Miss Lang had also been seen on Jackson Street that evening by her cousin, Keith McFarland, who said she seemed to be in good spirits. McFarland reported walking south with her on Jackson Street. He left her at the Jackson-Cass Street intersection, from which she apparently walked north again, meeting the sailor and other man.

Police and the district attorney's office are directing their efforts toward gaining information about the two men seen as reported seen with Stults said.

"If that lead doesn't bring us anything, we may have to start from scratch again," the district attorney commented.

Acquaintances described the girl as a very friendly person "with a lot of self-confidence and one who figured she could take care of herself," Stults said.

the minimum that Gen. Eisenhower, before his nomination, said was safe.

The Republicans captured 23 of the 35 Senate seats at stake, with the Democrats winning 12. This was a net GOP gain of two seats.

Four incumbent Republicans were beaten—Henry Cabot Lodge Jr. of Massachusetts, who was Eisenhower's pre-convention campaign manager; James P. Kern of Missouri; Harry Cain of Washington and Zales Ecton of Montana.

But 11 members of the Republican "Class of 1946"—prominent in the last GOP Senate victory—survived. They included Sens. Joseph R. McCarthy of Wisconsin and William E. Jenner of Indiana, who drew heavy Democratic fire during the campaign.

Four Democratic senators also were overturned—Ernest McFarland of Arizona, the majority leader; the veteran Joseph O'Mahoney of Wyoming; William Benton of Connecticut and Thomas Underwood of Kentucky.

Morse emerged as one of the Senate's most controversial figures because he has not indicated how he will vote. A tie would be broken by Vice President Barkley until Jan. 20 and after then by Vice President Nixon.

In the House, the Republicans gained 23 seats but lost six other places to the Democrats, for a net increase of 17. The GOP added another seat from a new district.

The veteran Sam Rayburn of Texas will yield the speakership to Joseph W. Martin Jr. of Massachusetts, who held this post in the 80th Congress.

Soviet Conduct While Detaining U. S. Officer Hit

BERLIN — U. S. High Commissioner Walter J. Donnelly Thursday complained to the Russians about the "complete futility and childishness" of their security system in detaining an American officer for six days and at the same time denying that they knew where he was.

In a protest delivered to Soviet Occupation Chief Gen. Vassily I. Chukov, at Karlsruhe, Donnelly brought up the case of Army Lt. William Stonebraker, of West Duncatur, Pa., who lost his way on the autobahn Oct. 26 while traveling in his private car from Berlin to West Germany.

Stonebraker was arrested by Russian military police and finally turned over to American authorities in the evening of Oct. 31.

"There was no motive, but a simple mistake," wrote Donnelly after re-stating that the officer had merely taken a wrong turn on the 100-mile autobahn through the Russian zone.

Nevertheless, declared the high commissioner, "the inexorable Soviet security system went into operation."

He described how Lt. Stonebraker was held incommunicado for six days and questioned.

"He was asked his views about capitalism and communism, whether his parents were workers, and what he thought about Korea and about the withdrawal of troops from Germany, etc.," said Donnelly in his letter to Chukov.

"I confess I do not understand the mentality which leads to Soviet security system to play games of this kind. Its complete futility and its childishness baffle me."

He demanded that the Soviet officers responsible for the detention of the lieutenant be punished and steps be taken to avoid a repetition.

George C. Marcy Dies At Veterans Hospital

George C. Marcy, 77, resident of Myrtle Creek, died Nov. 4 in the Roseburg Veterans Hospital. He was born Jan. 21, 1875 in Wilmington, O., and came to this community 55 years ago. He had engaged in the farming industry most of his life. He was a veteran of the Spanish-American War.

Women's Vote Gave Ike Victory—Brannan

WASHINGTON — Secretary of Agriculture Brannan said today he does not believe the farm vote swung as heavily to Gen. Dwight D. Eisenhower "as did other segments" of the population.

Asked by reporters at an informal session in the secretary's office whether he thought the farm vote was decisive in Eisenhower's win over Gov. Adlai Stevenson, Brannan replied:

"It is impossible to say at this stage of the game, but I have the feeling that the farmers probably did not go as far along with the trend as did other segments."

Asked what he thought was the major reason for Eisenhower's election, Brannan replied:

"I think it was the women's vote based upon promises—implied or otherwise—to bring an end to Korea."

Independent Thinking Shown In Tuesday Vote

WASHINGTON — It was strictly a landslide for Gen. Eisenhower Tuesday, not for the Republican party, although the election gave the Republicans control of both the executive and legislative branches of the government.

While the vote giving the general the presidency and control of the executive branch smashed all records, the Republicans came out of the election with only a slim majority in both houses of Congress, which just reversed the pre-election picture a bit. The Democrats had control by a slim majority before Tuesday.

The difference between the presidential vote and the results in congress was pretty clear evidence the people didn't vote so much against the Democrats as Democrats as they did against having another Democratic administration in charge of the executive branch which runs the government.

There were plenty of examples in this election where the voters used independent judgment instead of voting straight party tickets. While picking Republican Eisenhower for president, they picked and chose when it came to candidates for other jobs, like senator and governor.

Notable Changes Occur

In Massachusetts for instance, Eisenhower won, but John F. Kennedy, Democratic member of the House of Representatives, defeated Republican Sen. Lodge, who was seeking re-election. Lodge had managed Eisenhower's campaign nomination.

And in Massachusetts the voters turned down Democratic Gov. Paul A. Dever, who was trying for re-election, in favor of a Republican who gave up his seat in the House to run for governor, Christian A. Herter.

In Ohio, Eisenhower won and Republican Sen. Bricker was re-elected over Democrat Michael DeSalle, former boss of price stabilization. But the voters re-elected their Democratic governor, Frank J. Lausche, who was running against Sen. Taft's brother, Charles P. Taft.

And in Washington Eisenhower won, but Republican Sen. Cain was defeated for re-election by Democratic Henry M. Jackson, a member of the House.

LOS ANGELES — Shirley Mae Brown and Kathryn Erna Waite had to enlist a guardian before they could enlist in the Marines.

Shirley, 20, and Kathryn, 18, are both orphans who met while attending school in Chicago. Two weeks ago they came to Los Angeles and decided to join the Marines. They were turned down because they had no parents to sign consent papers.
