Tuesday night, Oct. 14, members of Epsilon Sigma Alpha Sorority, had as guests Republican County Central Committeeman, Eugene A. Springer, and Attorney Avery Thompson, speaking for their respective political parties. The debate was in connection with the coming elections and the current events project selected by some Chapters.

Mrs. Kelsey Hobday introduced the speakers and expressed appreciation to Mr. Thompson for replacing Mayor Al Fiegel. In the opening address, Mr. Thompson stated that the campaign issues are merely "window dressing." He stated that the main things to watch in the coming years, regardless of which party is elected, are our foreign policies and our economy. Under foreign policy, he mentioned the various plans and treaties drawn up and what the Democrats have accomplished in spite of the opposition they have had from the GOP. To have a healthy economy, funds must remain in the government, he continued, rather than in the hands of bankers as they were prior to 1933.

In retelling, Mr. Springer reminded the audience of the billions of dollars they pay in taxes which are spent on our foreign policy rather than stabilizing our economy at home. The subsidies paid growers and the shortages arising thereafter are examples of the administration's incompetence. He added, in closing, that Adlai Stevenson as presidential candidate, is a party machine product, while Dwight Eisenhower is the people's choice.
