Oldest Civil War Vet Votes Via Ambulance

ROCHESTER, N. Y. — James A. Hard, carried to a voting machine from an ambulance Tuesday, told the driver: "Come back and get me again in four years. I want to cast another vote for Ike."

At the polling place, four persons helped the 111-year-old Republican who is the nation's oldest veteran of the Civil War. Two men from the ambulance, which brought him from a nursing home, carried him in a litter chair to the voting machine. Two women poll workers, one Republican and one Democrat, helped him cast his vote. Hard is blind.

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Oregon Yields World's Oldest Pair Of Sandals

WASHINGTON (AP) — The oldest pair of sandals in the world was found in Oregon, Dr. Frank H. H. Roberts of the Smithsonian Institution here has reported.

Writing in a recent bulletin, Roberts said the sandals, found by Dr. L. S. Cressman of the University of Oregon in Fort Rock Cave of Southeast Oregon, were 9,000 years old. That makes them the oldest man-made items that scientists have been able to date, Roberts said.

The date of the sandals was established by Dr. W. F. Libby and associates at the University of Chicago. The age was determined from the amount of radioactive carbon remaining in the vegetable fibers, as well as the age of the layer of pumice which covered them in the cave.

Some basketry decorated with a false embroidery was found near the sandals, Roberts said the items showed the ancient people who inhabited what now is Oregon had reached a fairly high degree of primitive culture, probably on a par with the people of the late ice age in Europe.

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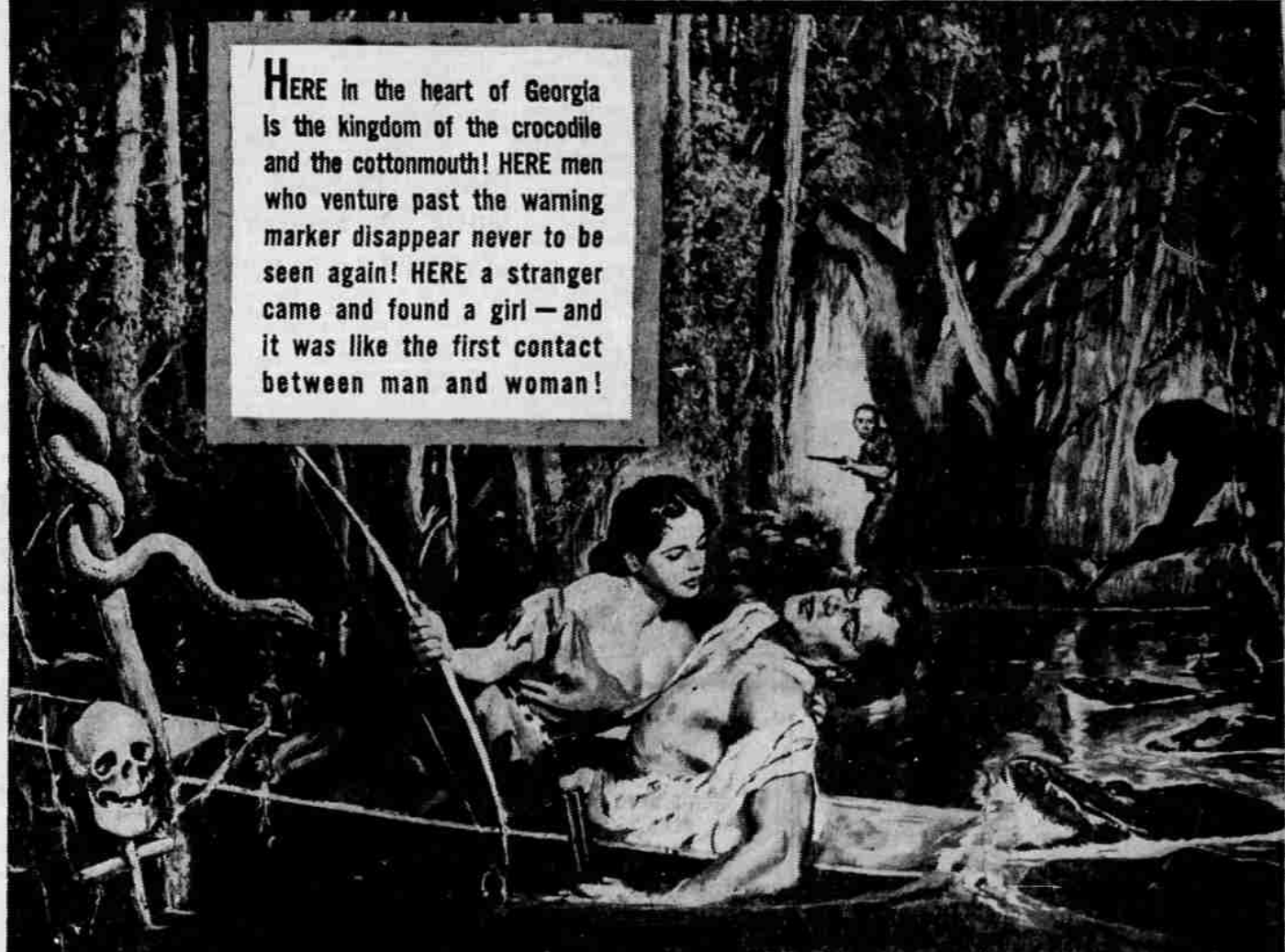
