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SAN FRANCISCO (AP) — Football's big championship chase out this way was still a two team race Monday between the unbeaten conference giants, UCLA and Southern California.

When they collide in Los Angeles Nov. 22, the winner most likely will be the coast's representative in the Rose Bowl.

The UCLA Bruins, with a flashing attack and stiff defense, took another long stride toward the title by smothering California's Bears 28-7 last week. It gave them four league wins and an overall record of seven victories.

Paul Cameron, the Bruins' fine tailback, returned to full time service for the first time this season. He threw two touchdown passes and directed a 68-yard scoring march. Injuries had benched him

for all but 40 minutes in the team's six previous games.

The defeat, second in a row, practically knocked California out of the running for high honors. The Bears, incidentally, were preseason choice to make the championship grade. They lost last week to USC, 10-0.

This week end, UCLA entertains Oregon State and figures to notch up another conference win handsily.

Southern California, idle last Saturday and with a league record of 3-0, travels to Palo Alto for a meeting with the sometimes troublesome Stanford Indians. Stanford walloped San Jose State 35-13 in a non-conference game last week.

Washington, showing marked improvement every week under the brilliant leadership of Don Heinrich, gets a home town whack at embattled California this Saturday. Heinrich, the T-formation counterpart of Cameron's single wing generalship for UCLA, threw three touchdown passes in his team's 38-13 win over Oregon State last week.

In conference competition, Washington still has some hopes with a 4-1 record. It lost to UCLA, 32-1 in the third game of the season.

Washington State, 36-6 winner over Idaho, travels to Eugene for a conference engagement with off-beaten Oregon. The Webfoots, in the throes of a disappointing grid year, lost to non-league College of the Pacific 14-6 in their latest out.

5 Major Grid Teams Hope To Stay In Unbeaten Ranks

NEW YORK (AP) — As the politicians would say, the time has come, ladies and gentlemen, to start looking ahead.

Five football coaches of the country's major teams are doing just that today. They're looking ahead to the remainder of their schedules and hoping they can remain unbeaten and untied. Michigan State, Maryland, Georgia Tech, Southern California and UCLA are the teams still in the select circle.

One thing is certain and that is, barring a tie, either UCLA's Red Sanders or Southern Cal's Jesse Hill is going to be disappointed before the season ends. Their teams meet head on two weeks from Saturday and on the result probably will go the Pacific Coast Conference title and a bid to the Rose Bowl.

Neither has a particularly tough task this week. UCLA meets Oregon State and Southern Cal goes against Stanford, the defending conference champion.

As for Biggie Munn and his Michigan State outfit, the No. 1 team in the weekly Associated Press poll, the Spartans' next three opponents — Indiana, Notre Dame and Marquette — are thinking up ways and means of keeping the score down. Of them all the Irish stand the best chance of getting through unscathed.

Jim Tatum's Maryland forces face the two toughest foes on their schedule when they get back into action two weeks hence — Mississippi and Alabama.

If Bobby Dodd and his Georgia Tech operatives can get by Alabama on Nov. 15, they should be able to close the season's business with a perfect slate.

In addition to Mississippi, Oklahoma and Villanova still are among the unbeaten although tied.

As for the bowls, the picture still is cloudy and probably will be for at least another week. Georgia Tech is a certainty to go to either the Orange or Sugar Bowl — probably the latter. Michigan State, which operates under Big Ten rules, is ineligible as is Maryland, which is on a one-year suspension from the Southern Conference for playing in the Sugar Bowl Jan. 1.

The Rose Bowl probably will have UCLA or Southern California

as the host. The Big Ten representative is far from being determined. Purdue is the current leader. Michigan also has a good chance of making it, despite being upset, 22-13, by Illinois Saturday.

The Southwest Conference champion acts as host in the Cotton Bowl. The best that can be said is that Texas, on the basis of its 31-14 triumph over Southern Methodist, is in the favorite's role.

Next President Sports Devotee

WASHINGTON (AP) — No matter who wins the election, the White House will have, for the first time since Warren G. Harding was there 30 years ago, a President who goes in for a competitive sport.

Eisenhower plays golf; Stevenson plays tennis.

Harding was a golfer, and a good one. He shot consistently in the 80's.

Eisenhower recently shot an 81, and once had a 79 at Blind Brook in Port Chester, N. Y.

After Harding came a couple of fishermen: Calvin Coolidge and Herbert Hoover.

Franklin D. Roosevelt swam in spite of his physical handicaps. Harry S. Truman walks.

None of these sports is considered competitive, although there may be a difference of opinion here by some fish and by some fishermen.

Truman several times has told the story about how he wanted to be a baseball player, and how he failed to make it because his eyesight was poor.

"So they made me the umpire," Truman cheerfully recalls.

If Eisenhower wins, he'll have one distinction no other President ever has had. He will be the only one who ever tackled the great Jim Thorpe.

Eisenhower was playing football at West Point, and made the tackle in a game with Carlisle. Eisenhower and the other cadets didn't make enough tackles, though. The Indians won, 27-6.

Spokane Golfer Takes Mexican Amateur Crown

MEXICO CITY (AP) — Al Mengert, a finalist in the U. S. amateur golf tournament, is the proud possessor of the Mexican amateur golf title.

Mengert, 23-year-old native of Spokane, Wash., won the 27th annual Mexican event Sunday, defeating Count Henri Lamaze of France, 1-up, in the 36-hole final.

The new champion, up all night because of an intestinal infection and fever, tired on the final nine holes but his four hole lead was too much for Lamaze to overhaul.

Mengert went over par on the 12th and 14th and Lamaze sank a six foot shot to birdie the 17th and draw to within one of tying it up. However, the Frenchman parred the 18th to lose out.

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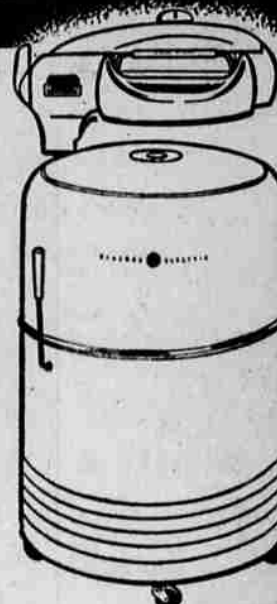
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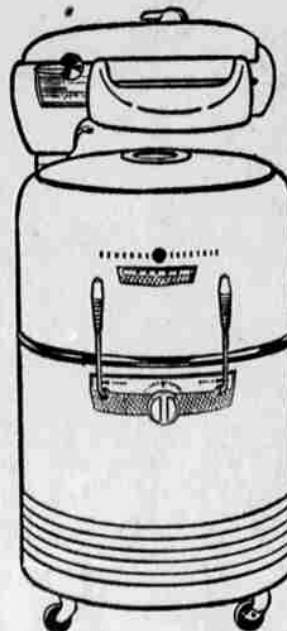
