The Roseburg Junior High School squad ended its football season on a happy note by edging the Drain Jayvees Wednesday night on Finlay Field, 20-19.

It was the fifth victory in six games this season for the youngsters. Turner was unhappy about the showing of the line in the game, but gave credit to Tippy Swales and Bill Oerding for their backfield work.

A crowd of perhaps 500 Drain and Roseburg spectators turned out for the season's finale and Drain brought a 30-piece junior high school band to brighten the activities. The evening was marred by one injury when Drain's Jim Harris dislocated his elbow in the last play of the second quarter. He was taken to a local hospital for treatment.

The Roseburg team drew first blood when Swales scampered 20 yards to a score. Swales bucked over with the all-important extra point on the next touchdown in that

period after Oerding had staged a 25-yard dash. Drain also scored in this period to set the halftime score at 13-6.

On the kickoff to Drain to open the second half, a fumble was recovered on the enemy 40. Swales hit paydirt on the second play from scrimmage from 35 yards out. This conversion was also good. Drain scored in both the third and fourth quarters on pass plays, but only converted in the third.

'Sweeping' Changes Seen For Bonus, Waiver Rules

NEW YORK — Two of baseball's thorniest problems—payment of fabulous bonuses to untried youngsters and inter-league waiver deals after the trading deadline—may undergo sweeping changes next month during the major-minor league meetings at Phoenix, Ariz.

Baseball Commissioner Ford Frick expounded at length during a press conference in his office Wednesday over proposed legislation which the big and little moguls of the game will be asked to vote on at their confabs.

The important rule change, recommended by a special committee, would extend the current trading deadline from midnight June 15 to the witching hour of July 15.

After the trading deadline no player deals could be made with the exception of the waiver route. Inter-league waiver deals will be tougher to make, however, if the new proposals are adopted.

The new rule stipulates that a player must first be waived out of his own league and then offered first to club lowest in the standing of the rival circuit and finding more the purchase price must not exceed \$10,000.

This would sharply curtail the passing of stars from one league to the other such as Hank Borowy from the New York Yankees to the Chicago Cubs in 1945 for \$100,000. The new bonus rule drawn up by the committee provides:

1. Any player paid in excess of \$4,000 by any club from a league of Class A classification and up will be tagged as a bonus player. Any prospect who receives more than \$3,000 for signing with a team below the Class A rating will also be bonus players. The cash figures include salary with the exception of the majors whose minimum stipend is \$5,000.

2. A major league bonus player must be retained for two years before he can be optioned to the minors. Any minor league bonus player must pass through the unrestricted draft at the end of the season. If a minor leaguer is unclaimed in the draft he loses his bonus bond.

"The new bonus law, if adopted, will in no way prohibit any owner from paying whatever he pleases to a free agent," Frick said.

"But it will cause the owners to be careful about signing a bonus player unless he felt reasonable certain the youngsters would make good."

Georgia Tech Accepts Bid As Sugar Bowl Contender

NEW YORK — The scramble for teams for the Jan. 1 football bowl spectacles was on today with New Orleans' Sugar Bowl out in front of the pack.

Georgia Tech, unbeaten, untied and unsurpassed at the moment as a bowl attraction, agreed to play in the Sugar Bowl yesterday, thus becoming one of the earliest bowl-bound teams since the New Year's Day classics were started. Who the powerful Engineers, third-ranked in the Associated Press poll, will meet is anybody's guess.

Officially the Sugar Bowl had no comment about an opponent for unbeaten and untied Tech here Jan. 1. Privately, however, one Sugar Bowl official said he would like to see either Maryland or Oklahoma—two tested Sugar Bowl favorites. But both now are banned by their conferences from bowls.

There has been talk about Penn State and Villanova, but none came from Sugar Bowlers—even unofficially. The Sugar Bowl never lists teams under consideration.

The Rose Bowl at Pasadena, granddaddy of the January spectacles, will, of course, match the Pacific Coast Conference and Big Ten champions, Dallas' Cotton Bowl will have the Southwest Conference winner as host team. But the three conference races are far from settled, and nobody can say for sure at this date who'll be defending conference honors Jan. 1.

The Miami Orange Bowl, fourth of the big four bowls, will hold a committee meeting this week end, and members declined to discuss any possible teams until then. A spokesman commented, however, that "November is an important month in football and we want to pick the best teams."

A rundown of the top 10 teams shows that only one other team, eighth-ranked Tennessee, is eligible for a bowl bid. The Volunteers, who have appeared in many bowl

games in past years, are still trying to live down an early season loss to Duke, which was whopped, 28-7, by Georgia Tech last Saturday.

Michigan State, No. 1, is a member of the Big Ten, although not eligible for conference football competition until next year. Maryland, No. 2, is barred by a Southern Conference ruling against bowl games.

Oklahoma, No. 4, and Kansas, No. 7, are members of the Big Seven, which frowns on bowls, while UCLA, No. 5 will meet sixth-ranked Southern California Nov. 22 in the battle for Pacific Coast honors.

Purdue, No. 9, is the current favorite to meet the UCLA-USC winner in the Rose Bowl, and Notre Dame, No. 10, does not go in for bowl games.

Only eight shooters made appearances at the shoot last night, but winter shooting is expected to get back in full swing with the end of hunting season.

Former French Flyweight Champ Dies After Bout

LONDON — Honore Pratesi, former French flyweight champion, died in the London Hospital Thursday 36 hours after being badly battered in a 10-round fight.

The 31-year-old Frenchman was outpointed by Zulu Jake Tuli, British Empire champion, Tuesday night.

Pratesi collapsed in his dressing room an hour after the fight and was rushed to hospital where two brain operations and a blood transfusion were performed Wednesday.

He was the 13th boxer to die of ring injuries in Britain since the war.

AP Picks Heinrich, Moomaw

LOS ANGELES — The Associated Press All-America picking process in the Pacific Coast Conference this week finds quarterback Don Heinrich of Washington and linebacker Donn Moomaw of UCLA the leading candidates.

For the first time this season, the name of fullback Johnny Olszewski of California was missing from the recommendations of the AP board of nominations for the Coast.

Olszewski still leads the loop in rushing, with 856 yards in 116 carries. But Olszewski was slowed down considerably on two straight important weekends by Southern California and UCLA, and to top his troubles, in both games fumbled at the most inopportune times.

Wagner Wins Unanimous Decision Over Sabotin

CLEVELAND — A possible bout with Harry Matthews or Dan Bucceroni loomed for hard-hitting Dick Wagner Thursday following his convincing victory over Lulu Sabotin.

The rough house battler from Toppish, Wash., swarmed all over the Warren, O., fireman in winning a unanimous decision Wednesday night in Cleveland Arena.

Wagner weighed 175 and Sabotin a pound less for the nationally televised and broadcast show.

Matchmaker Larry Atkins said he was trying to line up either Matthews or Bucceroni, both top-ranking light heavies, for a bout with Wagner on the Cleveland News' annual Christmas Fund Show.

There were other possibilities mentioned for consideration by the nominating panel, which is made up of Royal Brougham of the Seattle Post-Intelligencer, Paul Zimmerman of the Los Angeles Times and Bill Leiser of the San Francisco Chronicle.

Foremost of the newcomers was tall Paul Cameron, another UCLA star. Cameron's All-America bid had been retarded all season because of injuries. Then came his play against California Saturday.

He was voted the Associated Press "Back of the Week" Wednesday off the California game.

Named with Moomaw on the defensive platoon were two halfbacks Lindon Crow of Southern California and Milt Davis, another UCLA star.

The chief candidate for safety man is Jimmy Sears of USC.

Four players, end George Black and halfback Bill Earley of Washington, as well as Ike Jones of UCLA and Sam Morley of Stan-

ford, were nominated for further observation in the remaining games.

UCLA Sets Pass Drills For OSC Sat. Encounter

LOS ANGELES — Passing drills were the main items on Thursday's practice schedule at UCLA, with third string Primo Villanueva slated to see more action than usual against Oregon State here Saturday.

The sophomore from Calexico has shown flashes of excellent work at the tailback spot in the few chances he has had to play this season.

Sutherland Jayvees Wallop Myrtle Creek Men, 25-0

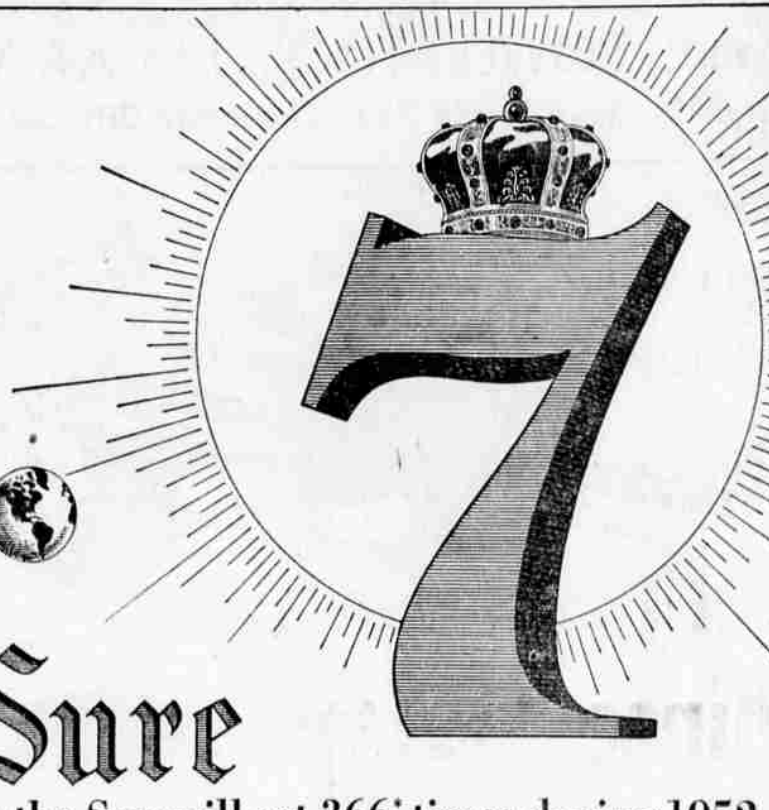
Morris Churchman paced the Sutherland Junior Varsity to a 25-0 football victory over Myrtle Creek Jayvees in the latter team's first game of the season.
