dancer and master of ceremonies in one of Manhattan's gilded traps next week.

VANCOUVER, Wash. (AP) — Leo Randall, 46, who played football years ago at Ohio State under the late Leo Raskowski, died in a hospital here Thursday night after a long illness.

He was a standout tackle for Ohio State in the 1926-27 seasons, and later played professional football at Washington, D. C.

He changed his name to Randall in later years and came to Vancouver, Wash., as a recreation director in 1943.

Three years ago he went to Enumclaw, Wash., again as a recreational director, but illness forced him to return to his home here last year.

**Unbeaten 49ers Meet
Chicago Bears Sunday**

SAN FRANCISCO (AP) — The Chicago Bears Sunday try to upset the unbeaten San Francisco 49ers' hopes for the National Professional Football League title—and to gain revenge for their worst loss in years.

The Bears, however, are 17-point underdogs for the Kezar Stadium struggle. Two weeks ago, the 49ers dumped the Bears, 40-16, in Chicago, for the first San Francisco win in the five games the clubs have played.

Hugh McIlhenny, leading NFL ground-gainer, will be at his regular right half post and powerful Joe Perry is expected to start at fullback for the 49ers.

Medford Slaps Locals, 48-7

The Fates were still thumbing their noses at Roseburg.

For the 17th consecutive time, the Medford Black Tornado rose to new heights to slap the Roseburg football Indians into submission. This year, the score was 48-7 at Medford.

The inter-district rivalry which has never seen a Roseburg win over a span of 30 years, was marked Friday night by one of Medford's most glorious chapters. The Tornado couldn't do a thing wrong.

At the same time, the Roseburg Indians were playing their finest game—between the 30 yard lines. Inside the enemy 30, the locals were completely stymied. Only once did they push through that defensive curtain that guarded Medford touchdown territory. That time—late in the second quarter—Steve Danchok paced an 80-yard drive, which he capped by flipping a touchdown pass from 11 yards out to Ron Hicks.

The bitter Indian loss certainly wasn't due to lack of Roseburg yardage. The Roseburg team had only three less rushing yards than the Tornado. But most of it was racked up on the approach.

Medford's Brightest Hour
For Medford, however, it was the brightest hour of the year. It was a team which couldn't pass, yet it completed 10 of 14 passes, two for touchdowns, for a total 175 yards in the air.

It was called the worst Medford team in 20 years, yet the first six times it got the ball, touchdown was marked up. Of the nine times the Tornado took control of the ball, seven ended in touchdowns.

And just for the record, spark plug Halfback Doug Crippen booted the first six extra points of the seven he tried.

The Indians chugged 33 yards on the first drive after the opening kickoff to push the Tornado far back into its own territory. Gene Lane's punt left the hosts with a first down back on their own four. But it just set the stage for a better Medford show. Seven plays later, the Tornado had driven the total 96 yards, 52 of them on three straight completed passes.

The next Roseburg punt left Medford 69 yards from paydirt. But the first play in the second quarter saw Crippen buck over right guard for his second touchdown of the day from a yard out.

Battle To 30
Setting their teeth with determination, the Indians battered from their own 15 into Medford territory and a pass interference break put them on the Tornado 30. That drive ended at 55 yards when Bob Desbiers lost the ball on a fumble at the 30.

On the first play from scrimmage, Medford's Alton Stone spurred into the crowd, brushed off a couple of half-hearted Roseburg tackles and galloped into the Indian end zone. The touchdown was momentarily recalled to the Roseburg 30 because of a clipping penalty.

The break gave the Indians new heart, and their defense tightened to make Medford use up nine plays for that last 30 yards. Finally Bob Walker bulled over on a quarterback sneak from the one. Trailing by 21 points, the Indians went to work again. Bob Thompson returned one of Crippen's many brilliant kickoffs to

the Roseburg 32. Danchok tried the center of the Medford line for six and Thompson added three more. Then, Danchok played a star role in one of the oddest plays of the game. He started around right end when three blockers suddenly loomed up in front of him. They got bunched in a slow moving tangle which stopped the thundering fullback. The middle of the Medford defensive line came clawing in and somehow got enmeshed in the tangle also.

28-Yard Run
Suddenly, Danchok appeared spinning around the pack and into the clear. He didn't have the speed to shake the safety man, but he did set up the only Roseburg score with a 28-yard run. He boomed through the center of the Medford bulwark on the next two plays for seven yards and then faded back to rifle a pass to Ron Hicks, who took it off the fingers of two Medford defenders.

Hicks shared the glory of Roseburg's only seven points by booting the extra point after this fine catch.

This brought the score to 21-7, but five plays later, the Medfordites had traveled 60 yards for another score. Crippen wrapped it up by heaving a short pass which Jerry Perkins carried into the end zone. This one came with just seven seconds left in the first half.

Seven plays after the second half opened, the Tornado was again in the Roseburg endzone after a 50-yard drive.

Sutherlin Bulldogs Crunch Over Glendale Pirates, 32-13

Glendale's Pirates shocked the Sutherlin Bulldogs with two first-quarter touchdowns before fading before a crunching ground attack that gave the Bulldogs a 32-13 victory at home Friday.

The intra-county tilt saw the Pirates move onto the Sutherlin field with fiery-eyed determination to capture their first win in their final game of the season: For the first quarter, it seemed their wish would come true. First Dwayne Miller boomed into the end zone. Then, Bob Dahl made it two by romping over in that initial frame.

With this two-touchdown handicap, the Bulldogs went to work to even it up in the second canto. Rodney Hague scored both a touchdown and a conversion to whittle off over half the lead. Then, Ted Buck scattered the falling Pirates for another score and the con-

version that put the hosts ahead for good, 14-13.

In the third quarter, Buck again hit paydirt. Then, the route was completed in the last frame as Troy Fennell caught a touchdown pass and Hague ran to his second touchdown.

It was the sixth straight loss for the Pirates, who are making their first venture into 11-man football this year. This loss was no black mark, however, since Sutherlin is an A-2 school while Glendale is a "B" school.
