

New Ballot Obtainable To Correct Mistake

A member of the Republican Central Committee called attention today to the provisions of Oregon's election laws concerning errors by a voter in marking his ballot and his right to obtain a new ballot.

If a voter, by accident or mistake, spoils his ballot, so there is danger it will be rejected by the counting board, he has the right to return the spoiled ballot and to receive another in its place.

If the voter spoils three successive ballots, it is accepted as evidence of his inability to prepare a ballot without assistance, whereupon he is entitled to the assistance of two judges to prepare his ballot for him.

The committee member pointed out that ballots frequently are rejected because the voter makes errors, then attempts corrections which fail to make clear his intent.

It is better in such cases to obtain a new ballot than attempt to vote one which may be rejected, he said.

States senator. But there will be a good many people in Oregon who can beat Senator Morse. I am not going to debate with the senator, as I said in my radio speech. Let me debate with himself.

Jabs At Eisenhower

In the Town Hall speech and at a news conference which preceded it Morse repeated his charges that (1) Eisenhower's administration of the North Atlantic Treaty Organization (NATO) in Europe was "wasteful" and (2) that the general, as a member of the joint chiefs of staff in 1947, recommended the withdrawal of American troops from Korea.

Morse said the basis for the second charge was a heretofore top secret document.

Speaking at a political rally in Washington, D. C., sponsored by the CIO United Automobile Workers, Morse repeated his criticism of Eisenhower's plan to visit Korea if elected.

"The war in Korea isn't going to be settled by a grand gesture visit," Morse said. "It's going to be settled by the United Nations."

Ike Will End Campaign In Speech At Boston

1947. Signed by the late Secretary of Defense James Forrestal, it quoted a report from the Joint Chiefs of Staff and said they considered that from the standpoint of military security, the U. S. had "little interest" in maintaining its troops and bases in Korea.

Eisenhower was Army chief of staff at the time and the President has claimed that he bears part of the responsibility for the decision to pull American forces off the peninsula.

Eisenhower's answer has been that the political decision to withdraw came two years after the report of the joint chiefs, namely in 1949.

Price Rigging Charged

A series of statements went out from Eisenhower's camp yesterday. In one, Gov. Sherman Adams of New Hampshire, the general's campaign manager, accused the Democrats of trying to "rig farm prices for political advantage." Adams said:

"Reports have reached me which indicate that the administration has broken the price of corn by dumping an excessive amount of corn owned by the Commodity Credit Corporation on the market in recent months, and at the same time has been holding back on the food purchasing program for the ECA Economic Co-operation Administration."

In Washington, Secretary of Agriculture Brannan retorted:

"That is a cheap political unmitigated lie."

"The price of corn has seasonally gone down as it does whenever a big crop is harvested, as it is at this time of the year."

Sen. George Aiken of Vermont claimed the administration was using this alleged dumping method. He telegraphed Eisenhower that the Democrats are trying to "frighten the American people into voting to continue the present administration."

Eisenhower's headquarters also released a letter from Edward A. O'Neal, former president of the American Farm Bureau Federation, endorsing Eisenhower. He wrote in part, regarding a farm program:

"I nail as lies statements that are being made by the administration... that (1) the Democratic party alone gave you this program, and (2) Eisenhower if elected would take it away."

"Gen. Van Fleet himself has told us repeatedly that as long as the Chinese are in the war, the South Koreans are incapable of manning the front lines alone."

In New York, Eisenhower had no comment. His press secretary, James C. Hagerty, said:

"Since when are 15 out of 167 war correspondents military experts?"

Ike's Proposals Seared

Of the Eisenhower proposals, Stevenson said: "All of these have been designed to play upon the natural impatience of the American people with a military stalemate; designed to divide not to unite us; designed to separate us from our allies, not to increase our collective strength; and all with the effect of sapping, not building, the courage and resolution of the American people."

The Democratic candidate said:

"What would have happened if we had failed to meet the Communist challenge in Korea? Men everywhere would have said that Americans talked big and acted small. We would have justified the criticism of Chinese Communists who call us a 'paper tiger.' We would have forfeited our role as leader of the free world—and there is on one else to lead it. And we should have forfeited our great prestige in the Orient."

Wyatt declined to give a breakdown on the states which he said Stevenson would carry. But he did say New York, Pennsylvania, Illinois and California were regarded as "certain" for Stevenson, along with the "Solid South" including Virginia.

Symphonette Concert Wins Warm Approval

Something different in Community Concert programs was presented Saturday night, when the Longines Symphonette made its appearance under the able direction of Misha Piastro, conductor. The presentation took place before a near capacity audience in the Junior High Auditorium.

The popular radio entertainers offered a group of selections especially chosen for symphonette. The pleasure of the audience in the well-executed presentations was amply demonstrated in its applause. Piastro returned three times to lead his group of musicians in encores.

The conductor, himself, demonstrated his own ability at the violin, playing Mendelssohn's finale from Violin Concerto in E minor, Op. 64, long considered a favorite. He played in unison with four violinists. Soloist for this particular performance was violinist Chaim Taub, who received a generous ovation.

The program opened with Frescobaldi's Toccata, and continued with Symphony in D, No. 53, "Imperial" by Haydn; Arcadian songs and dances, "Louisiana Story" by Thompson, and Sammie Barber's Adagio for Strings. Piastro's violin presentation concluded the first group of selections.

The symphonette continued with intermezzo, "Jewels of the Madonna," Wolf-Ferrari; Taub's solo, Suite for "Amber," a composition of Nicholas Flageolet, dedicated to Amber, the cocker spaniel of the Piastros, an ardent patron of the Longines Symphonette. She never misses a concert and sits next to Mrs. Piastro backstage, never barking, always listening to her master's music.

Lighter were the final presentations, Ravel-Schmid's Pavane Pour Une Infante Defunte; Arthur Benjamin's Jamaican Rumba, and the concluding Gershwin-Spiak's "Porgy and Bess" suite.

State Sen. Sam Coon, Baker Republican and a rancher, is opposed by John G. Jones, LaGrande Democrat, former radio station manager who directed displaced persons camps in Germany after World War II.

The other seat the Democrats hope to win is that held by Rep. Homer D. Angell, Portland Republican who has served since 1939, longer than any other Oregon representative or senator. His opponent is Alfred H. Corbett, Portland lawyer.

While this district is Democratic, Angell always has drawn considerable support from Democrats and labor.

Reps. Walter Norblad, Astoria, and Harris Ellsworth, Roseburg, are heavily favored for reelection.

State Offices Also Eyed

The Democrats also are making a strong bid for the three state offices on the ballot.

Secretary of State Earl T. Newberry is opposed for reelection by Democratic Edith Green, Portland, who has been active in school and civic circles. Several Republican newspapers are on her side.

Sigfrid B. Unander, Portland, who resigned as state Republican chairman to run for state treasurer, is opposed by Francis Lambert, also of Portland, a Democrat who served as Multnomah County treasurer.

District Attorney John McCourt of Multnomah County, Republican, is running for attorney general against State Rep. Robert Y. Thornton, young Tillamook lawyer who is another Democrat with some Republican newspaper support.

Bills Draw Battles

Some of the most violent campaigns have been waged over the ballot measures. There are 18 of them, the hottest being the bills to repeal weight-mile truck taxes, abolish milk control at retail and wholesale levels, ban pari-mutuel betting, permit sale of liquor by the drink, and prevent daylight saving time.

The last two presidential elections in Oregon have been close. Oregon was the only far western state in 1948 to vote for Gov. Dewey, who carried the state over

Morse of Oregon said he was leaving the Republican party to back Stevenson, principally because Eisenhower was embracing Taft policies. There has been much switching of prominent independents toward the Democratic candidate in recent weeks.

Months ago politicians were saying that the man who got the independent vote would win. If Eisenhower had it in July, Stevenson seemed to be splitting it in October.

Both men have been getting tremendous crowds at the campaign's close. Eisenhower always had them, due perhaps in part to his reputation as a war hero.
