

### Aged Man Found Dead In Hotel

Found dead in his room at the Douglas Hotel at noon Tuesday was an elderly man who signed the register as George Kinney, Omaha, Neb.

Clerk William Hudnell discovered the body lying fully clothed across the bed when he checked rooms at noon. Kinney had checked in about 4:30 p.m. Monday.

District Attorney Robert Stults believed the death due to natural causes. Report from an autopsy performed on the body was not available today.

Blood on the dead man's face was attributed to a nose bleed, Stults said, as hotel employees reported Kinney had one when they saw him Monday afternoon.

Stults guessed the man's age as "about 70."

The dead man's fingerprints were taken and sent to FBI for checking. Deputy Coroner Roy Cox went to the scene immediately after the body was discovered. The body was taken to Long and Orr Mortuary.

four of nine undecided races to seat 48 Republicans in addition to Sen. Wayne Morse of Oregon, who turned independent and supported Stevenson.

**Morse Is Vital "If"**

If the GOP won the four outstanding races in which they were leading—in Kentucky, Wyoming, Arizona and Michigan—they could organize the senate Jan. 3 with Morse's help.

If Morse, who won't say how he will vote on the question, joined the Democrats that party could organize the Senate with the tie-breaking vote of Vice President Barkley.

Then the Republicans would have to rely on Sen. Richard M. Nixon of California, swept into office by the Eisenhower landslide, becomes vice president 17 days later to reverse the result.

The general's friend and one of his earliest presidential backers, Sen. Henry Cabot Lodge Jr., conceded defeat by his Democratic opponent, Rep. John F. Kennedy in the Massachusetts senatorial race.

Republican Sen. Jems P. Kim of Missouri went down to defeat and Sen. Harry Cain of Washington lost to Rep. Henry M. Jackson. Eisenhower carried Washington but Missouri still was in doubt.

In Ohio, Democratic Gov. Frank Lausche won going away from Charles Taft, brother of the senator, despite Eisenhower's heavy majority over Stevenson in the state.

On the other hand, Eisenhower's surge helped Sen. Joseph R. McCarthy of Wisconsin and William E. Jenner of Indiana get reelected. Both were prime targets for Democratic attack in the campaign.

### Chinese Reds Stall Another Hill Attack

SEOUL, Korea (AP)—Bloody fighting for Triangle Hill and Sniper Ridge flared today into the heaviest action of the 23-day struggle for the Korean Central Front heights.

South Korean troops in a pre-dawn sneak attack stabbed within 10 yards of the crest of Triangle Hill, then were pinned down by Chinese Red hand grenades and machine-gun fire. Five previous Allied attempts to retake the height, lost on Friday, have stalled in the same place.

Other Republic of Korea troops seized one of two knobs on an offshoot ridge of Triangle, called Jane Russell Hill.

### Leaders Of Union Labor Walloped In Tuesday's Vote

WASHINGTON (AP)—Organized labor's long era of special influence in government, such as it enjoyed under the Democratic "New Deal" and "Fair Deal" appears over. The union bosses took a terrific licking in Tuesday's election.

All the union leaders, with one or two exceptions, supported the Democratic cause and urged the nation's workers to do likewise.

But it seems apparent from the record vote and what happened in the big industrial areas that the workers largely ignored the urging of their leaders.

The victory of Gen. Dwight D. Eisenhower demonstrated that labor unions lack the power, to a far greater degree than was often claimed, to deliver worker votes in key elections.

Most of the union leaders declined any comment when the proportion of Eisenhower's victory became known.

But one, Jack Kroll, director of the CIO's Political Action Committee, said: "General Eisenhower has been selected as the president of all the American people. He is entitled to their support in carrying out the duties and obligations of that high office."

These are a few of the things the election results will probably mean for union labor.

1. The unions very likely won't have the same degree of sympathy at the White House under Eisenhower that they had under presidents Roosevelt and Truman. Eisenhower has pledged to be fair to labor and every other element of the population. But this sounds like a far different approach than the frank partisanship in behalf of labor which the unions enjoyed under Roosevelt and Truman.

2. There won't be any repeal of the Taft-Hartley law. Eisenhower has promised to make needed changes in the law, without being specific.

### Gov. Dewey Gratified At Eisenhower Victory

NEW YORK (AP)—Gov. Thomas E. Dewey, one of Gen. Dwight D. Eisenhower's original backers, expressed gratification Wednesday over the election results. He said in a statement:

"For the sake of our country and the cause of peace in the world, I am deeply happy over the election of General Eisenhower as president.

"The American people have chosen a great leader for the difficult times ahead. I am particularly happy that New York state has given General Eisenhower the greatest majority of any state in the nation."

### CV School Census Shows Increase Of 15

The school census recently completed in Camas Valley shows an increase of 15 children over last year's census, according to Guy Moore, census taker. Moore was assisted in his duties by Mrs. Moore.

The total enrollment figure is 288. This includes children from four to the 29 birthday. 58 children were removed from the roll, but 73 were added. There are 158 boys and 130 girls. A breakdown of the figure shows 22 four-year-olds, 20 five-year-olds, 2 in college, 15 married and 2 in the service.

### Forget Differences, Demo Chairman Urges

WASHINGTON (AP)—Democrat National Chairman Stephen A. Mitchell today urged members of his party to forget their campaign differences and get on with the job of keeping America strong and free.

Mitchell said Stevenson had become "a leader of national stature and we shall hear more from him."

He said Stevenson and Sen. John Sparkman, his vice presidential running mate, had "kept their principles and talked sense to the American people."

"Our candidates and this committee—as far as I know—never struck a low blow in the campaign," Mitchell said.

### Hamilton Precinct First To Finish Count

Hamilton Precinct from the city of Roseburg was the first to complete its count and report to The News-Review Tuesday night. With an 80 per cent vote, the counting board completed its tally at 9 o'clock, one hour after the polls closed.

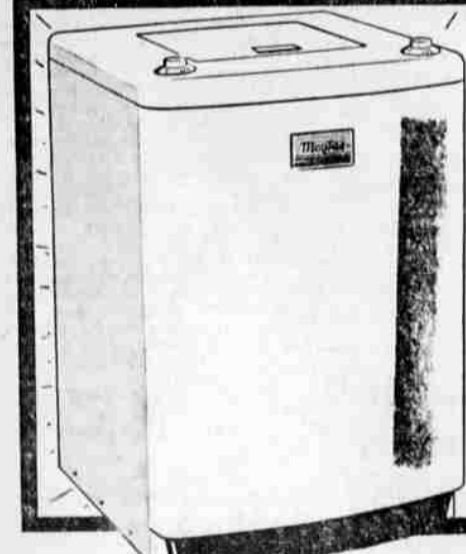

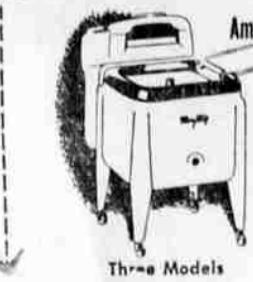

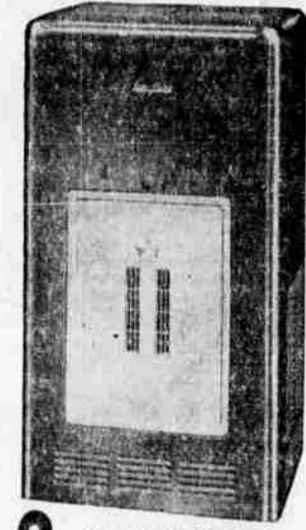
