Sutherlin Plans New City Hall, Sewer System

The Sutherlin city planning com-
mission has recommended im-
mediate action by the City Council
on proposed sewer installations, City
Manager W. D. Bollman reported.

In a meeting this week, the plan-
ning commission also approved
plans and specifications for the
new city hall, which will be built
a portion at a time at an esti-
mated total cost of some \$50,000.

The Sutherlin council must ap-
prove both before action can be
taken. A special meeting is sched-
uled on the proposed sewer system
as soon as plans are returned by
an engineering firm.

Bollman estimated the sewer
project would require a bond
issue of some \$500,000. The estimate
is an upward revision from the or-
iginal estimate of \$425,000, Boll-
man said.

If okayed by the council, Suther-
lin voters will be given an oppor-
tunity to decide on the bond issue
later.

Basic Training Given Douglas Police Officers

Basic training school is being
held this week for Roseburg and
Douglas County police officers.
Roseburg Chief Stan O. Olson said
today.

Officers from the Roseburg and
Myrtle Creek police departments
are attending along with several
from the sheriff's office.

The school started Monday and
will continue through Friday af-
ternoon.

Sponsoring agencies are the Ore-
gon Association of City Police Of-
ficers and the Oregon State
Sheriffs Assn. Cooperating agen-
cies are the FBI, State Board of
Education, Bureau of Municipal
Research of the University of Ore-
gon, and the League of Oregon
Cities.

The Roseburg training program
is one of a series of six through-
out Oregon.

Chief Olson is in charge of ar-
rangements.

Officers were given lectures on
laws of arrest, search and seizure
Monday and mechanics of arrest
on Tuesday. Wednesday the pro-
gram will turn to traffic enforce-
ment and accident investigation.
Thursday the officers will study
investigation interviews and moot
court. The study will continue
through Friday.

The weeks previous, there had
been one meeting a week. Last
week officers studied rules and
regulations, and the week pre-
vious the study started with depart-
mental organization.

Next Monday night the Oregon
State Liquor Commission will
discuss liquor problems and the
following week a demonstration
will be given in chemical testing
for intoxication. Chief Olson said
he hopes to start chemical test-
ing in the Roseburg police depart-
ment when money is available.

Mrs. Nixon's Name, Birth Date Hits Charge

BOSTON (AP) — A spokesman for
Sen. Richard Nixon, Republican
vice presidential candidate, has de-
nied charges by a Democratic party
official that Mrs. Nixon's name
is not Patricia and that she was
not born on St. Patrick's day.

The denial was made last night
by James Bassett, Nixon's press
secretary, in reply to a charge by
Mrs. India Edwards, vice chair-
man of the Democratic National
Committee.

Mrs. Edwards had said in Wash-
ington that Mrs. Nixon was born
Thelma Katherine not Patricia—
on March 16, not on March 17.

He entered the prison July 7 to
serve three years. He had been
living in Dunsuir, Warden Virgil
O'Malley said.

Livestock Prices Down,
Milk And Poultry Up

SEATTLE (AP) — A state-federal
Agriculture Department report
Tuesday listed sharply lower
prices to livestock producers in re-
cent months.

Beef cattle sold last month for
an average of \$23.50 a hundred-
weight, the report said, against
\$29.40 last March.

Prices for sheep dropped in the
same period from \$13.10 to \$7 and
veal calves from \$32.50 to \$24.50.
There also were declines in lamb
and hog prices.

Milk and poultry prices showed
increases.

Tito Denounces Soviet, Pledges Link With Allies

ZAGREB, Yugoslavia (AP) — In fi-
ery defiance of Russian threats of
domination, Premier Marshal Tito
accused the Soviet Union today of
promoting a third world war and
pledged Yugoslavia's co-operation
with the West in preserving peace.

He laid before the sixth Congress
of the Yugoslav Communist Party,
which opened yesterday, 40,000-
word review of his struggle to
maintain his country's freedom
against heavy military and econ-
omic odds since he broke with the
Kremlin-led Cominform in 1948.

His speech today was one of can-
dorous optimism, but he warned his
party that "there is less and less
prospect of finding a reasonable
solution for burning international
questions."

Tito cautioned that Russia "is
arming itself and its satellites in
order to achieve its aims by force;
to hold enslaved countries in sub-
jugation, to seize new territories
enslave other peoples."

Turning toward Yugoslavia's re-
lations with the West, Tito said co-
existence is not only possible be-
tween communistic and capitalistic
countries but that experience
has shown in concrete ways that
such co-operation may prove mutu-
ally useful.
