing number of payroll savers in industries and businesses who like to save the defense bond way."

Luoma urges every industry and business in the county employing as many as 20 employees to install the payroll savings plan for their employees. "It is necessary," he states, "because we must endeavor to create in people's minds sensible habits and attitudes toward money. The wealth of a community itself depends, in the final analysis, on the wealth of individual families. Unless families in every community are able, with the assistance of financial counselors—to manage their own affairs in a sound manner, we cannot expect local, state or federal governments to do so. Through the payroll savings program—which emphasizes regular thrift and proper management of one's money—we can help prepare future generations of Americans to build for themselves their own financial security and happiness," he concluded.

There have been a string of second hand accounts that the shapely charmer of the films and her crooner husband separated following a week-end battle at their Palm Springs home.

"I have nothing whatever to say about the matter," said Ava here Tuesday when asked to comment. She was in town to leave her hand and foot prints in the cement fronting Grauman's Chinese Theater, Sinatra still hasn't been located for comment, and the Palm Springs home is closed.

According to the reports, carried in newspapers of Los Angeles and elsewhere, Actress Lana Turner was also in on the act somewhere, but she also hasn't been quoted directly.

Columnists say Sinatra returned from a television show Saturday to find Lana, his former girl friend, and Ava discussing him in a manner not complimentary.

Stories said police were called during the fireworks, but August Kettman, Palm Springs police chief, reported nothing on the record about a disturbance.

As Bennie turned his back on the apparently ill woman to get the water, she whipped out a revolver and said softly, "Hand over the money."

The bewildered fruit market operator gave her \$45 and she departed. Bennie later told police: "I was stunned—she looked so sick."

**Commons Rejects Trial Swap Privilege With U.S.**  
LONDON (AP)—The House of Commons early Thursday rejected a Laborite demand that the United States grant any British troops stationed in America the right to be tried by their own courts martial in return for similar privileges extended U. S. soldiers here.

The vote was 164-154—the smallest majority given Prime Minister Churchill's Conservative government since it won power in Britain's general elections last fall. The government's full majority in Commons is around 28.

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
