**Fruitvale School
To Be Junior High****Present One
Also Retains
That Status****R. C. Sabin, Back From
Korea, Engaged As New
R. H. S. Vice-Principal**

The new Joseph Lane School, planned for the Fruitvale site, will be a junior high school.

This was the unanimous decision of the Roseburg District 4 board of education in a meeting this week. The present Junior High School will not be closed either. Both schools will handle seventh and eighth grade pupils.

Robert C. Sabin, 31, former Junior High School vice principal, recently returned from Korea, was hired by the board for the vice principal's post at Senior High School.

Sabin, who returned just this month from duty as a first lieutenant with the 31st Infantry in Korea, taught in the Roseburg system from 1948 to 1951. He spent two of those years at the Junior High. He was granted a leave of absence for his Korean duty.

A 1947 graduate of the University of Oregon, Sabin served three years in World War II. He spent part of that time with the infantry in Italy.

Board members made the decision to use the Joseph Lane school for junior high rather than elementary pupils after hearing findings from a survey of the district's needs made recently by M. C. Deller, superintendent, and Marvin Smith, assistant superintendent.

For a year or two after the building is completed extra rooms will be used to house elementary pupils, Deller said. It's hoped that the new school will be ready for occupancy next fall.

Two men officially accepted board appointments to the budget committee. Ray E. Doerner was appointed to a four-year and John Todd to a five-year term.

The resignation of Alice Meehan, Riverside fifth grade teacher, was accepted by the board.

Senior High Crowded

Crowded conditions at the Senior High were described to board members. Monday, two health classes will be housed in a hall and on a stage due to lack of classrooms. These emergency facilities will be used until the new shop building is completed, probably in February, Deller said.

Board members also discussed the safety problem concerning children crossing Highway 99 to attend Rose, Benson and the Junior High Schools. Student patrols are used for children crossing the highway, but PTA groups and school principals are worried since student patrols were planned to be used only in areas of natural traffic, not on a U. S. highway. The city has been contacted in regard to the matter, Deller said.

A petty larceny charge against Charles Gregg, 18, of Roseburg, has been dismissed by Sutherlin Justice Ward Watson for insufficient evidence.

A charge of burglary against Edward August Volberding, 45, of Myrtle Creek, was dismissed by Judge Wimberly, and the defendant was allowed to plead to the lesser charge of petty larceny. The judge gave him a 30-day suspended sentence and fined him \$25.

**Challenge Goes
To The Accusers
Of Drain Justice**

Drain Justice of the Peace Clarence Leonard, under fire in a recall election, has challenged those "spreading accusations" about him to submit the accusations in writing to the Grand Jury.

Writing for the Drain Enterprise, the justice continued, "If the accusation is true, then I will be prosecuted. If the same is not true, then the party writing same will be prosecuted for criminal libel."

Voters in five north Douglas precincts will cast ballots Nov. 4 in the recall election. The precincts are Drain, Yoncalla, Elkton, Gunter and Comstock.

One of the stories about Leonard, the article says, is that a truck driver was stopped for speeding. He appeared in Leonard's court and was fined \$10. The story goes that Leonard said he could bring gravel to his house in place of the fine.

"The records will show and audit in the past will verify," Leonard says, "that in order to help the truck driver out (he alleged he had no money), I paid the fine myself, and then told him to bring the gravel to pay me back for paying his fine."

"Many charges and accusations have been made against me, the same being unknown to me, and said charges and accusations being false. If the accusations are true, why are the parties spreading them afraid to publish the same or why do they so carefully tell you not to say that they told you of such incident. It is no crime to tell the truth. Such parties are afraid of a criminal libel charge," the magistrate said.

**Election Day Display
Of American Flag Urged**

A display of flags at business houses on election day is urged by the Rose School Parent - Teacher Association.

At a meeting Tuesday night, the association held a lengthy discussion concerning the flag display. "It was the unanimous belief of our group that we should show our patriotism and try to arouse some old-fashioned enthusiasm on election day," said Mrs. Jack Chapman, reporting the association's action.

Through the Chamber of Commerce and Retail Merchants Association, the Rose PTA is asking every business house to display the American flag all day Tuesday. Display of The Colors at private homes is also encouraged.

**Woman Found Dead
In Smoke-Filled Room**

EUGENE — Mrs. Maude E. Wood, 72, was found dead in her smoke-filled home after a neighbor, Mrs. Orin L. Ireland, turned in an alarm Tuesday.

District Attorney C. A. Luckey reported that a large black purse was missing from the woman's home. He said the woman was feeble and had often expressed fear of fire.

Luckey said an autopsy had been ordered.

**Douglas County Democrats
Maintain Their Slight Lead
In Registration Of Voters**

The Democratic party maintains its 200-voter lead over the Republicans in voter registration in Douglas County, according to final tabulations completed by the county clerk's office.

The final registration total for Douglas County is 28,142. The Democrats have 13,788, the Republicans 13,578.

The total represents an all-time high for Douglas County. The previous record was 23,442 during the November, 1950, general election. At that time Democrats led, 11,443 to 11,243.

In Roseburg, the Republicans are well in the lead with 3,063 to the Democrats' 2,275. Total for the city's 14 precincts is 5,484.

Republicans also lead in Drain, Oakland, Yoncalla and in the four Edenbower precincts comprising North Roseburg. Total for the four North Roseburg precincts is 2,947. Republicans have 1,477, Democrats have 1,365.

**Millionaires
Backing Ike,
Truman Says****President Sees Dire
Results If Top Money
Class Gets In Power**

ABOARD TRUMAN TRAIN — President Truman sought to convince the Midwest today that if the "millionaires" he said were supporting Dwight D. Eisenhower had their way on policy the country would end up "in a crash and a depression."

And he argued that he hopes for continued prosperity for the farmer, laborer and small businessman depend on the election of Adlai Stevenson and a Democratic Congress.

Because there are more people outside the millionaire class than there are in it, he contended, Eisenhower isn't going to carry the tide of oil states of California, Texas and Louisiana.

Truman outlined his theory in detail last night in the friendly atmosphere of cheering thousands at Hibbing, Minn., in the iron range. And he sought to develop it in speeches today in Iowa and Illinois en route to a major talk in Chicago tonight.

The speech will be telecast and broadcast at 10:30 p.m. EST.

In his speech at Hibbing last night, Truman declared that the GOP presidential nominee, "under pressure from the oil lobby," has "promised to sign a bill giving to three states the oil lands that the Supreme Court has said belong to everybody in the United States."

"Expectations" Listed

He said of Eisenhower: "I wonder if he's asked the millionaires who are financing his campaign what they expect to get out of it?"

The oil millionaires, he said, expect to get control of the "immensely rich offshore oil reserves."

The electric power millionaires, he said, expect to get control of transmission lines carrying power from government dams and of remaining power sites on the rivers of the country.

The National Association of Manufacturers, he continued, expect "to get out from under the anti-trust laws" and the enactment of other laws to "break the power of the labor unions."

Rally Dated Thursday**

"Labor for Stevenson" will be the theme of a Democratic political rally Thursday at 8 p.m. at the Labor Temple in Roseburg. Master of ceremonies will be W. O. "Bun" Kelsay, Democratic candidate for the office of state senator.

All local candidates for political offices on the Democratic ticket will be introduced and given an opportunity to speak. It is also understood a speaker, not yet named, will be here from Portland.

A discussion and explanation of measures on the ballot for the Nov. 4 election will be held.

**Stevenson Says
Ike Champions
'Dear Dead Past'**

ABOARD STEVENSON TRAIN — Adlai E. Stevenson carried his fight for the presidency into Pennsylvania today after accusing Gen. Dwight D. Eisenhower of a "sordid triumph of expediency over principle."

He loosed this charge during a Madison Square Garden in New York City, where he asserted his Republican opponent had capitulated to those who champion a "dead, departed past that is all so dead."

He said of the Republicans: "They have everything on their side except the people—and so our Republican friends celebrate all of their conquests and triumphs in advance of the election."

"They win all of the battles except the last one, but the big one is the last—as all generals should know. It comes in November, and that is when they discover that the most powerful publishers, the loudest commentators, and the noisiest demagogues are each, by the blessed rules of our democracy, entitled to cast one vote—even as you and I."

There was a message from Sen. Wayne Morse of Oregon, who has bolted the Republican party and repudiated his support of Eisenhower.

Morse said, "Our decision to repudiate Eisenhower was not an easy one to make. But the Eisenhower of today is not the Eisenhower that I backed. Never have I been so completely disillusioned by any man as I have been by Eisenhower."

**Water Works'
Operators Date
Conference Here**

Water works operators will meet here for their annual county-wide conference Thursday in the City Hall council chambers, Alton Andrews, manager of the Oregon Water Corp., and local conference organizer, announced today.

Representatives from 17 water works throughout Douglas County have been invited to the meeting, Andrews said.

Speakers for the conference, which begins with introductions at 9 a.m., will be provided by the State Board of Health, Harold E. Milliken, chief of the public health engineering section, is expected to be among officials coming here for the meeting.

The common sanitary defects of water systems will be discussed at 9:30 a.m., with the water works operators' voluntary registration program report set for 10:30. Water works practices will be the topic at 11.

At 2:30 p.m., following a 1:30 p.m. discussion on works practices, conferees will see a film entitled "Pipeline to the Clouds." This film traces the water cycle from the clouds through the ground water system and back to the clouds.

Though the general public may attend any of the conference sessions, this film would probably be of the most interest to the average citizen, Andrews said.

A 3 p.m. field trip or demonstration will end the conference. Taking an active part in the meeting will be County Sanitarians Claude Baker and Laverne Miller. This is the second annual water works operators conference here.

**Ike Strikes
Back On New
Korea Issue****General Explains Role
In 'Top Secret' Solely
Of Estimator Status**

NEW YORK — Gen. Dwight D. Eisenhower, pointing a power-house drive at the big voting centers around New York City, says a "top secret document" on Korea is being used against him by his political enemies.

He did not identify the document, other than to describe it as "a top secret document of the American Defense Department."

In a program broadcast nationally Tuesday night by radio and television, he said:

"This morning, there was a very significant item in the paper. It was this: There was quoted a top secret document of the American Defense Department. How it got there, we will never know, probably."

"There was a military estimate made in September, 1947, and it had this conclusion—the military occupation of South Korea is not essential to the security of the United States."

He asked his studio audience: "And how was top secret document released? Wouldn't you like to know? Many Americans would."

Follows Morse's Action

In Minneapolis Monday, Sen. Wayne Morse of Oregon—a Republican who has bolted his party and said he could not support Eisenhower—read a government memorandum to an audience at the University of Minnesota.

It was signed by the late James Forrestal, former secretary of defense, and was dated Sept. 25, 1947. The significant paragraph read:

"The Joint Chiefs of Staff consider that from a standpoint of military security, the U. S. has little strategic interest in maintaining the present troops and bases in Korea . . ."

Eisenhower, as Army Chief of staff at that time, was a member of the joint chiefs.

The argument over responsibility for the actions that led up to the Korean War has been raging back and forth with increasing bitterness. Briefly, it centers on this:

President Truman and other Democrats claim Eisenhower, as Army chief of staff, bears part of the responsibility for decisions affecting American policy in the Far East.

Eisenhower, in reply, says the joint chiefs made purely military estimates, at the request of the administration. He has emphasized his argument that a vast difference exists between such military estimates and political decisions.

And he has accused Secretary of State Dean Acheson of making a major blunder in announcing, later, that the "defense perimeter" of the United States in the Far East did not embrace either Korea or Formosa.

**Yoncalla's Only Barber
Hunting Mishap Victim**

Yoncalla is without the services of a barber temporarily. The reason—the town barber, Karl Hummel, shot off the big toe of his right foot. The accident occurred on a deer hunting trip south of Yoncalla. He has been unable to work, but is expected to be back on the job in the near future.

**Convicts Hold
Ten Officers
As Hostages****Sickness, Need Of Food
Mark What Becomes
Ordeal Of Endurance**

CHESTER, Ill. — Unruly convicts and taut-nerved officials at Menard State Prison pressed their endurance contest into a third day today with lives of 10 hostages depending upon the outcome.

The second uprising at the prison in two days and the third in five weeks broke out Tuesday afternoon in the psychiatric division. Most of 300 psychiatric division inmates who stormed the kitchen-dining room were herded back to cells, but 38 armed themselves with kitchen cutlery, seized three unarmed officers as hostages and barricaded themselves in the mess hall.

Seven other officers were hostages of 332 east cell house inmates who rebelled Monday.

Sherwood Dixon, acting governor in the absence from the state of Adlai E. Stevenson, and other officials scheduled a talk with the psychiatric inmates today, provided they release their three hostages.

Earlier, the psychiatrists had called for the governor.

Food Intercepted

The 332 prisoners and seven hostages in the east cell house were without food or water Tuesday with one exception. Once food was passed through the barred door for officers after inmates promised the guards would get it. However, the food was intercepted by inmates.

Clarence Razor, assistant superintendent of state prisons, told of a brief interview with one hostage, Lt. Loren Stewart, 33, of Chester. Razor said he was passing when

**Grand Jury Not
Ready To Report**

A second degree murder charge against Mary Jewell Gilpin, 28, who admitted fatally stabbing L. C. Parker, 40, Oct. 12.

A second degree murder charge against Charley Jefferson Lemmons, 38, in connection with the fatal stabbing of Thomas Raymond Debolt, Oct. 12.

A second degree murder charge against Ezra J. Staggs, 28, in connection with the fatal stabbing of Hill Estrada, Oct. 20. William Green and Avery Thompson, attorneys, have been retained to defend Staggs, it was reported.

Circuit Judge Carl E. Wimberly ordered two more grand jurors selected to replace two who were unable to appear at the hearings this week. The two new jurors are Alton B. Hebard, of Umpqua and Florence Groshong, 955 Chapman St., Roseburg.
