

Fog Calls Off Grade School Jamboree

The fourth annual Grade School Football Jamboree, set for Finlay Field Saturday night at 7, has been postponed due to "adverse weather conditions," Harry Hill, Kiwanis Club chairman, reported today.

The decision was made after officials heard reports from the state police and weather bureau that the heavy fog would lay in over the weekend, making highway travel dangerous.

Postponement will be to a future date next week, Hill said, when eight teams of youngsters, representing four Roseburg schools, make their bid for a championship.

Again this year, the affair is sponsored by the Roseburg Kiwanis Club, with the purpose of getting money for uniforms and equipment replacements and new uniforms for at least two new schools in the 1953 competition.

Trophies for the Rose Bowl of local elementary play are now on display at West Bros. Jewelers. A large crowd of spectators turned out last year, and the Kiwanis have given fourth, fifth and sixth graders plenty of incentive to secure a similar crowd this year. The school selling the most tickets on a percentage basis will receive \$12. Second and third places will get \$8 and \$5, respectively.

Trophies in this event aren't limited to the players only. As in years past, pep squads from the respective schools will line up during the evening in competition for the best pepster group. Each group will get a limited time to show their talents between games. Kiwanis judges will make the final decision.

Also, as in past years, the preliminary games will be played crosswise on the field until the finalists are decided. The two championship games in the Pee Wee and Heavy Divisions will be played the length of the field.

Tickets for high school students and adults are selling at 50 cents. These passes are also available from any Kiwanis member.

Cal, Washington Vie For Total Offense Honors

California and Washington, which meet Saturday in Seattle, are running neck-and-neck for total offense honors in the Pacific Coast Conference while Southern California dominates the defensive picture, statistics from the PCC Commissioner's office showed today.

California's attack, built on a strong running game, has averaged 372.1 yards a game during the first seven weeks—just two yards better than the aerial-minded Washington Huskies. Stanford is third in total offense with 323.4 yards.

Undeclared Southern California leads in rushing defense, passing defense, total defense, punting and punt returns. Their total defense mark of 175.8 yards is some 60 yards better than the No. 2 team, undefeated UCLA. The Trojans have allowed 106.3 yards on the ground, with UCLA second at 107.6, and 69.5 yards in the air to 107.9 for Oregon. Southern Cal has not allowed a touchdown via aerials, and only three rushing.

The Trojans lead in punting with 42.9 yards a kick to Oregon State's 41.5, and in punt returns with 15.7 yards per runback, three having gone for touchdowns.

California has a big lead in rushing with 287.7 yards to 201.9 for Stanford. Washington has completed 111 of 212 passes for 50.9 per cent and 199.7 yards a game to lead in aerials with Oregon second, 164 yards. UCLA has intercepted 28 enemy passes for 440 yards to threaten the Conference records of 36 and 458 yards. Idaho has the best average on kickoff returns, 23.4 yards per runback.

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Drain Fights For District Title At Oakland Today

Two Douglas County games of particular importance today are scheduled at Oakland and Elkton.

The County's white hopes for state championships will be decided in these final games of the regular season.

At Oakland, defending district champion Drain, makes its final bid for an undefeated season in a District 4-B game. If the Warriors win this one, it's all over but the shouting. A loss by the Warriors would throw the race into a three-way tie. The chance appears very slim of an Oakland upset, however. A Drain victory will tab the Warriors for a quarterfinal slot against the Lane County winner.

Bruins Won't Take Beaver Game Lightly

LOS ANGELES (AP) — The unbeaten Bruins of UCLA have two more grid problems to solve before they can graduate to the Rose Bowl class.

The first one comes Saturday when Oregon State moves into Memorial Coliseum.

The Oregon Staters do not pose much of a problem in view of the fact they have been solved by their last five opponents.

Prof. Henry R. (Red) Sanders doesn't propose to let his Bruin students take this next examination lightly, however. Some one might ring in a few queries they didn't expect. It has happened many times, you know.

Sanders has not forgotten that it took Michigan State, now the Nation's No. 1 team, almost an entire game before the Spartans came through with the final answer against the Beavers from Corvallis, Ore.

The Bruins' next, and final, quiz comes up Nov. 22 against a stern taskmaster, the Trojan of Southern California.

Sanders has his pupils in ideal attitude for Oregon State, physically and, he thinks, mentally.

This includes his star pupil, one Paul Cameron, who has learned

his lessons so well he is one of the most astute halfbacks in the nation.

Cameron's main rival from Corvallis is Mr. Sam Baker, himself a most educated gridster when it comes to carrying or kicking a football.

Unfortunately, one of Baker's mates, quarterback Jim Withrow, won't participate Saturday. He's got a broken thumb on his throwing hand. Kaye Booth, a substitute, will sit in for Withrow.

CORVALLIS, Ore. (AP) — Kaye Booth will replace injured Jim Withrow as Oregon State quarterback in the Pacific Coast Conference football game with UCLA Saturday.

X-rays disclosed Thursday, Withrow, OSC's No. 1 passer, suffered a broken thumb in last week's game with Washington. It was believed earlier the injury was a sprain.

The Beavers left Thursday by train for Los Angeles.

3 Kentucky 'Fix' Men Out Of Public Sports

NEW YORK (AP) — Ralph Beard, Alex Groza and Dale Barnstable, three former University of Kentucky basketball players involved in the fix scandals, cannot participate in public sports during their three years on probation.

The three were given suspended sentences and placed on probation last April by Judge Saul S. Streit of general sessions.

The players earlier had pleaded guilty to conspiring with gamblers to fix the point spread in games.

Judge Streit explained to Beard and Groza Thursday that, under the terms of their probation, they could not "engage in public sports, amateur or professional."
