

Murder Case Disposed Of In Hour And Half

ALEXANDRIA, Va. (AP)—It took only an hour and a half to dispose of a murder case here yesterday.

Ninety minutes after Warren S. Jones, 48, was charged with murder in the baseball bat slaying of Mrs. Stella Russell he was sentenced to 20 years in prison.

Jones waived a preliminary hearing and grand jury action and pleaded guilty.

Ike Stands Pat On Statements On Korean War

ABOARD EISENHOWER SPECIAL IN PENNSYLVANIA — Gen Dwight D. Eisenhower, opening his final drive of the election campaign, said Monday he will not be turned aside by any criticism from the view that South Korean troops should man the major portion of the battleline in Korea against the Communists.

He told a Philadelphia crowd jammed into the big concourse of the Pennsylvania railroad's 30th street station that he holds this view "entirely aside from any political considerations."

Eisenhower repeated his determination to go to Korea himself if he is elected president.

If the United States is to live in freedom and peace with the rest of the world, it must do so through cooperation, Eisenhower said.

And so, in Korea, he went on, the population that wants to defend itself must not be denied the self-respecting right of contribut-

Freak Racing Contest Results In Homicide

FT. PIERCE, Fla. (AP)—Manslaughter charges were filed yesterday against John Henry Jones, 29, driver of an automobile which collided with another machine during a game of "chicken" at the St. Lucie Airport.

The car driven by Jones collided head-on Sunday with one driven by Henry Hayward Peterson, 24, who was killed in the crash.

The two men, each with a young woman companion, were playing a game in which drivers race their cars toward each other to see which will be the first to turn aside.

Jones and both young women were injured. The cars were demolished.

"His words were drowned out in a roar of applause."

"From that purpose I shall not be deterred by any criticism any partisan wants to bring against me," Eisenhower shouted.

He struck at the Democrats on another front, saying it seems strange that charges of bigotry are being raised in this campaign.

"I deplore every single kind of argument, charge or false assertion that is brought forward to accuse me or any man with this most evil of all crimes in our daily lives," he asserted.
