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Roseburg Sergeant Aids In Training Pilots, Crews In Turkish Air Force

IZMIR, Turkey—Talk about pressure! Casey Stengel of the New York Yankees had a breeze this year compared to S-Sgt. Ray S. Owens of 1947 Mullholland Drive, Roseburg, who is a member of the Turkish United States Air Force GRT (TUSAFG) stationed at Gazimur Air Base, Izmir, Turkey.

After all, the Yankee manager only had to worry about fielding a nine man winning team. Ray Owens and the other U. S. Air Force personnel stationed at Gazimur have to worry about training 15,000 Turkish Air Force personnel for a world series that might pay off in bullets rather than gate receipts.

Under the capable direction of Lt. Col. Robert B. Crowley, chief of the mission at Izmir, Sgt. Owens and his buddies are responsible for the supervision of all logistical support training for the entire Turkish Air Force.

If you don't think that's pressure, brother, just try it for a few days.

Four Schools Operating—Currently, four schools are in operation, covering up-to-date methods in aircraft maintenance, installations, communications and supply.

It is vitally important to a successful NATO effort in the Mediterranean that the Turks have a first rate air arm. The Turkish potential in air power is the greatest of any NATO member in SHAPE's Southern Europe defense area. But it needs development.

FW Farmers Borrow \$17 Million In Year

SPOKANE, W. Va.—Farmers in Washington, Oregon, Idaho and Montana borrowed almost 17 million dollars during the last fiscal year from the Federal Land Bank of Spokane, President Henry Mathew said Thursday.

He said the \$15,967,000 total for the year ending June 30 exceeded the goal by almost a million dollars and put the Spokane unit first among the nation's 12 federal land banks in percentage increase of mortgage loans.

Mathew spoke at an opening session of the third annual conference of National Farm Loan Associations. The associations represented at the two-day meeting service Land Bank loans in the four states.

Ex-Honor Student Faces Pen For Extortion Try

HUNTINGTON, W. Va.—A former high school honor student who admitted he tried to extort \$750 from a girl on threat of death today faced the prospect of 15 years in prison.

Federal Judge Harry E. Watkins passed the sentence yesterday on Larry Paul Fudge, 20-year-old expectant father.

He hardly knew the 17-year-old high school girl he threatened, Carole Mae Kingsley.

After the judge had pronounced sentence, Fudge pleaded, "Your honor, I can take anything you hand out if you'll wait until my baby is born."

Judge Watkins said the seriousness of the case prevented him from granting the request or reducing the sentence more than five years from the maximum 20 years he could have given Fudge.
