Truman Silent On His Party's Crushing Defeat

ABOARD TRUMAN TRAIN — President Truman kept his thoughts to himself today as he rolled toward Washington on the campaign train that started out over the Labor Day week end carrying high Democratic hopes.

Harry S. Truman gave them all he had in Milwaukee in New York, in Boston, San Francisco, in all the big cities and little towns from one end of the country to the other.

For 18,000 miles he traveled, making a total of 212 speeches for Adlai Stevenson, driving himself even harder than when he campaigned for his own election when he was four years younger—64 instead of 68.

He finished each night so weary he crawled into his berth often too tired to look over speech material for the following day.

But each morning found him up at 6 a.m. smiling, cheerful, and eagerly awaiting another day.

His first stop will be to offer Gen. Eisenhower, the one-time friend against whom he campaigned so vigorously, full co-operation in the American tradition.

The future holds many uncertainties for him.

An avid reader of history, he would have historians record that he worked for international cooperation and world peace.

He has said on many occasions that only the test of time determines how good a president a man has made.

October Report On City Police

Two homicides were investigated by Roseburg police during the months of October and both were cleared by arrests, according to the October report of Police Chief Stan O. Olson.

The first occurred Oct. 8 at 728 S. Pine St. when Mrs. Ethel L. Bouse was drowned in a bathtub. Her husband is in the county jail charged with first degree murder.

The second occurred four days later, when L. C. Parker was fatally stabbed. Mary Jewell Gilpin is held on a second degree murder charge.

Enforcement, both on standing violations and hazardous moving violations has increased in October over September, Olson said. There were 500 more standing violations and 39 more hazardous moving citations. A total of 151½ hours of overtime was put in by the police department, half of which was in guarding Thomas S. Bouse while he was in Community Hospital from self-inflicted wounds.

The balance was spent on criminal investigation and special Halloween duty.

City officers investigated eight accidents, impounded nine vehicles and made 63 criminal arrests. Property recovered amounted to \$2,763.

Felony crimes in Roseburg during October included four breaks and enters and one auto theft. The city collected \$4,111.30 in parking meter fees during October, and collected \$2,722.50 in fines and bail forfeitures.

Collections of returns at the office of The News-Review was the slowest in the memory of veteran tabulators.

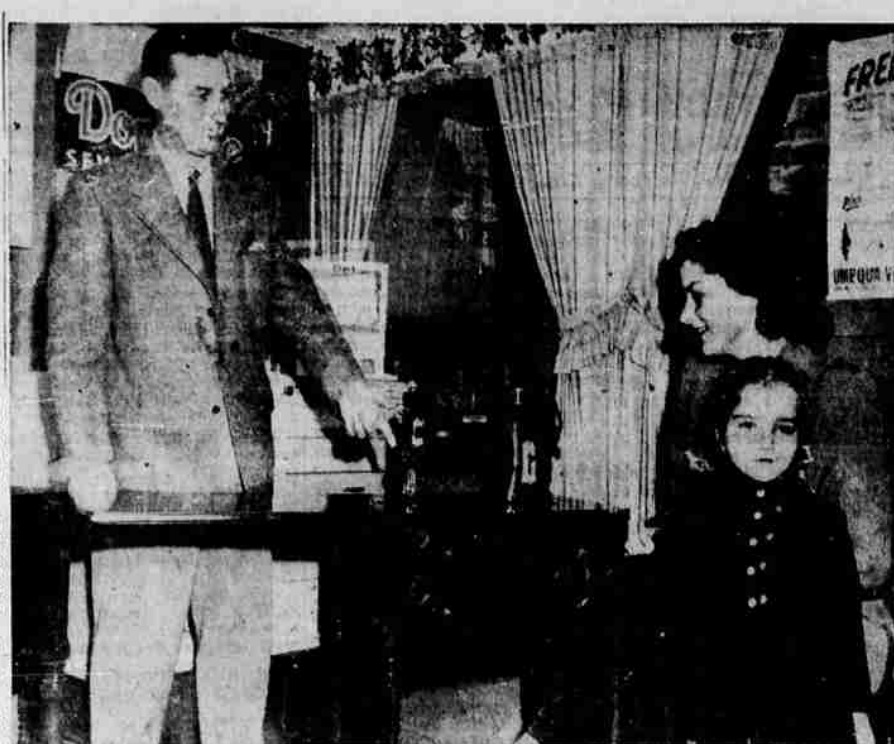
The high percentage of voters, coupled with late voting by a large number of people, swamped counting boards.

Normally at least one-half the county's precincts have completed their count by midnight. Only one-tenth had finished by midnight Tuesday. Reports did not begin to hit normal pace until after 3 p.m. Return of first boards and continuation of counting well into Wednesday forenoon and possibly until afternoon was anticipated in some of the larger precincts, where election boards were swamped with the avalanche of ballots.

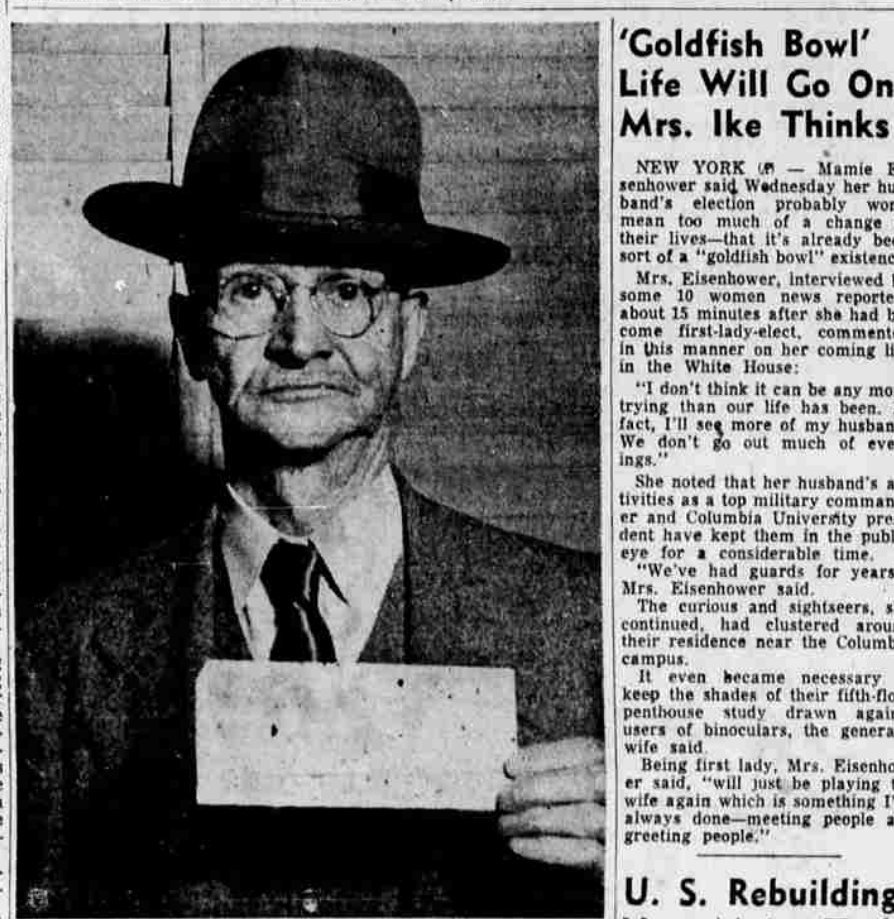
Dillard Methodists Plan Family Night For Friday

BACK FROM KOREA Calapooia Area Fire Again Leaps Barrier

Harlan L. Heckman, seaman USN, son of Mr. and Mrs. Ralph Heckman of Gardiner, returned Nov. 2 to Long Beach, Calif., aboard the anti-aircraft Cruiser USS Juneau from the Korean combat zone.

The Juneau was the first American warship to take part in the Korean action, reporting for duty on June 27, 1950, and supporting UN ground troops defending South Korea. During her current tour, the Juneau has steamed more than 50,000 miles since leaving Long Beach last March, destroying troop installations at Songjin, Suwon-Dan, Sin-Po, Hungnam and Kijo areas.

Self-Sustaining Europe Nearing, G. Springer Says

George Springer, with the Mutual Security Agency at Paris, France, is optimistic that European countries soon will be on a self-sustaining basis.

Springer, brother of Eugene and George Springer and Mrs. Paul Shanklin of Roseburg, is in the United States for six weeks' leave, making a tour of the United States and spending two weeks here. Coming by the southern route, he expects to leave here Sunday for return by the southern route, and will visit also on the East Coast.

The Mutual Security Agency, he explained, is the successor of the Marshall plan, but works in reverse of the former, in that its aim is to place Europe on its own, so far as production and agriculture is concerned. The Marshall plan was in a form of direct relief. MSA provides technical assistance.

Two countries have been added under the NATO agreement that were not under the old Marshall aid plan. They are Yugoslavia and Spain, making 14 in all.

The plan has had a considerable measure of success, said Springer, since its inception in November of 1948. He believes this year-end reports will be very encouraging.

Agriculture Stressed

Effort is directed to further management and labor relations in reorganization of industries in general. Also agriculture is stressed, either by demonstration or by education of techniques. About 280 technicians are in this work.

Springer doesn't believe European production will soon rise to offer much competition with U.S. production. Betterment of the living standard will absorb all foreseeable production, he believes.

Best results have been shown in the northern countries, including Norway, Sweden, Denmark, Germany and in Italy, Greece and Turkey. Turkey has risen from a wheat importing country to an exporting country in two years. Less results are being shown in France.

'Goldfish Bowl' Life Will Go On, Mrs. Ike Thinks

NEW YORK — Mamie Eisenhower said Wednesday her husband's election probably won't mean too much of a change in their lives—that it's already been sort of a "goldfish bowl" existence.

Mrs. Eisenhower, interviewed by some 10 women news reporters about 15 minutes after she had become first lady-elect, commented in this manner on her coming life in the White House.

"I don't think it can be any more trying than our life has been. In fact, I'll see more of my husband. We don't go out much of evenings."

She noted that her husband's activities as a top military commander and Columbia University president have kept them in the public eye for a considerable time.

"We've had guards for years," Mrs. Eisenhower said.

The curious and sightseers, she continued, had clustered around their residence near the Columbia campus.

It even became necessary to keep the shades of their fifth-floor penthouse study drawn against users of binoculars, the general's wife said.

Being first lady, Mrs. Eisenhower said, "will just be playing the wife again which is something I've always done—meeting people and greeting people."

U. S. Rebuilding Now Major Task, McCarthy Says

APPLETON, Wis. — Sen. Joseph R. McCarthy won a tempered endorsement of his communists-in-government charges from the people of Wisconsin yesterday when they returned him to the Senate for a second term.

The state's controversial junior Republican senator won 64 of the 71 counties from Democrat Thomas E. Fairchild, but trailed President-Elect Eisenhower and Republican Gov. Walter Kohler Jr. in winning precincts reporting.

In a prepared statement McCarthy said:

"The election of Gen. Eisenhower, and most probably a Republican Senate and House, more than justifies my faith in the intelligence of the American people. This is a new day for America. The real task of the Republican party now begins."
