

### Dr. Kenneth W. Kinney Of Roseburg VA Hospital Staff Retires After 29 Years In Service Of Government

Dr. Kenneth W. Kinney, chief of professional services at the Roseburg VA hospital, ended a 29-year career with the government when he retired from active duty Friday.

VA hospital staff members gathered at a party Thursday to pay tribute to Dr. Kinney, who's spent 15 of those 29 years at the local hospital. They presented him with a complete set of silver.

Dr. Kinney and his wife will remain in his native Oregon. Upon completion of pre-med work at Oregon State College, he entered Tulane University medical school at New Orleans.

He was graduated in 1916 he became the first from the Northwest to secure a degree from the institution.

In World War I he served in the psychiatry division of the U. S. Army Medical Corps. After the war he took advantage of the equivalent to our G.I. Bill and obtained further training as a diagnostician.

Dr. Kinney looks back on what he considers very "noticeable progress" in the quality of medicine practiced by the VA.

"This is particularly true of the Roseburg hospital," he says, "under the guidance and encouragement of Dr. John L. Haskins."

Medicine was a profession of long standing in his family. Kinney was following in the footsteps of his older brother, three uncles and a cousin.

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### Social Security Beneficiary Can Earn On Outside

Persons receiving old-age survivors insurance benefits can now earn as much as \$75 a month without losing their benefits, according to Claude E. Dawson, manager of the Eugene office of the Social Security Administration.

The amount of wages a person getting benefits is permitted to earn in a month without losing his payment has been raised from \$50 to \$75, beginning with the month of September.

In case a beneficiary is self-employed, he can accept his benefit checks if his net earnings from self-employment do not average more than \$75 a month, that is, more than \$900 for his taxable year.

Beneficiaries who work in employment not covered by the Social Security Act, and those who have reached the age of 75, may cash their checks regardless of how much they earn.

Dawson pointed out that his "work clause" applies not only to the retired worker, but also to a wife, widow, child, or parent who is receiving benefits based on the social security account of a retired or deceased worker.

Any beneficiary who is working for wages should notify the Social Security Administration promptly if he earns over \$75 in one month. A self-employed beneficiary should notify the administration as soon as he sees that his net earnings are likely to average more than \$75 a month for the taxable year.

Matthew Ridgway and the joint chiefs of staff "are just not interested in saving the lives of American boys by building up the South Korean army."

"How far," Truman asked, "can a man go in impugning the character and patriotism of his former associates?"

In the Eisenhower camp there was a growing atmosphere of optimism. Noting professional pollsters' reports that Stevenson may be gaining, they said the upsurge is coming too late.

The general's top strategist estimated they have a better-than-even chance to carry New York and California and consider Pennsylvania in the bag. These three have 109 electoral votes among them.

### Intestinal worms

are much more prevalent in children than adults as they are more apt to be much less clean in their habits than adults. Children suck their fingers, and handle dogs and cats from which they may acquire the eggs of the worms. They are also apt to scratch themselves about the bowel exit, in this way transfer the eggs to the mouth and again to the digestive tract. As many as three thousand worm eggs have been counted in a piece of excrement as large as a single grain of wheat. Worms are often conveyed, too, in the form of eggs, in drinking water. Uncooked and improperly washed vegetables are often a source of worm infection.

### Also, picking the nose, fever, convulsions, uncertain—sometimes ravenous—appetite without gaining weight, pain and uneasiness about the navel, foul breath, vomiting, constipation, and diarrhea. These symptoms, however, are often merely the result of debility and have no connection with worms.

### Tapeworms in adults also produce very indefinite symptoms, such as nausea, diarrhea, discomfort in the bowels, anemia, and various nervous symptoms.

### Round worms are also quite common and are from four to ten inches long, pointed at the ends like earthworms, but of a yellowish color or tinged with red. They naturally inhabit the upper parts of the bowel but wander about and often are vomited from the stomach. They may thus be found in the nose or throat. They are ordinarily seen in the excrement and a white, mucous discharge from the bowels is occasionally mistaken for round worms.

### The common tapeworms are of two varieties; beef and pork tapeworms, caused by eating of the raw or improperly cooked meats. The ordinary tapeworm is from twelve to twenty or more feet in length, made up of white flattened joints or segments. The head is the size of a large pinhead, the middle and lower part of the body is from a quarter to half inch in width.
