Vandenberg Guesses On Who Are Mig Flyers

PARIS (AP) — Gen. Hoyt Vandenberg, chief of staff of the U. S. Air Force, told inquiring reporters Saturday he does not know who is flying the Russian-built MIG, "a combination of Russians, Chinese, a few north Koreans and possibly some Germans."

Speaking at a news conference, he said a contingent of America's most modern and battle-tested jet fighters — the F-86 — is on its way to France. He did not disclose the exact number, but said the F-86s would eventually replace obsolete F-84s in the U. S. 86th Fighter Group in France.

Police Seek Sadtist Accused By Pretty Coed

LOS ANGELES (AP) — Police today sought a sadtist accused by a pretty 17-year-old coed of kidnapping and raping her before abandoning her in a restroom in downtown Pershing Square.

The girl, Joan Leila Burris, a student at Compton College, apparently had been drugged, either with chloroform or ether, police said, and "X" marks had been scratched on her body, probably with a piece of glass. Investigators said she described her assailant as about 35, 5 feet, 10 inches tall and weighing 175 pounds.

Miss Burris said she was kidnapped Thursday by the man and taken to a hotel. After blacking out a couple of times, Miss Burris was found half-clad and semi-conscious in the restroom yesterday. She said her assailant had "put out cigarettes on my stomach."

A physical examination disclosed she had been raped, officers said.

Ike's Statement 'Grandstand' Play, Morse

WASHINGTON (AP) — Sen. Wayne Morse of Oregon said Saturday that Gen. Eisenhower "pulled a cheap grandstand political play" in announcing that, if elected President, he would go to Korea in an effort to find a solution to the war there.

Morse resigned from the Republican Party Friday in a speech denouncing Eisenhower's candidacy for the presidency. Morse said that from now on he would be an independent.

In commenting on Eisenhower's pledge to make a trip to Korea if he is elected President, Morse said the general knows that "the top military experts of our government have been to Korea time and time again."

He said inspections of the military program there have been made by Gen. Omar Bradley, chairman of the Joint Chiefs of Staff; Secretary of the Army, Pace; Secretary of the Air Force, Finletter; and other top figures of the Pentagon.

"In my judgment," Morse told reporters, "it is rather presumptuous of Eisenhower to try to lead the American people to think a visit on his part to Korea would have any bearing on ending the war."

"In these closing days of the campaign we can expect such political dramatics from Eisenhower but the people should not be fooled by him."

Portland Preacher, 72, Guilty Of Manslaughter

PORTLAND (AP) — A 72-year-old mission preacher was convicted by a circuit court jury Friday night of manslaughter.

The convicted man, James L. Yokum, had been accused of first degree murder in the fatal shooting of Frank Wilson, 55, a handyman at a rooming house operated by Yokum. Sentencing is scheduled Wednesday.

Japanese Music Teacher, Girl Pupil Die Together

TOKYO (AP) — A famous Japanese music teacher, aged and blind, and his young female pupil Sunday tied themselves together with a silken sash, walked into the sea and drowned, press reports said Monday.

The bodies of Yonekichi Nakamura, 70, famed teacher of Japanese string instruments, and 20-year-old Harumi Maesaka washed ashore near Kobe.

Press reports said Miss Maesaka left a note indicating they decided on suicide after Nakamura, although in love with her, chose another pupil to succeed him because the other pupil was a better musician.

Fatal Upset Follows Auto Tire Blow-Out

PENDLETON (AP) — An automobile overturned and threw Francis K. Hendrickson, 22, Adams, to his death on U. S. 30 early Sunday, four miles south of Hermiston.

The car rolled 250 feet from the highway, and threw Hendrickson 45 feet farther. A tire blow-out was blamed tentatively for the crash. It was the 13th traffic fatality of the year in Umatilla County.

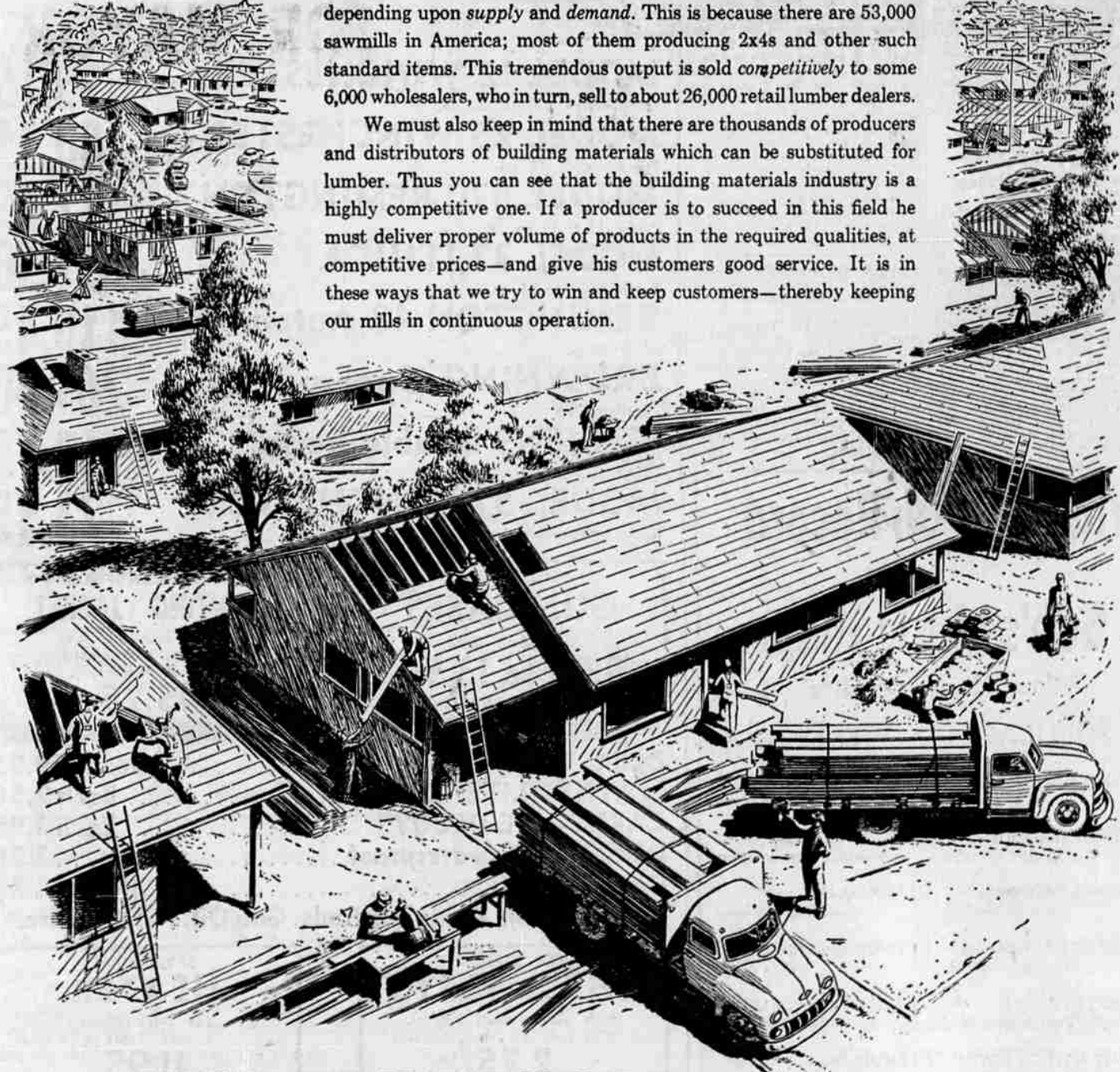
