HAS GUEST SPEAKER FROM BREMERTON, WASH.

A capacity crowd gathered at the dinner meeting of the Retail Credit Association of Douglas County and the Roseburg Credit Women's Club Wednesday evening to hear Miss Avadana Cockran of Bremerton, Wash., who talked on the functions and uses of the various credit organizations. Miss Cockran told of her 32 years experience as a credit grantor. Comparing the growth of Roseburg with Bremerton and other towns she pointed out that the time is past when everybody knows everybody else. Credit reporting is required now, and the credit bureau is the most economical and scientific solution with its accumulation of information available immediately. She suggested that whenever a credit bureau does not serve satisfactorily a committee from the association should help with suggestions.

Coupled with the growth of the community is the need for increased credit granting thus creating another reason for pooling of information. Miss Cockran also pointed out that credit organizations have a responsibility of education in how to maintain good credit standing. Complete, adequate applications enable the credit grantor to prevent the consumer from becoming financially over-involved. She urged credit grantors to become more skilled now averting accumulations of default accounts should there come a period of unemployment or depression.

Miss Cockran discussed geographic coverage, purposes, objects, outstanding committees, and co-ordination of credit organizations of District 10 of the National Retail Credit Association. "Pat" O'Reilly, president of the local association, presided at the meeting and introduced the officers of the Credit Women's Breakfast Club and out of town guests. Miss Cockran was entertained later in the evening at the home of Mr. and Mrs. O'Reilly.
