Washington, Oregon Lead In Nation's Pass Attempts

NEW YORK — Michigan State, Maryland and Oklahoma State, undefeated powerhouses terrorizing opponents in and out of their geographical sectors, are three of the five major college teams still "hitting 400" — averaging 400 or more yards gained a game.

Michigan State, polishing off an unbeaten Eastern team for the second straight week, racked up 485 yards against Penn State and stands atop the total offense column with 467.6 yards a game, according to statistics released Wednesday by the NCAA Service Bureau.

San Jose State, idle last Saturday, is second with 453.8, Oklahoma third with 434.8, Maryland fourth with 430.3 and Tulsa fifth with 412.4.

In rushing, California kept first place despite its poorest day in six years, but its margin over San Jose was cut to 305.5 against 301.2. Oklahoma and Tulsa are next with 294.8 and 294.4 respectively. California was held to 119 yards by Southern California, its smallest one-game ground output since Stanford held it to 107 in 1946.

In passing, things reached a degree of normalcy as Fordham, tossing 96 times in its first two games, threw only 21 against Boston College for 103 yards.

The Rams, who have lost all three of their games, still lead with a 229.7-yard average, but Illinois, with 211.8 in five, Washington, with 205.5 in six, and Michigan State, with 202.0 in five, are now within

HS Gridders Sues Florida University For Injuries

MIAMI, Fla. — Peter Schultz, an all-city tackle at Miami High School in 1950, has filed suit asking \$35,000 from the State Board of Control for injuries received in football practice at the University of Florida and cancellation of his scholarship.

The suit filed in Circuit Court Tuesday asks \$10,000 for "breach of scholarship agreement" and \$25,000 as a result of the University of Florida's alleged failure to provide proper physical examination or medical attention after the accident that injured his back.

The suit said he was injured during a practice scrimmage on Nov. 15, 1951 when other players "pushed and threw him to the ground with such force that his back was injured."

MOSCOW, Idaho. — Idaho will be at full strength Saturday for the Vandals' Pacific Coast Conference football collision with Washington State College, Coach Babe Curfman said Tuesday.

Curfman said only center George McCarty was still on the injury list and may not see action against Idaho's longtime Palouse rival. McCarty suffered throat injury in the Santa Clara game last week.

Tuesday's practice session featured a scrimmage between the Idaho varsity and frosh teams. The Idaho frosh will play the WSC yearlings Friday.

PULLMAN, Wash. — Coach Al Kiercher and the Washington State Cougars, drilling for Saturday's game with Idaho, concentrated Tuesday on measures to stop the Vandals' split-T attack and ground-gaining delayed line buck.

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Light Grid Weekend Seen

Only one game in Douglas County 11-man ranks carries any league significance this weekend. And only one game in the six-man circles carries any weight as a rugged contest.

The single 11-man league contest sends winless Myrtle Creek to Rogue River for a Josephine-Douglas-Jackson loop game with the winless Chieftains. For the first time this year, the Vikes rate as favorites to get into the win column after six straight losses. Rogue River, in its inaugural year as an A-2 school, has lost seven in a row.

Roseburg moves out of town for the first of two weekend treks into deep southern Oregon. This inter-district tilt is rated as a toss up, with perhaps a slight edge to the Tornado which has won 16 in a row from the Indians in their 30-year rivalry.

Sutherland vs. Glendale
The third Friday game is one of the few 11-man contests in the County. It pits Sutherland against Glendale in an intra-county affair. Sutherland will rate the nod over the winless Pirates, who are also making their debut in 11-man football this year. Sutherland is classified A-2 and Glendale is a "B" school.

Douglas County's white hope for a state championship continues with unbeaten Drain Friday. The Warriors invade Elmira for a non-league game with the Elmira Falcons. They are expected to stretch their unbeaten string to eight this year, although they have a single

tie with Pleasant Hill, another Lane County squad, to mar the record. The Warriors have now run up 197 points to opposition's 28 in games this year.

Yoncalla vs. Canyonville
The single eye-catcher in the six-man loop is Yoncalla's invasion of Canyonville. The Eagles are nursing a second place position in the League and are expected to keep it because of injuries which have riddled Canyonville's rugged Tigers.
