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Shed That Fat For Longer Life, Doctors Advise

CLEVELAND (AP) — For a longer, happier life, reduce.

Proof that taking off extra pounds can win extra years was recited Friday to the American

Public Health Association by Dr. Louis I. Dublin, famed statistician of the Metropolitan Life Insurance Co.

A 25-year study of 50,000 over-

weight men and women showed: The death rate from heart disease is 50 per cent higher for fat people than for normal weights; from coronary attacks it is 42 per cent higher; brain strokes 59 per cent; the kidney disease nephritis 81 per cent; and diabetes nearly 400 per cent higher.

Fatties are more subject to gallstones, hernia, gout, and at least one form of cancer.

Dr. Dublin checked on what happened to 4,000 people who reduced, and stayed at normal weight.

The death rate among the slenderized but once-fat women was 30 per cent lower than among women who stayed overweight. For reduced men, the mortality rate was 20 per cent lower.

Obesity can be a social and job handicap, Dr. Dublin added.

Fat people may be self-conscious subject to ridicule. Fat girls have less chance of marriage than slender ones.

And bosses may prefer hiring slender folks in preference to tubby ones.
