WASHINGTON (AP)—A University of Maryland junior, accused of trying to bribe a Maryland football star, has surrendered and faces a fugitive hearing in Washington today.

District of Columbia police named him as Louis Leonard Glickfield, 21, of Hyattsville, Md. They said he gave himself up at Central headquarters last night and, after posting \$1,000 bond, left with Washington Atty. Charles E. Ford.

48 Turn Out For Bowmen's First Practice

A total of 48 youngsters and adults turned out for the first winter session of the Umpqua Bowmen at Benson Grade School gym Wednesday night.

Going into its second year of existence, the archery club greeted 30 adults and 18 children for the inaugural. No scoring was done and only unimpaired will continue at the weekly sessions for the next two or three weeks before actual scoring begins.

At least two innovations came with the new range. The range, being longer than the former Junior High School firing place, allowed the increased size of target faces from two feet to four feet. This increased size came as a result of the extension of shooting distance to approximately 30 feet.

The second innovation was the institution of a beginner's class. Club President George Foster reports that the new shooters will fire from shorter ranges until their proficiency allows graduation into other classes.

These early sessions are open to all comers every Wednesday night, and no membership will be promoted until the scoring practices begin. Membership fees will be one dollar for adults and 50 cents for youngsters. Dues are to be five dollars per year for individual adults and \$7.50 for man and wife. Children's dues are 25 cents per month.

NEW YORK (AP)—Announcement of the status of Jim Rivera, Chicago White Sox outfielder recently acquitted on a rape charge, will be made within the next 10 days, it was learned Thursday.

The only statement issued by Commissioner Ford Frick, who discussed Rivera's predicament with the major-league executive council Wednesday, was: "Rivera's status hasn't been determined yet."

The outfielder, who was refused permission to barnstorm, has signed to play for the Caguas club in the Puerto Rican winter league but is awaiting the commissioner's decision before donning a uniform.

Webfoots See Gloomy Contest Ahead With College Of Pacific

Oregon's Ducks, mired in grid misfortune at the moment, apparently have another gloomy Saturday ahead of them this week when the powerful College of Pacific Tigers come to Hayward Field for the second game of the current Webfoot home stand.

COP's win and loss record is less impressive than some of the previous Oregon opponents, but the potential is there and it might well explode this weekend.

The Tigers led California for a quarter before finally being worn out by the Bear running attack. Lost to San Jose State in the final minute of action as the result of a long touchdown dash, and also dropped a decision to San Diego Navy's pro-laden crew after playing the Sailors to a scoreless first half. On the credit side of the ledger COP ran up impressive scores in handling Utah State and Texas Tech without too much trouble.

The visitors rely primarily on the powerful running of Tom McCormick, Hank Welch and Art Liebischer and the bulky forward wall which ranks as one of the best units on the coast. McCormick gained over a thousand yards last season and has already broken the all-time Tiger rushing mark this season.

Also, the visitors have a passing attack for the first time since Eddie Lebaron departed and Ray Ottosen may well find the Webfoot secondary defenses vulnerable to his aerial shots. The rookie quarterback has a record of better than 50 per cent completions at the halfway mark in the campaign.

Oregon may be better off physically than it has for several weeks with the return of Monte Brethauer and Emery Barnes at end and Dick Stout at tackle. There appears to be a good chance all but five of the Ducks who have been on the crippled list for the past three weeks will be on hand. The missing Webfoots are all recovering from broken bones and may not be ready for another two weeks.

Once again the Webfoots will depend on the passing of George Shaw and Hal Dunham to carry the offensive load. The return of Brethauer at left end will add punch to the attack and increase the Duck's chances of an upset victory.

Truman Claims Demos Rescued Corn Growers

ABOARD TRUMAN TRAIN (AP)—President Truman told Iowa corn growers Wednesday that if the Democrats had not beaten the Republican "sliding scale" formula, the support price for corn this year would be "only 1.18 a bushel."

And, he declared, that the men guiding the GOP on foreign policy "are blind" and if they are allowed to run the country "I am certain we would face far greater danger of a general war."

Speaking at Davenport, Ia., after advice from party leaders that Democratic nominee Adlai Stevenson faces an uphill battle in the state, Truman laid heavy emphasis on farm prices in this heavily agricultural state.

"The corn crop this year in Iowa is going to be a big one," he said. He said big crops put a heavy downward pressure on corn prices. But he said the Democratic support program "is going to hold corn prices at \$1.60 a bushel for every farmer who participates in the corn loan program."

Earlier, as his train moved across the Hawkeye state, the President said that the trend in Iowa has been "strongly Democratic" ever since the appearance in this state of GOP vice presidential nominee Richard M. Nixon.

Truman told an enthusiastic crowd at Waterloo he would be "delighted" to have Nixon continue to help the Democrats by his speeches but he is afraid there isn't time before the election "for

Oakland Men Humble Creswell, 21-0

Coach Stephen Beck's Oakland High School grid squad went over the .500 mark in the won-lost column Wednesday afternoon by racking Creswell, 21-0.

Playing before a home crowd, the Oaks scored in each of the last three quarters to wrap up their fourth win in seven games.

Fullback Lyle Becroft pushed the Oaks into the scoring column in the second quarter by bulging over from inside the ten yard line. He added the extra point on an off tackle play to make the half-time score 7-0.

Halfback Bill Bowman added spectacle to the win in the third quarter by intercepting a pass on the Creswell 40. He gathered in the aerial and romped the entire distance into the end zone. Jerry Blaylock skirted end for the extra point.

It was Becroft again in the final frame who boomed off tackle for the last 15 yards of a drive into Creswell territory. Blaylock changed the routine by booting this extra point.

The Bulldogs from Creswell concentrated strongly in the final quarter on getting just one score, but penalties called back two touchdowns. As the final gun sounded, the Bulldogs were again rapping on the door from the Oakland 15-yard line.

The game was originally scheduled for Friday, but a Lane County Teacher's institute that day made the change necessary.

U.S. Can't Stay In Korea Trap Forever -- Ike
NEW YORK (AP)—Gen. Dwight D. Eisenhower said Wednesday his promise to go to Korea personally "has given heart to every American family," and has shocked his Democratic opponents.

Talking in the Bronx, Eisenhower stressed two themes, Korea and the problem of bigotry and intolerance in the nation.

On the first count, he repeated his determination to go to Korea, and said: "Despite the opposition's shocked denunciation of this proposal—a proposal that has given heart to every American family—one thing is perfectly plain to anyone who wants to see."

"America must not be caught forever in this Korean trap, fighting the real enemy's second team. We must prepare the Koreans to defend their own lines as we have done elsewhere."

To Fight Bigotry
Eisenhower said he will seek out men from both parties to help him as president in the fight against bigotry and intolerance.

"One thing we need to do in this next administration is to remove the remaining stains of discrimination from our national life," he said. "We can do this if the President doesn't make a partisan issue out of this, but calls for aid from men of good will in both parties."

"That, I intend to do," he added. Eisenhower said America's forces must be freed from Korea to "serve their true purpose."

He continued, "that is, to be the great mobile reserve of the free world, and to provide air and sea support wherever and whenever needed."

In Yonkers, Eisenhower recalled that many Democrats, including the former Senator Claude Pepper, and Jacob M. Arvey, of Chicago, sent telegrams to newspapers and to him urging him to run for the presidency as a Democrat.

"We are in a campaign based on defamation by our opponents now," he said. "But I am the very same man today. I am no different than I was when they wired asking me to run on their ticket."

Drain Probable Grid Titleholder

For the second straight year Coos County prep football squads have all but walked away with district medals and, of course, shots at state titles in the "A" school ranks.

The only measure of satisfaction for Douglas County is the almost certain District 4-B title which Drain holds.

However in the 5-A-1 District title race, Roseburg is completely out with four straight losses in a dismal season. Marshfield is favored to wrap up the crown for the second straight year Nov. 7 when it meets North Bend. Both North Bend and Eugene still have a chance of overtaking the Pirates. But the Marshfield crew, rated No. 1 by the Associated Press, is undefeated in seven games and has four district wins among them.

A new system has been inaugurated this year, however, which holds the title in abeyance officially until a team is elected to defend the District colors in the state playoffs. This election is made by school principals in the district. Thus, Marshfield won't become district champion officially until the vote is made, in spite of winning all its games. If the Pirates' present rating continues, however, they are almost a shoo-in.

The winner of District 5 will meet the District 6 crownholder, which now shapes as Klamath Falls, which still must dump Grants Pass.

In District 6-A-2, Coquille has again won the northern championship and is almost certain to meet Ashland in the southern half of the District for the state berth. This year separate championships are scheduled in the state for A-1 and A-2 schools. Thus, Coos County stands a very good chance of winning two state crowns.

Glide's breakaway running highlighted a 44-13 victory over Riddle in a midweek junior varsity game at home Wednesday.

Riddle took a first quarter, 6-0 lead, but faltered in the second quarter as the Glidesters worked up steam to score 25 points. Danchok Only Indian With Over One TD

Fullback Steve Danchok is the only Roseburg man to break into enemy end zone territory more than once in the disconcerting District 5-A-1 football campaign.

He scored two of Roseburg's five touchdowns in District games to move into a tie for tenth place among the District's scorers. He scored one touchdown against Cottage Grove and the only one against North Bend last weekend. He is the top season scorer on the squad this year, having boomed over for five touchdowns and a conversion for 31 points in the seven games.

Roseburg football fans at the Roseburg-North Bend game last Friday night watched Bulldog Halfback Jim Shanley break the scoring record for the district and also take away the scoring lead from Marshfield's Tom Crabtree for the first time in two years.

The 180-pound flash pumped to three touchdowns in North Bend's 47-6 pasting to raise his total to nine touchdowns and 54 points, six better than the record of 43 posted by Crabtree last year. Crabtree was held scoreless for the first time this year against Eugene last weekend. He has already equalled his record of last year.

The final game of the season between North Bend and Marshfield, Nov. 7, should have an added highlight of a District scoring duel between these two brilliant halfbacks.

Beside Danchok, Roseburg has only three other men who have cracked pay territory more than once in the season's seven games. Buz Desbriens has two scores to his credit, Bob Brandt has three and Gene Lane has garnered two.
