Request Issued For State Park On N. Umpqua

The Oregon Highway Commission will be asked to construct a state park on the North Umpqua Highway.

The Douglas County Park Department has been granted time for a conference with the Highway Commission at its meeting in Portland, Nov. 25, and at that time present the application for state assistance in developing North Umpqua recreational facilities.

The Commission will be asked to construct a campground type of park in the Susan Creek area, where approximately 500 acres of land are available for development. The land is in county and federal ownership, the larger part of the acreage being under control of the Bureau of Land Management.

The North Umpqua development program is jointly planned by Douglas County, the Bureau of Land Management, U. S. Forest Service, and State Park Department. Several inspection trips have been made by highway department representatives, Portland Chamber of Commerce and other groups.

Robeson Attends Soviet Celebration

WASHINGTON (AP) — Several score Americans and many foreign diplomats helped the Soviet Embassy last night celebrate the 35th anniversary of the 1917 revolution which gave the Communists control of Russia.

Paul Robeson, Negro baritone, and a handful of secondary State Department officials were included in the throng which shook hands with newly-arrived Ambassador George N. Zarubin and Gen. Aleksandr Sizov, Soviet military attaché.

Secretary of State Acheson and his principal aides were conspicuously absent.

Milliken Enroute To Talk To Ike

Move Seen As Possible Selection

President-Elect Heeds Truman's Invitation For Budget Discussion

AUGUSTA, Ga. (AP) — GOP Sen. Eugene Milliken of Colorado was reported headed for President-elect Dwight D. Eisenhower's headquarters here Saturday and there was a possibility the senator might be asked to serve as Eisenhower's representative in the budget bureau.

Milliken, it was learned, was scheduled to arrive in Augusta by plane.

Eisenhower is vacationing at the nearby Augusta National Golf Club.

President Truman asked the general last Wednesday, the day after the election, to name a personal representative to sit in for preparation of the federal budget, which will be submitted to Congress early in January—before Eisenhower is inaugurated Jan. 20.

The president-elect replied he would choose a representative shortly. He also plans to place representatives in the defense and state departments.

Finance Expert

Milliken is chairman of the writing Senate Finance Committee in the 1947-48 Republican-controlled 80th congress, and he is in line to become chairman again when the Republicans resume control in January.

State police said Vinson was apparently traveling too fast through the fog. He was cited for violation of the basic rule. Selby was cited for following too close.

Vinson's car suffered heavy front end damage, while Selby's, owned by the Selby Motor Co. of Ashland, had minor front damage, state police said.

Douglas County Area Quarantined For Hog Disease

An area in Douglas County has been quarantined due to an outbreak of vesicular exanthema, a hog disease previously discovered within the state only in Portland and Salem, County Veterinarian Don E. Bailey reported today.

The disease was found on the Harlan Moore property on the end of Calkins Road last week, Bailey said. Tests conducted by the State Department of Agriculture and U. S. Bureau of Animal Husbandry indicated the presence of the disease.

Experts suspect the disease is carried in uncooked garbage. The hogs infected have been garbaged, Bailey said.

Bailey warns Douglas County hog raisers to be on the lookout for any signs of lameness, loss of appetite and blisters on mouth and feet. He urges them to report these possible signs of the disease immediately.

Hogs on the infected property here are to be slaughtered and the grounds will be disinfected, Bailey said.

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Two Are Drowned When Highway Bridge Breaks

NYSSA, Ore. (AP) — Two state highway department employees were drowned and three others were injured Friday when a bridge across the Owyhee River collapsed.

The dead were Chester Corfield, 40, and his brother Joe, 35. The bridge had been weakened last April when waters behind Owyhee Dam were released. The bridge had not been in use since July, and the road crew was attempting to repair it.

The brothers and Foreman John Westfall of Burns were under the bridge helping to jack up a span when it collapsed, presumably when piling gave way. Those three and two others, Ralph Boyd of La Grande and Clyde Pollard of a determined address, were thrown into the river.

Miss Bogard gave special mention for service to Mrs. Katherine Cory of Lookingglass, who has been connected with 4-H work since 1928, and Mrs. Alice Knutsen of Reedsport who has been a counselor for club members and new leaders for eight years.

Other "highlights" of 4-H accomplishments in the County included the winning of a new paragon in Camas Valley by the "Electrolite" club of Camas Valley and one girl's accumulation of \$1,000 on a sheep project to be used for a year of college.

Glenn Jones of Camas Valley was mentioned for the milking shorthorn calf he won at the State Fair from the Milking Shorthorn Association. He has accumulated 16 to 18 head since he started with one milking shorthorn seven years ago.

Forestry clubs in the County last year spent two days planting over 2,000 seedlings on burnt-over area.

There are over 1,100 boys and girls enrolled in 4-H work in Douglas County this year, Mrs. Bogard revealed.

Building Permits For October Total \$186,602

Building permits with valuations totaling \$186,602 were issued by the City of Roseburg building department during October, the monthly report of City Inspector C. H. Bonolis states.

Principal permits are for the new Eagle building and the Douglas Community Hospital annex. The Eagles took out a permit for \$52,000 for their structure on So. Stephens St. and Community Hospital took out a permit for \$90,000 for its annex.

In addition permits were issued for three new dwellings, totaling \$25,550. They are broken down as follows: John Perkins, Hawthorne Terrace, \$15,000; Virginia Riebling, \$1,600, and E. Kettleman, 1007 Balif, \$8,950.

Ken Graves applied for a new commercial building permit of \$1,000 at 631 S. Stephens.

The permits list 13 plumbing jobs for \$7,240; 18 electrical jobs, \$5,855; three dwellings, \$25,550; one new commercial, \$1,000; seven repair dwelling jobs \$4,465; two repair commercial jobs, \$2,350; four new garages, \$2,350; and six miscellaneous, \$133,602.

The first announcement Friday that the sergeant was missing after having been seen driving his jeep near the Soviet Zone gave his name officially as Legov. A check of Army records disclosed the correct name.

Artillery Used To Soften Up Red Strongholds

SEOUL (AP) — Allied big guns hammered thundering barrages today at Communist artillery strongholds in the Kumhwa ridges and mighty Osong Mountain on the Central Korean Front.

The savage fighting that for more than three weeks marched up and down the shell-battered slopes of Sniper Ridge and Triangle Hill had faded to minor thrusts.

Allied gunners were firing nearly 1,000 rounds an hour aimed at knocking out the strongest Communist artillery concentration of the Korean War. Many of the Red guns were protected by deep log and earth bunkers or spotted in tunnels.

Time after time the Red artillery had cut down South Koreans short of the crest as they stormed up the slopes of Triangle Hill. Allied commanders finally called a halt this week and asked the artillery to bleed off the Red firepower.

The Reds hold Triangle and the South Koreans own most of Sniper Ridge.

In the air war, dumpee formations from Okinawa dumped 80 tons of bombs at a North Korean staff school at Yongpoung, on the west coast.

Accidental Gun Discharge By Korean Vet Kills Brother

SAN ANTONIO, Tex. (AP) — Home from the wars, a job as rookie patrolman on the San Antonio police force, and a date with his kid brother for a football game.

That was the outlook late yesterday for Harold E. Manley, 21.

Then a pistol he was unloading discharged, the kid brother — 35-year-old Billy Manley — was hit in the stomach, and died in agony just 45 minutes later.

Outside Robert B. Green Hospital here, Harold, a Korean War veteran, looked at his father, a former policeman in Chattanooga, Tenn., and asked:

"What can I tell you, dad?"

"Nothing son," the father said gently. He patted his older son's head and said, "It was accidental and he's with God now."

My father told me never to leave a gun in the house with the bullets in it," young Manley said. "I was unloading the gun when it happened, but I still don't know what did happen." And he continued:

"I touched the little knob that releases the chamber for the shells, and the gun went off."

Big Craft Is Missing Over Alaska Area

Overcast, Storms Hinder Searchers In Arctic Wastes

FAIRBANKS, Alaska (AP) — An Air Force plane which disappeared with 19 men aboard while flying in interior Alaska yesterday was the object of an intensive search today by 26 planes flying under adverse weather conditions.

The big flying packet, a C119 from the 435th Troop Carrier Group of Miami, Fla., came to Alaska last week to participate in joint Air Force-Army maneuvers.

It last was heard from over Summit, Alaska, approximately midway between Fairbanks and Anchorage, at 2:38 a.m. The pilot reported he was flying at 10,000 feet on top of an undercast and estimated he would reach Nenana, about 60 miles north, in 20 minutes.

Airplane Crash Takes Four Lives In War Games

ANCHORAGE, Alaska (AP) — Alaska national guardsmen were enroute here Saturday by air from the remotest villages of the territory for the largest maneuvers in their history.

The big job of transporting the men to Fort Richardson for a 15-day encampment already has taken four lives.

A Wien Alaska Airlines pilot and three guardsmen were killed Friday when their four-place single engine Cessna plane, suddenly plunged into the sea while making a landing approach at Barrow, Alaska's northernmost settlement.

The Wien Alaska pilot was identified as Walter Bear. The passengers were listed as Isaac Walook, Edward Torrak and Harry Thomas. Their homes were not known immediately.

The plane was bringing the guardsmen from Wainwright on the Arctic coast to Barrow, one of the staging areas from which military transports will fly the men here.

Commission Asks Bids On Five Highway Jobs

The Oregon Highway Commission will open bids on five projects in Douglas County Nov. 24.

Three of the projects are on Highway 99. Construction is planned on 100-foot and 197-foot concrete viaducts at the junction of Highway 99 and the Elkhorn-Sutherland highway near Sutherlin, four concrete viaducts on the new highway five miles northeast of Yoncalla and three concrete structures on the new highway two miles south of Grading.

Culding and paving work will be done on 1.17 miles about three miles south of Winchester Bay. The Commission will request 10,700 cubic yards of crushed rock for the Coos Bay-Roseburg Highway, for use in both Coos and Douglas counties.

Exploding Grenades Kill Officer, Injure Three
