Both the marimba and vibraharp used in the program are concert models.

The trio has already presented more than 3000 concerts in its 14 years of concert work. St. Paul's Lutheran Church sponsored the trio here 12 years ago to a capacity audience.

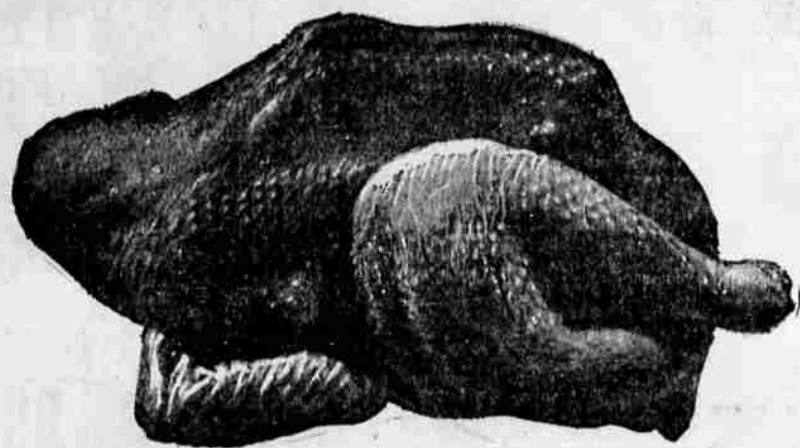

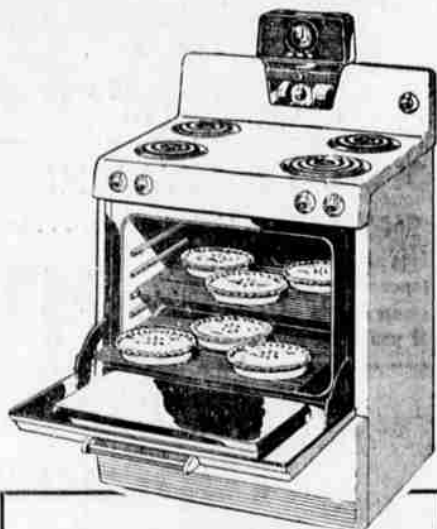

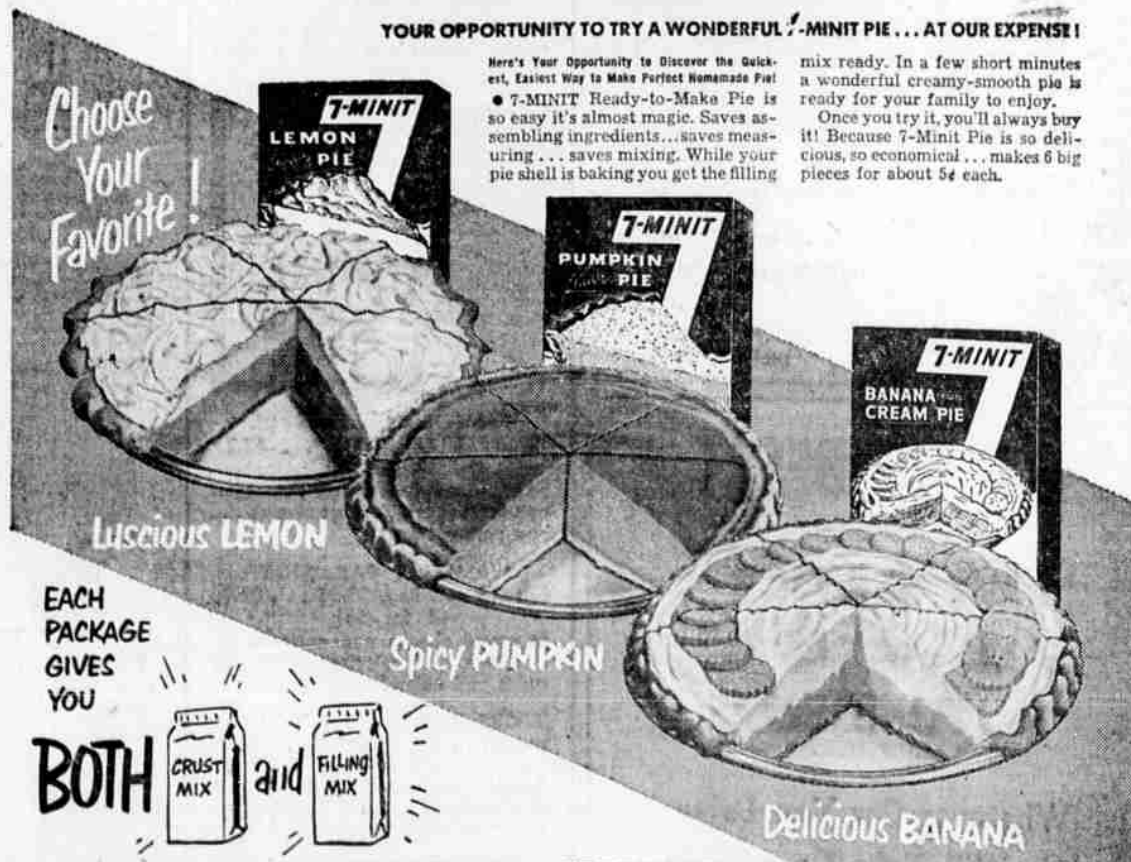
