North Umpqua Road Contract Job Completed

By MRS. ARTHUR M. SELBY The Kuckenber Construction Co. completed its contract for the 2½ miles of construction of the new North Umpqua Highway from Burnt Creek to Bogus Creek, last Friday and has moved out all its equipment.

The Funderburk Construction Co. will have completed the relocation of the new highway from Idlewild Park to Mc's place this Wednesday except for the oiling, which cannot be done until spring. This particular stretch of road was the most difficult achievement of the entire project of the new highway, as the company had to blast through and remove thousands of tons of rock to make a straight level road from Idlewild to Mc's place, eliminating the old dangerous narrow road winding around the high cliffs. Funderburk completed the new highway from Lone Rock bridge to Idlewild Park several weeks ago.

Funderburk Construction moved its heavy equipment last week to Depoe Bay, to start work on a million dollar contract which will take two years for completion. Kuckenber and Funderburk brought in large crews of experienced men with their families. Some owned their own trailer houses, others rented cabins, so there has been quite an exodus from the Idlewild community.

The Watts Construction Co., which has the contract for 4½ miles of new highway construction from Bogus Creek to Steamboat, built its own camp for the employees, and plans to work through the winter. The company expects to complete its contract one year from this November, as reported by Orville C. Hanson, resident engineer for the U.S. Bureau of Public Roads.

(Continued from Page One) an inmate called to him to come nearer. He said Stewart told him: "I wish you would see if you could bring in some food. The other guards are sick and hungry."

Earlier, inmates threatened to throw the officers from the top gallery 50 feet to a concrete floor if an attempt was made to storm the east cell house. They were unaware of the new outbreak across the prison yard, beyond a wall.

Some of the psychiatric inmates rubbed kitchen knives across their throats threateningly and waved meat cleavers, it was reported.

South Koreans Regain Ridge Crest 7th Time

SEOUL — South Korean infantrymen in savage close-quarter fighting today forced a battalion of Chinese Reds off the crest of bloody Sniper Ridge for the seventh time in 18 days.

Measured by Red casualties, the fighting this month is the heaviest since last November. The U. S. Eighth Army said 27,096 Reds were killed, wounded or captured in the first three weeks of October. Last November the toll was 44,729.
