PORTLAND — Three top political appointees in Oregon have uncertain futures. They are Marshal Jack Caulfield, District Attorney Henry Hess and Customs Collector Nan Wood Honeyman.
Their terms expire at varying times, with Mrs. Honeyman's running for another two years. Hess's expires in 1934 too, and Caulfield's next March.
But all three can be removed without cause and presumably will be as the Republicans take over. Most of their employees are protected by civil service, although the assistants to the district attorney are not included in this.
Two other top federal jobs here—postmaster and OPS director—are protected by civil service and the holders can be removed only for cause.

Securing Doctor At Glide Talked By Civic Group

The "which comes first, the chicken or the egg?" question was debated in Glide's effort to obtain a doctor at a special meeting at the Glide School Wednesday afternoon, but no solution was reached.
Byron Evans, superintendent of Glide schools, seeking an answer to the problem of need for a physician for the Glide-Idylwild Park area, called the meeting of interested citizens who might help decide the matter.
Those attending were: Paul Pugh, field representative for the I.W.A. of C.I.O., James Brown, ass't agent of the I.W.A. of C.I.O. Wm. Brinkley, agent for the Oregon Physician Service, all from Roseburg; W. D. Turner, Portland manager for the Prudential Hospital Association; Mrs. Gladys Wells representing the committee of Glide teachers; David White, instructor of the socio-economics class of the high school and his student, Della Mae Schleicher (this class sent out questionnaires to evaluate the needs of the area).
Mack Brown, Mack E. Brown, property owner, R. J. Blakely, property owner, Mrs. Jimmy Evans, business member of the community, Mrs. Arthur M. Selby, member of the Glide Parent-Teachers Association, and Supt. Byron Evans.
Evans spoke first detailing the physician problem and stating that all interested people were not pulling in the same direction, that all interests should be unified. Paul Pugh addressed the meeting stating that he believed his union members and their families comprised the largest percentage of the population of the area; that the establishment of a physician in the immediate area would be of vital importance to in the woods or the mill, that his union would co-operate 100 percent in the project.
Turner of Portland spoke on the shortage of physicians at this time on account of the Korean war, that Portland clinics were even short of doctors. He asked if the
