Employers May Pay Year-End Bonus To Help

WASHINGTON (AP) — Employers may pay their employees a year-end bonus of up to \$40 apiece without violating any government wage regulation, says Economic Stabilizer Roger L. Putnam.

This applies to employers who have never paid such a bonus in the past or who have paid \$40 or less. Those who have given larger amounts will be permitted to pay the same bonus without specific board approval.

Putnam issued his ruling Friday after receiving a recommendation from the Wage Stabilization Board. He said such bonus payments will not be charged against any anti-inflation pay regulations.

The WSB, meanwhile, passed a resolution which allows employers to give their employees the day off with pay on each of the Fridays which follow Thanksgiving, Christmas and New Year's Day. These days off, which would give workers a four-day weekend, will not be charged against amounts authorized under WSB regulations.

Bloodmobile Is Slated To Visit Two Days

Mrs. R. C. Grant, chairman of volunteer workers for the Red Cross, in announcing the coming visit of the Bloodmobile stressed the urgent need for blood in the Red Cross program both at home and for the Korean war front.

The Bloodmobile is scheduled to be in Roseburg at the Elks Temple Nov. 6, from 4 to 8 p.m., and Friday, Nov. 7, from 9 a.m. to 1 p.m.

At least 400 pints of blood will be asked for as the quota this time, as the Bloodmobile is making visits here every three months instead of two.

Need for blood is vital, she emphasized, as the supply on hand can hardly take care of immediate needs, without consideration of needs in case of a major disaster.

To avoid delay in time necessary for taking of blood, persons willing to contribute are urged to make appointments in advance by calling 3-5219 or the Red Cross office, 3-3255.

Also volunteer workers are urgently needed to assist at the Elks Temple in processing donors. Persons willing to aid should call the Red Cross office.

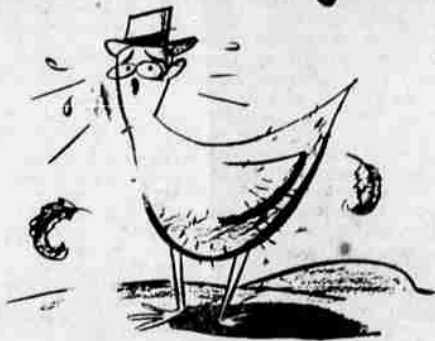
