Presidential election night, Nov. 4, with all its tense excitement and expectancy as the voting returns pour in, will be covered coast to coast by CBS Radio in one of the most comprehensive reporting jobs of all time, and will be carried over KRNR. . . CBS outlet in Roseburg.

The Nov. 4 coverage will begin with preliminary reports on the size of the vote and comments by political personalities. Lowell Thomas will give later bulletins on his 8:00-8:15 p.m., PST news broadcast, and Edward R. Murrow at 8:30-8:45 p.m., PST, will give a roundup of returns available at that time.

At 9:00 p.m., PST, the entire network will be pre-empted for full-time election coverage. The working personnel at CBS Radio election headquarters in New York will go into high gear for sustained, speedy compilation of returns, with continuous bulletins and switches to broadcasters around the country. The network will remain on the air until the final count is in, whether that be shortly after midnight, in the early morning hours or even the next day.

Democratic and Republican headquarters in New York, Washington and Chicago and party strongholds throughout the country will be connected by special circuits to New York headquarters. News men also will be stationed at the homes or headquarters of the candidates for President and Vice President, and with President Harry S. Truman, Senator Robert Taft and other leading figures.

As a special feature of the election night coverage, Samuel Lubell, political analyst, will be in the CBS Radio headquarters for periodic broadcasts on the trends as he deduces them from direct reports gathered in strategic centers all over the nation. Mr. Lubell is best known for his accurate predictions on previous Presidential elections. He has had a distinguished career as a journalist, and is the author of the book, "The Future of American Politics."

With interest intense in many local contests, intermittent "breakaways" from the network will be arranged so that individual stations can give local reports to their listeners. Stations will give these reports all at the same time periods, so there will be no interference with their receiving the full results on national contests.

A staff of approximately 150 tabulating and coordinating specialists will prepare the figures for broadcast in New York. This force will be supplemented by scores of other tabulators in large cities throughout the country. To maintain technical facilities at top efficiency throughout the operation, approximately 75 radio engineers and technicians will be on duty throughout the night.

The Supreme Court, in granting Mrs. Hansen a new trial, ruled there were errors in instructions given to the jury by Circuit Judge Fred McHenry of Benton County.

Four judges ruled for a new trial, but the three others held that the case should be dismissed because of a lack of evidence.

Widow Again Tried On Mate Murder Charge

ALBANY, Ore. (AP)—Mrs. Margaret Hansen, 51-year-old mother of three grown daughters, Monday went on trial a second time on a charge of killing her husband, Sigurd, 59.

Mrs. Hansen, convicted of first degree murder in a Corvallis trial nearly two years ago, was granted a new trial by the Oregon Supreme Court and a change of venue to Linn County was ordered.

At the opening of the trial Monday, defense attorneys asked Judge Victor T. Oliver to hear the case without a jury, but the judge refused. Selection of the jury then began.

Mrs. Hansen was accused of crushing her husband to death with an automobile in the garage of their Corvallis home Sept. 10, 1950. She was indicted a month later, and was convicted Jan. 13, 1951. The jury recommended life in prison.

Injured Dillard Man Released From Hospital

Herbert Schriner has been discharged from Winston Emergency Hospital, where he was taken Tuesday following an accident at the Pacific Plywood Company at Dillard. He suffered two fractured bones in his right arm when his glove caught in a machine at the plant while he was working. He was rushed to the Winston Hospital given medical aid by Dr. F. A. Bracker. Schriner makes his home at 1446 Cedar Street, Roseburg.

Central Defense Agency To Handle U.S. Aid Money

WASHINGTON (AP)—The United States plans to back up the six-nation European army by allocating American aid money next year to its Central Defense Authority instead of to member countries individually.

The central authority would in turn allocate American dollars and defense equipment to France, Germany, Italy, Dutch, Belgium and Luxembourg units in the proposed European defense army.

These plans are being drafted with the expectation that all six member nations will ratify the European Defense Treaty designed to set up the single army some time this winter.

Officials who told a reporter of the plan emphasized American experts would continue to check carefully to make certain American dollars are used properly.

Under present plans, the United States will ask the six-nation defense authority to place defense orders in member countries with American money.

Hundreds of American procurement experts are now performing this task themselves.

The specific amount of money to be handled will run into the billions of dollars, Congress set aside a total of \$4,900,000,000 for European military and economic aid in the fiscal year that started July 1.

Most of this has gone to the six countries after separate negotiation with their governments.
